COMPANY PROFILE

Transtech Optelecom Science Holdings Limited (the "Company") (stock code: 9963) (together with its subsidiaries, collectively referred to as the "Group"). The Company owns two major operating subsidiaries, namely Transtech Optical Communication Company Limited ("Transtech") and Futong Group Communication Technology (Thailand) Co., Ltd. ("Futong Thailand") in Hong Kong and Thailand respectively. The Group's parent group (namely, Futong Group Co., Ltd. ("Futong China"), together with its subsidiaries, "Futong China Group" or "Parent Group") has business operations in the PRC and its customers include major PRC telecommunications operators.

Transtech is principally engaged in the manufacturing and sales of optical fibres, and its production facilities are located in Hong Kong. Futong Thailand is principally engaged in the manufacturing and sales of optical fibre cables, optical cable cores and other related products, and its production facilities are located in Thailand.

In addition to the manufacturing and sales of optical fibre cables with various standard specifications that are widely used in the telecommunications industry, Futong Thailand also designs and manufactures specialty optical fibre cables pursuant to requests from our customers, including rodent resistant optical fibre cable, flame-retardant optical fibre cable and non-metallic optical fibre cable. Transtech manufactures optical fibres for Futong Thailand's production of optical fibre cables, as well as for sale to third parties. Furthermore, the Group sells optical cable cores and other related products, including power cable and other auxiliary products.

The Group is highly regarded in the optical fibre products markets. The Group was awarded ISO 9001:2015, ISO 14001:2015 and ISO 45001:2018 certificates in relation to manufacturing of optical fibre products. The Group believes that, by leveraging the Group's strengths on product quality and research ability, the Group has successfully enhanced the Group's product recognition in the market.

The Shares have been listed on the GEM of the Stock Exchange by way of the Global Offering since 20 July 2017 (the "Listing Date") and then were successfully listed on the Main Board of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange") on 5 November 2020 (the "Transfer Date"). As of 31 December 2022, the Company had 260,000,000 issued shares.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Despite having increased revenue, the Group still encountered difficulty in its business in 2022. The Group's operating results for the year ended 31 December 2022 were listed as follows:

- Total revenue increased by approximately 49.3% to approximately HK\$232.8 million (2021: approximately HK\$155.9 million)
- Gross profit increased by approximately 53.3% to approximately HK\$29.9 million (2021: approximately HK\$19.5 million)
- Gross profit margin increased by approximately 0.3% to approximately 12.8% (2021: approximately 12.5%)

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT



* The fifth annual general meeting after Listing was held on 17 June 2022

Dear Shareholders,

On behalf of the board (the "Board") of directors (the "Directors") of Transtech Optelecom Science Holdings Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (collectively the "Group"), I am pleased to present the audited consolidated results of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2022.

BUSINESS REVIEW

The year 2022 was continuing to be a challenging year to the Group. The Group was exposed under several market challenges and uncertainties, such as continuous impact of COVID-19 pandemic on unstable material supplies and port congestion, ongoing international trade dispute, and geopolitical tension that led to pessimistic economy sentiment all over the world.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

The above-mentioned factors posed challenges to majority sectors in PRC, Hong Kong and the ASEAN countries by undermining investment and business environment. Furthermore, the outbreak of the COVID-19 aggravated global economy around the world and its continuity in the third year. Remote communication has become a new, long-lasting trend in the sectors of education, industry and healthcare, which has brought infinite possibility to the development of 5G. As of December 2022, millions of families were covered by Gigabit Optical Network ("GPON") in China. More 5G base stations were constructed and put into use in China achieved "Full Coverage of Broadband in Villages". 5G application has been applied to sectors among the primary industry, secondary industry and tertiary industry with potential constantly released to empower the digital transformation of the economy and society by 5G.

Almost half of the 5G applications have been implemented to business and stepped into new stage of innovation application from network construction. In 2022, 5G development strived to satisfy the needs arising from the digital transformation of the economy and society, and China will systematically plan the new infrastructure construction and stably promote 5G construction. The Company will seize the opportunities from development of 5G's industry and actively follow up relevant projects.

The subsidiary company in Thailand continued the construction of the new factory building for business expansion but its commencement dated of production is estimated to be postponed to June 2024.

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group recorded:

- revenue increased by 49.3% to approximately HK\$232.8 million (2021: approximately HK\$155.9 million);
- gross profit increased by 53.3% to approximately HK\$29.9 million (2021: approximately HK\$19.5 million);
- total comprehensive expenses for the year attributable to owners of the Company decreased by approximately 32.1% to an expense of approximately HK\$82.5 million (2021: an expense of approximately HK\$121.6 million); and
- the Company's basic loss per share to be approximately HK\$0.27 (2021: loss approximately HK\$0.34).

Performance Analysis

For the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group reported its revenue of approximately HK\$232.8 million (year ended 31 December 2021: approximately HK\$155.9 million), representing an increase of approximately 49.3% as compared to that of the same period in 2021. The gross profit margin of the Group increased by approximately 0.3% to approximately 12.8% for the year ended 31 December 2022 as compared to a gross profit margin of 12.5% for the year ended 31 December 2021.

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group recorded a loss attributable to the owners of the Company of approximately HK\$70.8 million (year ended 31 December 2021: loss approximately HK\$87.3 million) representing decrease of loss approximately 18.9%.

(i) Futong Thailand

The economies in the ASEAN countries were still hit by the sustained COVID-19 pandemic in 2022 but slightly improved in sales activities. As a result of the continued recovery in the market, the selling price is slightly increased due to increased demand but more expected credit allowance for trade and other receivable were made, the sales increased 116.4% and net loss increased 581.0% as compared to that of the same period in 2021.

(ii) Transtech

Transtech has reported its revenue and net loss in amount of approximately HK\$59.9 million and HK\$48.1 million respectively for the year ended 31 December 2022 (for the year ended 31 December 2021: revenue approximately HK\$75.2 million and net loss HK\$80.7 million respectively), representing decrease of revenue approximately 20.3% and decrease of loss 40.4% due to the weak demand in PRC and less expected credit allowance were made respectively.

OUTLOOK

Looking forward to the Year 2023, the market will still be full of challenges and uncertainties, disregarding the slightly improved aggregate sales result we achieved in the Year 2022. Under the ongoing threat from COVID-19 pandemic and geopolitical international tension, worldwide economy is expected to be volatile. The Group will continue to maintain its stringent cost control measures, enhance the Group's overall production efficiency and maintain its competitiveness in the market.

As various regions begin to recover from the ravages of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the continued increase in 5G penetration will become a key growth driver for the global economy. The Group will continue to actively participate in sales activities to secure a significant share of the 5G construction boom. The Ministry of Industry and Information Technology ("MIIT") published the "14th Five-Year Information and Communication Industry Development Plan" to state comprehensively deploying new digital infrastructure, including 5G, GPON, IPv6, mobile Internet of Things network, satellite communication network and other new generation communication network infrastructure. In the "14th Five-Year Plan" period, China will strive to build the world's largest 5G independent network, and strive to have 26 5G base stations per 10,000 people by 2025, to achieve full coverage in cities and towns, basic coverage in administrative villages with expected 80% coverage of 5G, and deep coverage in key application scenes. The demand for optical fibre cables, as the basic components of the physical layer of optical networks, is further enhanced by operators, which is beneficial to the Group's product mix. The demand for the optical fiber cables is expected to be further released.

Due to the recovery of COVID-19, the economic activities in the ASEAN countries such as Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand and Philippine have already resumed to normal and brought increased consumption demand in the communities. On the other hand, there are much room for network development in these ASEAN countries because it is their common aim to reach full 5G coverage since their 5G penetration rates are still much lower than that in the developed countries.

In addition, the Group will further devote resources and manpower to boost internal operation effectiveness, and will grasp opportunities arising from potential new market in some ASEAN countries other than Thailand and some European countries for sustainable growth.

APPRECIATION

On behalf of the Board, I would like to extend my sincere gratitude to our shareholders, investors, business partners, management and all the staff members for their increasing support and dedication to the Group. We will continue to provide the market with innovative, reliable and high-quality optical fiber products to our customers, and to drive the Group's business development in the long term. We believe these will empower us to achieve a better performance and create greater value for our customers, investors and shareholders.

A. FINANCIAL REVIEW

Revenue

The Group's total revenue increased from HK\$155.9 million in the year ended 31 December 2021 to HK\$232.8 million in the year ended 31 December 2022. The increase in total revenue of the Group was mainly due to the sales of optical fibre cables in Thailand increased from HK\$58.0 million to HK\$118.5 million and in some European Countries due to the expand of 5G market. Both the selling prices and demand of the Group's products increased as compared with the corresponding period in FY2021, resulting in increase of sales revenue. No sales of optical cable cores during FY2022.

Cost of Sales

The key components of the Group's cost of sales comprised principally the (i) raw materials used for production of optical fibres, optical fibre cables, optical cable cores and other related products, (ii) direct and indirect labour costs, (iii) manufacturing overheads such as depreciation for plant and equipment and right-of-use assets, rent, consumables, utilities, and other expenses related to the manufacturing our products and (iv) change in inventories of finished goods and work in progress.

For the year ended 31 December 2022, the cost of sales of the Group increased by about 48.6% to approximately HK\$202.9 million as compared with the corresponding period in FY2021. Such increase was mainly attributable to the net effect of the increase of purchased quantity along with increased sales and the decrease of optical fibre cable cost unit price during the reporting period.

Gross profit and margin

The gross profit of the Group increased from approximately HK\$19.5 million, for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately HK\$29.9 million for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The gross profit margin increased from approximately 12.5% for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately 12.8% for the year ended 31 December 2022. This is mainly attributable to the net affect of the decrease of the gross profit margin of optical fibres and increase of the gross margin of optical fibre cables for the year ended 31 December 2022 by approximately 10.2% and approximately 15.3% respectively as compared to the year ended 31 December 2021.

Loss allowance for trade and other receivables

Loss allowance for trade and other receivables represented impairment on trade and other receivables, which decreased by approximately HK\$44.2 million, or approximately 38.7% from approximately HK\$114.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately HK\$70.1 million for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The increase in loss allowance for trade and other receivables for the year ended 31 December 2022 was mainly due to ten debtors with a gross carrying amount of approximately HK\$163,085,000 (2021: six debtors with HK\$124,655,000) defaulted and transferred to credit impaired.

Other income, gains, expenses and losses, net

The Group recognised a grant of approximately HK\$0.1 million in respect of Covid-19 related subsidies which provided by the Government of Thailand for the year ended 31 December 2022 (2021: HK\$0.2 million), while three grants of approximately HK\$1.0 million under the "Employment Support Scheme" (2021: nil) from the Government of Hong Kong were recognised for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The Group recognised foreign exchange losses of approximately HK\$7.2 million for the year ended 31 December 2022 as compared with foreign exchange gains of approximately HK\$9.5 million for the year ended 31 December 2021, mainly due to the fluctuation of exchange rates among Renminbi ("RMB"), Hong Kong Dollar ("HK\$"), Thai Baht ("THB"), and United States dollar ("US\$") during the year.

Selling and distribution expenses

Selling and distribution expenses comprised mainly staff cost, transportation expense, export cost and other selling and distribution expenses.

The Group's selling and distribution expenses increased from approximately HK\$3.4 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately HK\$5.5 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, representing a increase of approximately 61.8%.

The increase in the selling and distribution expenses for the year ended 31 December 2022 was mainly due to the increase in transportation expenses and export cost as there was increase in sales of optical fibre to ASEAN countries.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses primarily consist of (i) staff cost, (ii) office expense, which comprises the expense for office supplies, electricity and water expense, rental expense, security fee and repair and maintenance expense, (iii) depreciation, (iv) operation management fee, (v) transportation expense, which comprises travelling expense and motor vehicle expense, (vi) professional fee, which comprises audit fee and legal and professional expense, and (vii) other expense, which comprises bank charges and miscellaneous expense.

The Group's administrative expenses decreased from approximately HK\$21.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately HK\$20.7 million for the year ended 31 December 2022, representing a decrease of approximately 5.1%. The decrease in the administrative expenses for the year ended 31 December 2022 was mainly attributable to the effects of the decrease in staff cost.

Finance costs

Finance costs represent the interest expense on bank borrowings and lease liabilities. The finance costs of the Group increased from approximately HK\$2,127,000 for the year ended 31 December 2021 to approximately HK\$2,372,000 for the year ended 31 December 2022 mainly attributable to the aggregate effects of (i) the increase in interest on bank borrowings and (ii) the decrease in interest on lease liabilities.

Taxation

The Hong Kong profits tax is calculated at 8.25% on the first HK\$2 million of the estimated assessable profits and at 16.5% on the estimated assessable profits above HK\$2 million.

Futong Thailand has been granted preferential tax treatments by the Board of Investment in Thailand relating to manufacturing of cables by virtue of the provisions of the Industrial Investment Promotion Act B.E.2520 of Thailand. The preferential tax treatments granted include: (i) the full exemption from payment of corporate income tax on net profit of the promoted business of the manufacturing of cables for a period of eight years ended 28 February 2021 ("Exemption Period"). No Corporate Income tax has been provided within the Exemption Period; and (ii) the 50% exemption from payment of corporate income tax during the period from 1 March 2021 to 28 February 2025 ("50% Exemption Period"), 50% Corporate Income Tax has been provided by the direct application of Corporate Income Tax rate to the profit before tax of management account during the "50% Exemption Period".

Income tax credit increased by approximately 116.3% from approximately HK\$16.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2021 to a tax expense of approximately HK\$2.7 million for the year ended 31 December 2022. Such increase was mainly caused by the decrease of deferred tax asset of tax losses recognised as a result of significant amount of loss allowance for trade and other receivables provided.

Loss for the year

Loss attributable to owners of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2022 amounted to approximately HK\$70.8 million (2021: loss approximately HK\$87.3 million).

The decrease of loss attributable to owners of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2022 was mainly attributable to the effect of the following factors: (i) significant less amount of loss allowance for trade receivables provided; and (ii) more revenue made given that the selling price and volume generally increased because of the initial recovery of COVID-19.

Liquidity, financial resources and capital structure

Cash position

The Group's principal sources of funds are used to finance working capital, and the growth and expansion of the Group's operations and sales network. The Group's principal sources of funds are cash generated from operations and bank borrowings. The Group had cash and cash equivalents of approximately HK\$58.2 million as at 31 December 2022 (31 December 2021: approximately HK\$14.0 million).

Bank and other borrowings on the Group

As at 31 December 2022, the Group had total bank borrowings of approximately HK\$55.8 million (31 December 2021: approximately HK\$59.2 million). Details of the bank and other borrowings are set out in note 24 to the consolidated financial statements.

Gearing ratio

Gearing ratio is calculated as total borrowings (including payables not incurred in the ordinary course of business of the Group) divided by the total equity as at the respective reporting dates.

Gearing ratio increased from approximately 10.0% as at 31 December 2021 to approximately 10.9% as at 31 December 2022. Such increase was primarily resulted from the decrease in bank borrowings and total equity reduced mainly due to the net effect decrease of loss allowance for trade receivables and increase in foreign exchange reserve.

Foreign currency risk

Our Group's foreign currency exposures arise mainly from the exchange rate movements of the US\$ and RMB against THB and RMB against HK\$. Any depreciation of THB will reduce the amount of revenue we generate in Thailand in terms of our reporting currency and adversely impact our results of operations. Similarly, Transtech might also suffer exchange loss if RMB depreciates against HK\$ because some of the sales revenue are fixed in the currency of RMB. However, our Group has established a foreign currency risk management policy to monitor and manage foreign currency risks.

Interest rate risk

The Group's fair value interest rate risk relates primarily to its fixed rate bank deposits, lease liabilities and bank borrowings. The Group is also exposed to cash flow interest rate risk through the impact of rate changes on variable interest bearing financial assets, mainly restricted bank balances and bank balances which carried at prevailing market interest rates. The Group currently does not use any derivative contracts to hedge its exposure to interest rate risk. The management of the Group maintains a balanced portfolio of fixed rate and variable rate borrowings.

Credit risk

As at 31 December 2022, the Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which will cause a financial loss to the Group due to failure to discharge an obligation by the counterparties is arising from the carrying amounts of the respective recognised financial assets as stated in the consolidated statement of financial position. The Group's credit risk is primarily attributable to trade receivables arising from contracts with customers. In order to minimise the credit risk, the Directors have delegated the senior management to be responsible for determination of credit limits and monitoring procedures to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debtors. The management of the Group performs impairment assessment on individual debtor basis to estimate the amount of expected credit loss ("ECL") of trade receivables based on internal credit ratings, ageing, collateral, repayment history and/or past due status of respective debtors and adjusted for forward-looking information. For bank deposits and balances, the management of the Group placed it in reputable banks with higher internal credit ratings with reference to either international or local credit-rating agencies, and ECL is insignificant. The Directors have the opinion that the Group have taken appropriate action to manage the credit risk.

Liquidity risk

The Group's management monitors the Group's cash flow positions on a regular basis to ensure the cash flows of the Group are closely controlled. The Group aims to maintain flexibility in funding by keeping committed credit lines available.

Capital commitments

As at 31 December 2022, the Group has capital commitments of approximately HK\$9.8 million (31 December 2021: approximately HK\$11.1 million).

Future plans for material investments

Save as disclosed in the "Future Plans and Use of Proceeds" section of the Prospectus, the Group did not have other plans for material investments and capital assets.

Employee and emolument policies

As at 31 December 2022, the employee headcount (including Directors) of the Group was 177 (31 December 2021: 172) and the total staff costs, including directors' emoluments, amounted to approximately HK\$24.0 million during the year ended 31 December 2022 (year ended 31 December 2021: approximately HK\$29.8 million). The Group recruits and promotes individuals based on their performance and development potential in the positions held. In order to attract and retain high quality staff and to enable smooth operations within the Group, the Group offered competitive remuneration packages (with reference to market conditions and individual qualifications and experience) and various in-house training courses. The remuneration packages are subject to review on a regular basis. The emoluments of the Directors and senior management are reviewed and approved by the Board of the Company, having regard to the Company's operating results, market competitiveness, individual performance and achievement.

Contingent liabilities and litigation

As at 31 December 2022, the Group had no material contingent liabilities and litigation (31 December 2021: nil).

Capital structure

As at 31 December 2022, the Company's authorized and issued share capital were HK\$10,000,000 and HK\$2,600,000 respectively. The number of its issued ordinary shares was 260,000,000 of HK\$0.01 each.

There has been no change in the capital structure of the Group since the Listing Date and up to the date of this report. The capital of the Company only comprises of ordinary shares.

Treasury policies

The Group has adopted a prudent financial management approach towards its treasury policies and thus maintained a healthy liquidity position throughout the period. To manage liquidity risk, the management closely monitors the Group's liquidity position and maintain sufficient cash and cash equivalents, the availability of funding through an adequate amount of committed credit facilities and the ability to settle the payables of the Group.

Charge of assets

As at 31 December 2022, the Group had not pledged its land, buildings and machinery to secure the banking facilities granted to the Group (31 December 2021: nil).

Charge of register

As at 31 December 2022, the Group had no charge of register.

Production Capacity Utilization

For the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group sold approximately 1.8 million fkm of optical fibre and approximately 2.3 million fkm of optical fibre cable. The production capacity of optical fibre, optical fibre cable and optical cable cores were approximately 9.6 million fkm and 9.6 million fkm in FY2021 and FY2022 respectively.

The utilization rate of optical fibre decreased from 51.6% to 31.8% from FY2021 to FY2022 and that of optical fibre cable and optical cable cores increased from 27.3% to 49.9% from FY2021 to FY2022. Both Transtech and Futong Thailand have adjusted their production volume based on the sales order.

Return on Assets (Revenue/Total Asset)

The Group's revenue amounted to HK\$155.9 million in FY2021 and HK\$232.8 million in FY2022 while the Group's total assets amounted to HK\$719.2 million and HK\$610.2 million as of 31 December 2021 and 2022 respectively.

Hence, the Group's return on assets increased from approximately 21.7% in FY2021 to approximately 38.1% in FY2022. This was mainly because of the degree of sales revenue rose 49.3% and total asset reduction 15.2% mainly due to the decrease of approximately 38.6% loss allowance for trade and other receivables in FY2022.

Future plans for material investments and capital assets

Save as the construction of the new factory in Thailand, the Group did not have other plans for material investments and capital assets.

Material acquisition and disposals of subsidiaries and affiliated companies

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group did not have any material acquisitions and disposals of subsidiaries and affiliated companies.

Performance guarantees

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group did not have any performance guarantee given to or received from a connected person or an independent third party.

Post balance sheet events

Saved for the amendment of the Company's Memorandum of Articles of Association as disclosed in the section of "Events After the Reporting Period" in the "Report of Directors" in this report, the Directors are not aware of any other significant event requiring disclosure that has taken place subsequent to 31 December 2022 and up to the date of approval of this report.

B. ENVIRONMENTAL POLICIES AND PERFORMANCE

The Group is dedicated to reduce its impacts to the environment from its factories and offices through mitigating the environmental pollutions and utilising resource efficiently. The Group strives to comply with related environmental laws and legislations, and continual improvement on its performance. Sales of Optical Fibres to Futong China Group

During the six years ended 31 December 2022, Transtech sold optical fibres to Futong China Group. Futong China is one of the controlling shareholders of the Company and Futong China Group means Futong China and its subsidiaries from time to time. Futong China Group mainly procured optical fibres from the Group for on-selling, with or without further processing, to customers in the PRC. The actual sales amount during the six years ended 31 December 2022 and the annual cap for each of FY2017 and FY2018 as set out in the written agreements entered into between Transtech and Futong China on 16 June 2017 (the "2017 Optical Fibre Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2019 as set out in the Optical Fibre Framework Sales Agreement dated 18 March 2019 (the "2019 Optical Fibre Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement"), the annual cap for FY2021 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement") and the annual cap for FY2022 as set out in the Framework Sales Agreement dated 28 July 2022 (the "2022 Optical Fibre Framework Sales Agreement") in relation to the sales of optical fibres to Futong China Group are set out below.

Listing Rules Implications

Given that the highest applicable percentage ratios in respect of the FY2022 annual cap for purpose of the Latest Optical Fibre Framework Sales Agreement dated 28 July 2022 is more than 0.1% and less than 5%, the transactions contemplated thereunder shall constitute partially-exempt continuing connected transactions under Rule 14A.76(2) of the Listing Rules and are subject to the annual review and disclosure requirements but are exempt from circular and Shareholders' approval requirement under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules. Reference could be made to the annuancement published on 28 July 2022.

(2) Non-fully Exempt Continuing Connected Transaction

Licensing of Premises from Futong Group International Limited ("Futong Group International")

During the six years ended 31 December 2022, Transtech operated from the premises located at 3 Dai Kwai Street, Tai Po Industrial Estate, Tai Po, New Territories, Hong Kong (the "Premises") which was leased by Futong Group International from Hong Kong Science and Technology Parks Corporation ("HKSTP"). Futong Group International was owned by Mr. Wang, the Controlling Shareholder, and Mr. He Xingfu ("Mr. He"), one of the executive Directors, as to 90% and 10%, respectively as at the Listing date. On 9 March 2018, Mr. He transferred all his shares to Mr. Wang, and Mr. Wang became the sole shareholder of Futong Group International at the same date. Therefore, Futong Group International is a connected person of the Group.

On 20 October 2016, a licence agreement was entered into between Transtech and Futong Group International in relation to the Premises ("Licence Agreement"). The term of the licence is five years, from 1 July 2016 to 30 June 2021.

On 7 July 2021, the Licence Agreement was renewed for a term of one year commencing on 1 July 2021 and terminating on 30 June 2022 (both days inclusive) ("FY2021 Licence Period"). On 4 July 2022, the Licence Agreement was renewed for a term of one year commencing on 1 July 2022 and terminating on 30 June 2023 (both days inclusive) ("FY2022 Licence Period"). During both the FY2021 Licence Period and FY2022 Licence Period, the licence fee payable by Transtech to Futong Group International is HK\$900,000.00 per month. Management Fee and maintenance charge (if any) payable under the lease in respect of the said premises will be paid by Futong Group International. On the other hand, Government Rent, Government Rates and other outgoings in respect of the said premises will be paid by Transtech. According to the two Licence Agreements, the licence fees are set out in the paragraph headed "Annual Caps" below.

Actual Transaction Value

For FY2017, FY2018, FY2019, FY2020, FY2021 and FY2022, Transtech has paid a sum of approximately HK\$10.8 million, HK\$11.9 million, HK\$11.9 million HK\$8.9 million, HK\$9.2 million and HK\$10.8 million respectively to Futong Group International, for its use of the Premises. For FY2020 and FY2021, Futong Group International waived three months rent in amount of HK\$2,970,000 and HK\$2,700,000 respectively to relieve the adverse impact from COVID-19.

Annual Caps

The Group intends to continue to use the premises after the Listing. The Group will pay licence fee (inclusive of the management and maintenance charge (if any) payable under the head lease between HKSTP and Futong Group International (the "Head Lease") but exclusive of the government rent, government rates and other outgoings) in relation to the Premises ("Licence Fee") to Futong Group International for licensing the Premises. The annual cap of the Licence Fee for each of the six years ending 31 December 2022 in relation to the licensing of the Premises are set out below.

As certain applicable percentage ratios (other than profits ratio) in respect of the transaction under the Licence Agreement is, on an annual basis, expected to be less than 5% and the annual consideration is more than HK\$3 million, the transaction contemplated under the Licence Agreement dated 4 July 2022 constitutes a Non-fully Exempt Continuing Connected Transaction of the Company subject to the reporting, announcement and annual review requirements, but are exempt from the circular and independent shareholders' approval requirements, pursuant to Rule 14A.76(2) of the Listing Rules.

Application for Waivers

Pursuant to Rule 20.103 of the GEM Listing Rules, our Directors have applied for, and the Stock Exchange has granted to us, a waiver from strict compliance with the announcement requirement under Rule 20.33 of the GEM Listing Rules (i.e. Rule 14A.35 of the Main Board Listing Rules) in respect of such Non-fully Exempt Continuing Connected Transaction, subject to the aggregate amount of each of the Non-fully Exempt Continuing Connected Transaction for each financial year not exceeding the relevant annual caps as stated above.

Annual Review

The independent non-executive Directors have reviewed the Continuing Connected Transactions conducted for the year ended 31 December 2022 and confirmed that such Continuing Connected Transactions were carried out in the ordinary and usual course of business of the Group, were on normal commercial terms and were in accordance with the relevant agreement on terms that are fair and reasonable and in the interests of the shareholders as a whole.

The Company's auditor was engaged to report on the Continuing Connected Transactions entered into by the Group in accordance with Hong Kong Standard on Assurance Engagements 3000 (Revised) "Assurance Engagements Other Than Audits or Reviews of Historical Financial Information" and with reference to Practice Note 740 "Auditor's Letter on Continuing Connected Transactions under the Hong Kong Listing Rules" issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Based on the results of the work performed, the auditor has issued a letter containing an unmodified conclusions in respect of the Continuing Connected Transactions in accordance with Rule 14A.56 of the Listing Rules in confirming that:

- a. Nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the Continuing Connected Transactions have not been approved by the Board;
- Nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the Non-exempt Continuing Connected Transactions were not, in all material respects, in accordance with the pricing policies of the Group;
- c. Nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the Continuing Connected Transactions were not entered into, in all material respects, in accordance with the relevant agreement governing the transaction; and
- d. Nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the aggregate amount of each of the Continuing Connected Transaction has exceeded the relevant annual cap disclosed in the Prospectus in respect of the Continuing Connected Transactions.

A letter of Independent Assurance Report from auditor on Continuing Connected Transactions was provided to the Stock Exchange on 4 April 2023.

The Company confirmed that the disclosure requirements for the Continuing Connected Transactions have been complied with in accordance with Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules.

The Audit Committee has reviewed the Continuing Connected Transactions conducted for the year ended 31 December 2022 and the letter from the auditor with conclusions in respect of the Continuing Connected Transactions set out above. On such basis, the Audit Committee was of the view that the Continuing Connected Transactions were carried out in compliance with Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules.

F. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

As the GEM Listing took place on 20 July 2017, part of the net proceeds from the Global Offering has been utilised by the Company during the six years ended 31 December 2022. The Company intends to utilise such net proceeds as disclosed in the "Future Plans and Use of Proceeds" section of the Prospectus.

Each of the committees of the Company has been established with written terms of reference.

The Board will conduct at least four regular meetings a year. The Directors can attend meetings in person or through other means of electronic communication in accordance with the Company's articles of association (the "Articles"). The chairman of the Board also meets with the independent non-executive Directors at least once a year without the presence of the executive Directors. Notices and agendas of regular Board meetings are served to all Directors at least 14 days before convening the Board meeting. All other schedules and the relevant information of each Board and committee meeting are generally made available to Directors or committee members at least three days in advance. The Board and each Director also have separate and independent access to the management whenever necessary.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD AND MANAGEMENT

The Board is responsible for leadership and control of the Group. The Board oversees the Group's business operation, strategic development and financial performance. Directors of the Board take decisions objectively in the interests of the Group. All board members have a broad range of valuable business experience and competence to contribute to the Board.

The Board delegates the authority and responsibility for implementing day-to-day operations, business strategies and management of the Group's business to the executive Directors, senior management and certain specific responsibilities to the Board Committees (as defined below).

Practice and Conduct of Meetings

Schedules and draft agenda of each meeting are normally made available to Directors in advance. At least 14 days' notice should be given for a regular Board meeting. For other Board and committee meetings, reasonable notices are generally given.

Minutes of all Board meetings recording sufficient details of matters considered and decisions reached are duly kept by the Company Secretary at the meetings and open for inspection by the Directors.

The Articles contain provisions requiring Directors to abstain from voting and not to be counted in the quorum at meetings for approving transactions in which such Directors or any of their close associates have a material interest.

Board papers together with all appropriate, complete and reliable information are sent to all Directors at least 3 days before each Board meeting or Audit Committee meeting to keep the Directors apprised of the latest developments and financial position of the Company and to enable them to make informed decisions.

Appointment and Re-election of Directors

According to Code provision A.4.1 of the CG Code, non-executive Directors shall be appointed for a specific term, subject to re-election. CG Code provision A.4.2 states that all Directors appointed to fill a casual vacancy shall be subject to election by shareholders at the first general meeting after appointment and that every Director, including those appointed for a specific term, shall be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years. Each of the Directors is appointed for a specific term of three years and is subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years. The Articles require that at each annual general meeting at least one-third of the Directors shall retire from office by rotation provided that every Director shall be subject to retirement at an annual general meeting at least once every three years.

In accordance with the Articles, Mr. Lau Siu Hang, Mr. Xu Jinjie and Mr. Yin Zhou shall retire from office, and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election at the forthcoming AGM.

DIRECTORS' CONTINUOUS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

According to Code provision A.6.5 of the CG Code, all Directors should participate in continuous professional development to develop and refresh their knowledge and skills to ensure that their contribution to the Board remains informed and relevant. Each newly appointed Director would receive an induction package covering the Group's businesses and the statutory and regulatory obligations of a director of a listed company.

All Directors have participated in continuous professional development and provided a record of training they received for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 to the Company.

The Company has also continuously updated the Directors on the latest developments regarding the Listing Rules and other applicable regulatory requirements, to ensure compliance and enhance their awareness of good corporate governance practices.

BOARD MEETING

The Board is committed to holding regular board meetings at least four times a year at approximately quarterly intervals. The Group establishes an effective communication among all the Directors.

Nomination Policy

The Board has adopted the nomination policy (the "Nomination Policy") which sets out the nomination criteria and procedures for the Company to select candidate(s) for possible inclusion in the Board. The Nomination Policy could assist the Company to achieve board diversity in the Company and enhance the effectiveness of the Board and its corporate governance standard.

When assessing the suitability of a candidate, factors such as the qualifications, skills, integrity and experience will be taken into consideration as a whole. In the case of independent non-executive Directors, they must further satisfy the independence criteria set out within Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. Since the selection of candidates should ensure that diversity remains a central feature of the Board, a range of diverse perspectives, including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, or professional experience would be considered.

The process to identify potential candidates for the Board would be as follows:

- 1. identifying potential candidates, including recommendations from the Board members, professional search firms and the shareholders of the Company;
- 2. evaluating the candidates based on the approved selection criteria through methods such as reviewing the resume and conducting the background checks;

OVERVIEW

Transtech Optelecom Science Holdings Limited (the "Company" together with its subsidiaries, hereinafter to as the "Group", "We" or "Us") is pleased to present the Environmental, Social and Governance ("ESG") report (the "Report") of the financial year 2022. The Report has been reviewed by the senior management and approved by the Board of the Directors (the "Board").

The Company owns two major operating subsidiaries, namely Transtech Optical Communication Company Limited ("Transtech") and Futong Group Communication Technology (Thailand) Co., Ltd. ("Futong Thailand") in Hong Kong and Thailand respectively. Transtech is principally engaged in the manufacturing and sales of optical fibres, and its production facilities are located in Hong Kong. Futong Thailand is principally engaged in the manufacturing and sales of optical fibre sales of optical fibre cables, optical cable cores and other related products, and its production facilities are located in Thailand.

The Group is committed with ESG concerns as we understand that all of us and our next generation could be affected by sustainability and ESG issues. Therefore, the Board has responsibility for evaluating and determining the Group's ESG-related risks, and ensuring that appropriate and effective ESG risk management and internal control systems are in place. It makes sense, therefore, that a strong ESG motion can create value. Under ESG, the environmental criteria, includes the energy efficiency our company takes in and the waste we discharges, the resource we needs, and also encompasses carbon emissions and climate change. The social criteria, addresses the relationships of our company has, gender diversity, labor relations, discrimination, health and safety. The governance, is how we control, implement and review our related internal systems, policies, action plans and related measures. It is vitally important on how our company adopts in order to govern itself and make effective decisions in order to comply with the relevant laws and regulations, and meet the needs of external stakeholders. We believe that our engagement in ESG will be highly beneficial to the strategic development on ESG and sustainability policies and make a better future.

Depends on our business nature, in order to deliver key performance in areas such as environmental, health and safety, these are accredited and constantly reviewed by various management systems with International Standards: ISO 9001:2015, ISO 14001:2015 and ISO 45001:2018.

The Board will continue to review and monitor the Group's ESG performance, and provide consistent, comparable and reliable ESG information annually.

BOARD'S OVERSIGHT

The board of directors of the Company (the "Board") has the overall responsibility for ensuring effectiveness of the Company's ESG strategy and reporting with an aim that the Group can operate its businesses in a responsible and sustainable manner. Our ESG processes and procedures focus on non-financial indicators that outline the Company's approach towards sustainability and has taken into account ESG-related issues covering different aspects including operations, legal and compliance, internal control, human resources, as well as marketing and communications. To reinforce the Board's ESG management approach and strategy as well as further enhance ESG governance, the Board has adopted an ESG Policy to handle all ESG-related matters.

Based on the recommendations from the senior management, the Board reviews the progress made towards achieving the ESG-related goals as well as effectiveness of the management approach and strategy.

SCOPE OF THE REPORT

The Group is committed to becoming a corporation with high level of social responsibility and strives to integrate corporate social responsibility into its business strategy and management approach. The Group continuously encourages environmental protection, energy-saving and promote environmental awareness among the Group, our community and employees. This Environment, Social and Governance Report ("ESG Report") has been prepared in accordance with the Environmental, Social and Governance Reporting Guide as set out in the Appendix 27 of the Listing Rules, and has complied with "comply or explain" provision in the Listing Rules. This ESG report, which covers the period from 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2022, aims to provide the Group's stakeholders with an overview of the Group's efforts regarding environmental, social and governance impacts arising from its daily operations. The Report is prepared in both Chinese and English and is available as part of this 2022 Annual Report on both the websites of the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "SEHK") (http://www.hkexnews.hk) and the Group (http://www.transtechoptel.com).

The four reporting principles, namely materiality, quantitative, balance and consistency, form the backbone of this report.

Materiality	The Group has evaluated the materiality and importance in ESG aspects through the following steps: (1) material ESG areas identification by industry benchmarking; (2) key ESG areas prioritisation with stakeholder engagement; and (3) validation and determining material ESG issues based on the results of communication among the management of the Company and the stakeholders. Engaging these steps can enhance the Group's understanding of the degree of importance and change of attention of its stakeholders to each significant ESG issue, and can enable the Group to plan its sustainable development direction more comprehensively in the future. Those important and material ESG areas identified during the materiality assessment were discussed in this ESG Report.
Quantitative	KPIs are disclosed in the ESG report so that stakeholders are able to have a comprehensive understanding of the Group's ESG performance. Information of the standards, methodologies, references, source of key emission and conversion factors used on these KPIs are stated wherever appropriate.

Any changes to the methods, KPI used, or any other relevant factors affecting a meaningful comparison shall be fully disclosed.

This ESG report mainly covers the Group's major operating activities, representing its business of plants in Hong Kong and Thailand, unless stated otherwise. The Group will continue to assess the major environmental, social and governance aspects of different businesses to determine whether it needs to be included in the environmental, social and governance reporting.

COMMUNICATION WITH STAKEHOLDERS

The Company understands that the solid support of stakeholders is crucial for the Company's long-term development. To improve communications with stakeholders, the Company has taken great efforts to establish effective communication channels. The Company has published the Environmental, Social and Governance report on the website for the convenience of all stakeholders. Meanwhile, the Company has also communicated with stakeholders regarding its vision and initiatives on the environmental, social and governance aspect through channels such as meetings, e-mails and service hotlines.

The Company understands the customer's expectations on product responsibility, and the government's supervision on clean energy and bulk commodities. At the same time, through understanding employees' concerns on occupational health and safety, training and development, and through communication with suppliers to understand their concerns with the Company's supply chain management policy, the Company has adopted a series of policies and measures in response to the demands of all parties.

A. ENVIRONMENTAL

A1. Emission

Renewable energy is today's emerging trend in mitigating global warming and reducing the emission of greenhouse gases. In response to the national clean energy policy, the Group have established the ISO 14001 environmental management system to provide societies with green, clean and sustainable energy supply.

The Group strictly abides by the environmental laws and regulations and industry standards in both Hong Kong and Thailand.

Our core energy business is fossil fuel power generation. Our operation process consumes mainly purchased electricity for daily operations of power stations, water resources for cleaning and maintenance. By stringent implementation of environmental standards, environmental protection measures as well as resources devoted to environmental education, we hope to raise the environmental awareness of our employees. Understanding that our natural resources are limited and precious, the Company has started its quest for energy-saving, resource-efficient and net-zero-emission operations, avoiding unnecessary wastage and over-consumption of natural resources.

The Group ensures that the control of air emissions meets the international emission requirements. During the Reporting Period, the Group's emissions of Nitrogen dioxide, Sulphur oxides and inhalable particulate matter were 148.85 kg, 0.72 kg and 13.43 kg, respectively. Due to the outbreak of the epidemic and the reduction of production in the factories, the production line and operations have been affected, resulting in a slightly decrease of some air pollutant emissions.

Throughout the Reporting Period, the Group's business operations contributed to Greenhouse Gas ("GHG") emissions of 4,887.35 tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent (" tCO_2 eq."), mainly carbon dioxide and nitrous oxide. The overall intensity of the GHG emissions of the Group was 0.15 tCO_2 eq./m2 (2021: 0.14) with reference to the total floor area of the Group's business operations, or 27.61 tCO_2 eq./employee (2021: 27.07) with reference to total number of employees. In view of the business nature of the Group as a high-tech product provider, a significant amount of purchased electricity was consumed for its daily operations which accounts for 97.43% (2021: 97.36%) of total GHG emission.

Pollutants Management

The Group's emissions are mainly saw dust, volatile organic compounds, boiler exhaust gas and vehicle exhaust gas. As related emissions are inevitable by-products of the Group's operations, employees and administrative personnel would strictly monitor the implementation of corresponding measures and policies to reduce the negative impacts on the environment. The person in charge of environmental issues will regularly review the implementation of measures and policies and report to the management. If an emergency occurs during the production period that causes problems with pollutants management, the person in charge would immediately take measures to avoid further expansion of the affected area and report to the management to establish improvement measures.

The Group gives high attention to the enforcement of all relevant environmental laws and regulations and ensures the compliance to these laws and regulations.

Wastes Management

The Group has carried out waste segregation processes to facilitate further waste management processes and ensure proper disposal complying with statutory and regulatory regulations. Measures have been taken to ensure proper handling of waste. We conduct staff training to ensure appropriate handling of waste and promote the sense of recycling. Moreover, the categories and amounts of waste disposed of are recorded in the waste disposal system for further analysis and audit trail. In FY2022, the major hazardous waste produced by the Group was non-halogenated solvents which amounted to 0.2 tonnes (2021:0.2 tonnes), as well as waste oil including printing ink and engine oil which amounted to 0.27 tonnes (2021: 0.27 tonnes). All of them were collected and handled according to the Waste Disposal Ordinance of Hong Kong and other relevant laws and requirements and were subsequently transported to qualified suppliers for disposal, thus preventing further pollution resulting from improper treatment.

Furthermore, the Group is committed to enhancing awareness of waste sorting and recycling among employees. Recycling bins have been placed in production and living areas to improve recycling rates of recyclable waste. Besides, offices and factories have been reminded to avoid printing single-sided paper for the purpose of paper utilisation.

Note 1: Given that there is lack of recycling service providers for scrapped optical fibres and glass rod in Hong Kong, the Group has not been able to undertake any recycling of scrapped optical fibres and glass rod in Hong Kong. However, we will devote effort to formulating recycling plans that are in line with the environment benefits.

Note 2: The Group has not been able to find out any qualified local wood recycling service providers so far and will continue to identify the capable recycling service providers so as to ensure proper treatment of the recycled wood.

A2. Use of Resources

The Group aims to minimise the resource consumption in its s plants and offices by promoting efficient use of resources. The Group emphasises on saving energy, water and materials in day to day operation. The Group also educates its employees and suppliers on their awareness of promoting a "green" environment.

In offices, the Group continues to promote paper-less working environment. Not only reducing the paper consumed in daily office operation, the paper-less working environment can also reduce printing cost, save physical space and facilitate information sharing via electronic documents. The Company also strongly recommends Shareholders to access its corporate communications through the websites of the Company or the Stock Exchange instead of printed documents. The quantity of printed materials has been significantly reduced by the use of electronic publication.

Resource Conservation

The Group emphasises the importance of maintaining sustainable development of the environment in its daily operation. The Group has adopted the following energy and water conservation measures in offices and plants:

Energy Conservation:

- To fully utilise natural lighting during the day time
- To switch off unnecessary lighting and idle electronic equipment
- To set electronic equipment such as computers, photocopier and air purifier, to energy-saving mode
- To set the air-conditioning temperature within a range of 23-25°C in order to save energy
- To install highly energy-efficient electronic equipment and consider its energy labels during the procurement process
- To carry out regular maintenance and cleaning solar panels to maximise power generation efficiency

Water Conservation:

- To examine the faucets and water dispensers for leakages on a regular basis
- To put up water-saving signs in the lavatories to remind employees to conserve water
- To educate and promote employees to use faucets with water conservation label at home

Resource Consumption

The energy and water consumption of the Group during the year ended 31 December 2022 and 31 December 2021 are as follows:

(a) Energy

The Group's operations involve different types of energy use, including non-renewable energy sources such as diesel and gasoline. At the same time, it would also purchase electricity from the third party to support the operation of network systems and other equipment and systems. To reduce the impact of daily operations on the environment, the Group has formulated relevant internal policies and measures such as "Regulations for Boiler Operation and Management" to achieve the goals of electricity saving and efficient resource consumption, as well as supervising the implementation of energy relevant policies and measures.

A3. The Environment and Natural Resources Environment and Natural Resource

The Group has set out a series of guidelines detailed environmental initiatives on energy and water use and promotes low carbon living, which in turn raises employees' awareness on carbon and waste reduction. The Group's business relies on natural resources in its packing materials, including forest resources. To reduce the actual or potential impacts brought by the operation to natural resources, the Group complies with relevant laws and regulation, and implement them into operations.

The Group is committed to reducing the impact of the production process and would also reject or terminate the cooperation with suppliers that cause significant impacts on forest resources to ensure the sustainability of resources.

(i) Packaging Materials and Material Consumption Control

The Group consumed 44.01 tonnes of optical fibre spools, 21.26 tonnes of cardboard boxes and 650.50 tonnes of wooden planks for the use of packaging materials in FY2022. The use of biodegradable and recyclable packaging materials has demonstrated our commitment to minimising unnecessary packaging materials. We have actively cooperated with customers and recyclers regarding the recycling and treatment of packaging materials such as cardboard boxes and optical fibre trays. During the Reporting Period, we recycled 0 tonnes (FY2021: 1.55 tonnes) of optical fibre trays (note: the trays were too broken for recycling) and 1.816 tonnes (FY2021: 3.65 tonnes) of paper boxes. We also consume papers in our office for our clerical work. To mitigate the environmental impacts of material consumptions, we implement the following practices in office and site projects:

- We purchase reusable products such as refillable pens and rechargeable batteries.
- We promote digitalization on clerical works by avoid faxes and unnecessary printing and photocopying to reduce the paper consumption.
- We avoid the use of materials that may lead to severe pollution or harmful impact on the Environment.

(ii) Noise Control

Our manufacturing process did not make much noise to the surrounding areas and we normally adhere to the regular production working at daytime and seldom have operation at night-time and any time on general holidays (including Sunday). Hence, our production complied with noise emissions standards.

(iii) Bio-diversity

We have no plan for factory expansion currently which poses threat to natural habitat and biodiversity. Our factories in Hong Kong and Thailand were well developed in the industrial clusters where we can reduce our negative impact to the environment and avoid bio-diversity damage. Also, we continuously invest in environmentally friendly manufacturing technologies and products in our existing manufacturing plants and the additional new plant in Thailand with an aim of conserving natural environment.

(iv) Sewage Management

In case of occurrence of sewage discharge, we would report it immediately and deploy applicable treatment to minimize contaminants before discharge. Although we do not generate significant sewage in our manufacturing operations, we still take the initiatives to comply with relevant laws and regulations by actively monitoring and preventing the possibility of generating sewage.

A4. Climate Change

Responses to Climate Change

Due to the extreme weather caused by global warming, combating climate change has become an important issue with global concern. Moreover, energy conservation and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions have become the top priority of enterprises.

The Group has taken climate change risks into account in risk assessment and management, and identified potential impact of extreme weather (e.g. Heavy raining, typhoon and reduction in sunlight) on the Group's business activities. Emergency plan has been established to deal with raining and typhoon matters to prevent the damage caused by extreme weather on business operations and employees lives.

Opportunities

On the other hand, climate change may bring opportunities to the Group. As climate change may lead to changes in preferences for sources of energies, it is a favourable opportunity for the Group to commit as an environmentally friendly energy user. Following this trend, the Group may consider to replace the existing fossil fuel powered vehicle by electric vehicle.

B. SOCIAL

B1. Employment

The Group regards employees as our most important asset. We always guarantee equal rights for each talent by establishing a fair, open, diverse and inclusive employment system. We adhere to the concept of joint development of employees and the Group, pay attention to the growth of our employees and create a positive and cohesive working environment to enhance their job satisfaction.

The Group strictly abides by the laws and regulations relating to labour in both Hong Kong and Thailand, we strictly follow the rules prohibiting the use of any child labour or forced labour.

We are committed to building a fair, open and inclusive employment system. The Group has developed and followed the equal opportunity policy with regular reviews on implementation. It is clearly stated in our culture that the employees' treatment in the Group is not affected by factors such as age, gender, race, nationality and marital status. In the future, we will continue to adhere to fair and equal employment policy, explore more attractive talent recruitment plans and encourage more talents from different backgrounds and regions to join us, enhancing the Group's multicultural and innovative capabilities.

The operation of the offices and plants in Hong Kong and Thailand had a total number of 177 employees as of 31 December 2022 (2021: 172 employees), of whom 100% were in full-time positions. The number of employees was similar to the previous reporting period. The tables below illustrate the detailed distribution of the workforce.

The Group complies with laws and regulations related to employment and labour standards, both in Hong Kong and Thailand. The Group understands that violating relevant laws and regulations will bring civil and/or criminal consequences to the Group, as well as negative effects to the operations and corporate reputation.

To the best of our Directors' knowledge, the Group was not aware of any significant non-compliance case in this regard during the Reporting Period.

B2. Health and Safety

During our operational management, we strictly adhere to industry-related laws and regulations of Hong Kong and Thailand. We uphold the managing principles of "make safety the first priority", and seek to reduce the chance of safety incidents, placing the health and safety of our employees as the utmost priority. We also formulated the internal Occupational Health and Safety policies in order to mitigate the occupational health and safety risks that may arise during production and operations.

The Group has established relevant measures to protect the personal safety of employees when they use steam and hot matters, such as conducting regular maintenance and inspections, placing equipment in restricted areas for employee, implementing automated operations, etc., to ensure that employees would not work in places with safety threats. At the same time, the Group hold no less than one emergency drill every year to ensure that all departments and employees understand the importance of safety and are familiar with emergency handling protocols. If an employee has an accident during work, the medical staff will immediately provide treatment to the injured employee or send the seriously injured one to the hospital for further treatment. The Group would subsequently investigate relevant departments and cases and adopt improvement measures to avoid recurrence.

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the Group had no work-related fatalities, and the number of lost work days due to major work-related injuries was nil. There were no major accidents, nor was any punishment imposed on us for serious violation of relevant laws and regulations regarding occupational health and safety in both Hong Kong and Thailand.

B3. Development and Training

While maintaining continuous improvement of our business, the Group also developed comprehensive training programs and systems for employees based on the talent development strategy and their personal interests. We aim to unleash the full potential of our employees and achieve collaborative development between employees and the Group.

The management is responsible for determining the training plan for the year, and the Human Resources Department will notice various department with the relevant arrangement to be implemented. The Group would also provide training to employees to fulfil the development needs of different departments and employees.

Under the guidance of different regulations and systems, the Group has established an integrated training system covering knowledge trainings, skills training, and attitude training. Different trainings are provided to employees to help them to understand different responsibilities and knowledge. They would receive different trainings according to different purposes. For instance, employees from production line would receive trainings on equipment operation and skill training to ensure that they understand the operation method to use the equipment safely. New employees would also receive induction training to understand the job content, daily operations of the group, etc., which can help them to engage in the working environment as soon as possible to perform their duties. In addition, the Group arranges team leaders, group leaders or experienced employees to guide the newcomers at work, emphasizing learning and growth through practice. Apart from providing internal training, employees can also participate in training activities provided by colleges and universities, industry management departments and government agencies entrusted by the Group. Employees with outstanding performance would be recommended to relevant colleges or institutions for training to enhance their working abilities and career development, which can provide assistance to the Group's operations. At the same time, the Group also encourages employees to participate in external training and obtain relevant professional qualifications by providing education benefits, which helps the Group and themselves to develop in an all-round way.

Employees can also take the initiative to propose written applications of job transfers based on their own development intentions and work abilities. After obtaining the approval of the department head, the Human Resources Department will evaluate and handle the applications in accordance with the employment approval procedures. Relevant transfers will be considered and respond to their applications based on factors such as employees' development intentions, abilities, and job vacancies.

B4. Labour Standards

The Group strictly abides by the labour laws and regulations, prohibiting the use of any child labour or forced labour. In the meantime, the Group also avoids engaging vendors and contractors which are already known to be employing child labour or forced labour in their operations. The Group has complied with the Employment of Children Regulations (Chapter 57B of the Laws of Hong Kong) under the Employment Ordinance (Chapter 57 of the Laws of Hong Kong), the Convention on the Abolition of Forced Labour with respect to Employment of Workers, the Labour Law of Hong Kong and Thailand under the working age and their Legal Rights and Interests and Provisions on the Prohibition of Child Labour in both Hong Kong and Thailand.

In practice, the Group strictly prohibits child labour and forced labour. During staff recruitment, the identity of potential employees would be strictly reviewed to ensure that they are qualified to work. The Group prohibits any form of forced labour or servitude and ensured that all employees are working on a voluntary basis.

During the reporting period, the Group had no violations involving child labor or forced labor.

B5. Supply Chain Management

The Group understands that to achieve sustainable development, one cannot rely on its own strength. It requires concerted efforts from various parties. When selecting a new supplier, the Group would evaluate factors such as the supplier's background information, reputation, quality of product or service, market price, delivery date and level of customer service. The Group would also review and evaluate existing suppliers annually and update the approved supplier list according to the evaluation results on a regular basis.

The Group has also conducted strict background investigations on its major suppliers to evaluate their environmental and social responsibility performance and keeps close communication to enhance both parties' awareness on sustainable development. The ESG-related risk in suppliers could be identified though supplier assessment process. The Group identifies and prioritizes the supplier with significantly less adverse environmental and social impacts. Our responsible team monitors and manages the performance and compliance of the suppliers to prevent and mitigate the ESG-related risk along the supply chain. Suppliers are encouraged to provide environmentally friendly alternatives for consideration. In addition, suppliers with management certification such as ISO 9001 Quality Management System certification, OHSAS 18001 Occupational Health and Safety Management system certification, ISO 14001 Environmental Management System certification and any related license and certification are more preferred.

During the Reporting Period, the Group had approximately a total of 72 (2021:27) major suppliers, all of which were from Mainland China, Hong Kong SAR, Japan, Thailand, India and Malaysia. Among them, 36 (2021:12) were suppliers of raw materials and 36 (2021:15) were suppliers of water, electricity and other materials.

B6. Product Responsibility

Product and service quality are the cornerstones for the long-term development of the Company. Products distributed through the trading of bulk commodities sector would be subjected to a series of testing and verification procedures before leaving the factory to ensure that the quality, performance, emission and safety levels are in compliance with the requirements. The suppler would be responsible for all liability and expenses in the event of any defects. The Company has made clear requirements to all sales staff members to provide accurate and genuine information to customers during sales, reflecting the Company's reputation, and its emphasis on long-term cooperation with customers.

The Group has established complaint handling process for responding all kinds of complaints in a timely manner. No customer complaint was identified in trading of bulk commodities sector during its reporting period. Also, amongst the products being sold and delivered, there was no incident of recall because of product's health and safety reason in trading of bulk commodities sector during the reporting period.

The Group promises not to use any pirated products, and has implemented control rights on the computer system to protect the stability of the system to minimize the risk of viruses. The Group attaches great importance to the protection of consumer information and privacy, and has managed customers' personal information in accordance with strict standards. No collected customer data would be used for promotional purposes without the consent of customers. The Group regularly reviews the security of the information storage system, protecting the security and stability of the information system through firewalls and management of Internet access to reduce the risk of personal information disclosure.

During the Reporting Period, the Group did not recall any products sold or shipped due to safety and health reasons. The Group will strive to maintain the quality of its products and provide customers with high-quality products. The Group complies with laws and regulations relevant to product responsibility, and understands that violating relevant laws and regulations will bring civil and/or criminal consequences to the Group, as well as negatively affect operations and corporate reputation. During the Reporting Period, the Group did not violate any laws and regulations related to product responsibility.

B7. Anti-corruption

The Group conscientiously applies the principles of business integrity and puts the employees' professional conduct in priority. We stringently comply with the laws, rules, and regulations set out by the regulatory authorities in regions that the Group operates. We constantly remind employees to uphold the high standard of ethics, be self-disciplined, and prohibit any illegal activities. In addition, anti-corruption training materials and practical guides are regularly provided for both employees and directors in order to raise awareness of anti-corruption among employees. The training involves laws and regulation regarding anti-corruption, guidance on properly managing conflict of interest and corruption prevention. Through the above training, our employee could be well informed of the related policy and their obligations.

The Group has established a comprehensive whistle-blowing mechanism together with a rigorous investigation and disciplinary mechanism. We encourage employees to report suspected misconduct, and punishment will be imposed on the relevant employees once the misconduct is confirmed

During the Reporting Period, we did not identify any cases of corruption or misconduct by our employees, nor did we receive any investigation report on relevant unlawful activities by the related law enforcement departments.

B8. Community Investment

It is the Group's aim to help the society to develop and giving back to the society in different ways are the basic social responsibilities of an enterprise. The Group ensures it has fulfilled its social responsibility by undertaking a number of activities.

During the Reporting Period, Transtech organized and participated in a variety of 4 activities. The Group reduced its community activities due to the outbreak of the pandemic COVID-19 in the year 2022, we wish some events will be resumed after the precaution measures are released in the foreseeable future.

Executive Directors

Mr. Hu Guoqiang (胡國強), aged 59, is an executive Director and Chairman of the Board. Mr. Hu joined the Group in April 2003 as a director of Transtech and is responsible for devising development strategies and business strategies for the Group. After joining the Group, Mr. Hu is principally responsible for devising development strategies and business strategies for the Group, Mr. Hu is currently a director and deputy/standing president of Futong Group Co., Ltd. ("Futong China"). Mr. Hu's role in Futong China and its subsidiaries from time to time ("Futong China Group") is mainly to coordinate with the joint venture partners of Futong China Group. Please refer to the section headed "Relationship with Controlling Shareholders — Management Independence" in the Prospectus.

Mr. Hu obtained a professional certificate in economic management from Zhejiang University of Technology (浙江工業 大學) in December 2000. Mr. Hu has approximately 15 years of experience in enterprise management and financial management. Between November 2015 and June 2017, Mr. Hu was a director of Zhejiang Futong Optical Fibre Technology Company Limited (浙江富通光纖技術有限公司) and was responsible for its corporate management. Zhejiang Futong Optical Fibre Technology Company Limited principally engages in research and development, production and sales of optical fibres preforms and optical fibres as well as technical support services.

Mr. He Xingfu (何興富), aged 63, is an executive Director and the chief executive officer of the Group. Mr. He joined the Group in April 2003 as a director and general manager of Transtech and is responsible for managing the daily operations and business development of our Group. Mr. He was the president of Futong Group (Hong Kong) Co., Ltd. ("Futong Group (Hong Kong)") and a director of Hong Kong Futong Optical Fibre Co., Ltd. ("Futong HK"), and he has resigned from such positions in these two companies upon Listing.

Prior to joining Futong China Group in 2001, Mr. He was engineer of the research department of the No. 46 Research Institute of China Electronics Technology Group Corporation (中國電子科技集團公司第四十六研究所) (formally known as No. 46 Research Institute of Ministry of Machine Building and Electronics Industry (機械電子工業部第46研究所)) from August 1982 to April 1989, where he mainly engaged in the research on the production technologies for optical fibres preforms and the drawing technologies of optical fibres. From January 1989 to June 1997, Mr. He was the head (manager) of the optical fibre factory of Shenzhen Guangtong Development Company Limited (深圳光通發展有限公司) and mainly managed the day-to-day operations and production technology of the optical fibre factory. From July 1997 to December 1998, Mr. He was the person in charge of technology for the Shenzhen SDGI Optical Fibre Co. Ltd (深圳市特發信息光纖 有限公司). Shenzhen SDGI Optical Fibre Co. Ltd is principally engaged in the manufacturing and sales of optical fibres. Subsequently from February 1999 to March 2001, Mr. He was the Area Sales Manager of Fiber Optic Product Line, Cables and Components Sector of Alcatel China Company Limited Shanghai Representative Office (阿爾卡特中國有限公 司上海代表處) and was mainly responsible for overseeing the sales operations of optical fibre products in the PRC. Alcatel China Company Limited Shanghai Representative Office is principally engaged in providing optics, voice and data communication systems for enterprises to mobile terminals. Mr. He also acted as the director of the FTTH Council Asia Pacific from May 2012 to May 2016, and as the Vice President and director of the same organisation from May 2015 to May 2016 subsequently.

Mr. Xu Jinjie (徐進捷), 33 years old, is an executive director. He has joined the Group in October 2020 and served as the acting general manager of its subsidiary, Futong Group Communication Technology (Thailand) Co., Ltd., in charge of the operations and business development in Thailand and other countries of the Association of Southeast Asia Nation (ASEAN). Mr. Xu got the bachelor degree in electronic information engineering from Ningbo Institute of Technology, Zhejiang University in June, 2012. He has about 9 years' experience in international marketing, customer development, overseas project investment and operation. In December 2017, he was awarded the "Outstanding Professional Awards at 30th Anniversary" of Futong Group Co., Ltd., (the "Funtong China"). Futong China and its subsidiaries are collectively referred to as "Futong China Group".

From May 2013 to March 2016, Mr. Xu served as the director assistant and sales manager of the European market in the international affairs department of Futong China, assisting the president to carry out investment survey, project operation and marketing. From April 2016 to March 2019, Mr. Xu successively served as the secretary of the board of directors of Futong China Group, and the assistant to the director of Chairman's (Hangzhou) Office, assisting the chairman in international affairs, communication and other appointed works. From April 2019 to September 2020, he served as the deputy general manager of Futong Group Import & Export Co., Ltd. and Jiaxing Futong International Technology Co., Ltd. responsible for market promotion and project operation in ASEAN countries. Mr. Xu has resigned all posts in Futong China Group before October 2022.

Mr. Xu was appointed as an executive Director and a member of nomination committee of the Board on 1 October 2022.

Mr. Pan Jinhua (潘金華), aged 58, is an executive Director. Mr. Pan joined the Group in February 2007 and is responsible for managing the investment activities of the Group. Mr. Pan has been a director of the Futong Thailand since August 2010.

Mr. Pan obtained the qualification of middle-level economist from the Agricultural Bank of China (Hangzhou Branch) in June 1989 and passed the examination for the Party and Administrative Cadres Basic Course organised by Zhejiang Higher Education Self-Study Examination Direction Committee (浙江省高等教育自學考試指導委員會) in March 1989. Mr. Pan has approximately 27 years of experience in corporate investment and corporate governance matters. Prior to joining the Group, Mr. Pan has been taking up the positions of the secretary to the Futong China Chairman's Office since February 2006, the head of the investment management department of Futong China since February 2007 and the head of investment department of Futong China since December 2012. Mr. Pan has resigned from such positions in Futong China upon Listing.

Mr. Pan resigned on 1 October 2022.

Mr. Yin Zhou (尹洲), aged 33, is an executive Director. Mr. Yin joined our Group in October 2022 and is responsible for the development of new markets and trade affair of our Group. Mr. Yin graduated from Zhejiang University of Technology and obtained a bachelor degree of English Language in June 2011. Mr. Yin has 10 years of experience in enterprise management, market development and sales operations. Prior to joining our Group, Mr. Yin took up the posts of the customer manager, claim manager and recover manager in the whole process of insurance business in China Export & Credit Insurance Corporation from July 2011 to September 2016. Between October 2016 and September 2022, Mr. Yin worked as the assistant to the president of the department of international business as well as the secretary to the director of Futong China. Mr. Yin has resigned all posts in Futong China Group before October 2022.

Mr. Yin was appointed as an executive Director and a member of remuneration committee of the Board on 1 October 2022.

Ms. Sun Jing (孫菁), aged 34, obtained a bachelor's degree in Japanese from Zhejiang University of Technology (浙江 工業大學) in June 2011. Ms. Sun has over eight years of experience in business management and human resources management. Prior to joining the Group, Ms. Sun served as the secretary of the chairman, the human resources management committee, the secretary-general and the senior deputy general manager of human resources department of Futong Group Co., Ltd.* (富通集團有限公司) from December 2012 to June 2021. She also served as the deputy general manager of Hangzhou Futong Hotel Management Co., Ltd.* (杭州富通旅業管理有限公司) from April 2016 to June 2021. From December 2020 to June 2021, she served as the legal representative, executive director and the general manager of Hangzhou Futong JinZhong Information Technology Co., Ltd.* (杭州富通金中信息技術有限公司). It is expected that Ms. Sun will be responsible for the human resources affairs of the Group.

Ms. Sun was appointed as an executive Director and a member of the remuneration committee of the Board on 1 July 2021 and resigned on 1 October 2022.

Mr. Ren Guodong (任國棟), aged 47, Mr. Ren joined the Group in October 2003 and is a senior management member of the Group, the operations manager and a director of Transtech Optical Communication Company Limited (高科橋光 通信有限公司) ("**Transtech**"). Mr. Leong was appointed as an executive director of Clifford Modern Living Holdings Limited, a listed company on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange (stock code: 3686), in December 2015, and he resigned as an executive director in December 2018. From December 2018 to February 2020, Mr. Leong worked as Group Financial Controller in Chairman's office, at Glorious Sun Holdings Limited. From February 2020 to November 2022, Mr. Leong has been working as Group Finance Director at Tricor Group.

Mr. Lau Siu Hang (劉少恒), aged 67, was appointed as an independent non-executive Director on 23 June 2017.

CORPORATE REORGANISATION AND SHARE OFFER

The Company was incorporated in the Cayman Islands as an exempted company with limited liability on 6 September 2016.

The Shares have been listed on the GEM of the Stock Exchange by way of the Global Offering on 20 July 2017 and transferred from GEM to Main Board on 5 November 2020.

In connection with the Listing, the companies comprising the Group underwent a reorganisation (the "Reorganisation"). Pursuant to the Reorganisation, the Company became the holding company of the other members of the Group on 7 October 2016. Further details of the Reorganisation are set out in the section headed "History and Development" of the Prospectus dated 30 June 2017 (the "Prospectus").

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Company is investment holding. The principal activities of its subsidiaries are set out in note 34 to the consolidated financial statements. The Group is principally engaged in the manufacturing and sale of optical fibre in Hong Kong and optical fibre cable, optical cable cores and related products in Thailand.

RESULTS AND APPROPRIATIONS

The Directors do not recommend the payment of any final dividend in respect of the year ended 31 December 2022.

In addition, each of the Controlling Shareholders has irrevocably and unconditionally, jointly and severally, provided the following undertakings to the Company under the Deed of Non-Competition:

- (i) with respect to any proposed sales of the Relevant Optical Communication Products to (a) authorised distributors or trading agents (which include all companies which on-sell or trade the Relevant Optical Communication Products of the Controlling Shareholders) or (b) manufacturers of the Relevant Optical Communication Products, (together, the "Restricted Customers"), the Controlling Shareholder shall include a clause in the relevant contract to be entered into between the Controlling Shareholder and such Restricted Customer(s), pursuant to which such Restricted Customer(s) shall not on-sell the Relevant Optical Communication Products purchased from the Controlling Shareholder, with or without further processing, to other customers in Hong Kong and ASEAN; and
- (ii) if prior to the sale of the Relevant Optical Communication Products to the Restricted Customer(s), the Controlling Shareholder has been informed by the Restricted Customer(s) or is aware that such Restricted Customer(s) intend(s) to on-sell the Relevant Optical Communication Products purchased from the Controlling Shareholder, with or without further processing, to other customers in Hong Kong and/or ASEAN, the Controlling Shareholder shall not engage in such sale and shall refer such new business opportunity to the Group.

Further, each of the Controlling Shareholders has irrevocably and unconditionally, jointly and severally, undertaken to the Company (for itself and on behalf of other members of the Group) that he/it will procure any new business investment or other business opportunity relating to the Controlling Shareholders' Restricted Business identified by or offered or made available to him/it and/or his/its close associates to be first referred to the Company.

OPINION

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of Transtech Optelecom Science Holdings Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as "the Group") set out on pages 74 to 136, which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at 31 December 2022, and the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, consolidated statement of changes in equity and consolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the consolidated financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Key audit matter

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

Impairment assessment of trade receivables

We identified the impairment assessment of trade receivables as a key audit matter due to the use of judgement and estimates by the management of the Group in the measurement of expected credit losses.

As at 31 December 2022, the carrying amount of trade receivable amounted to HK\$54,744,000, with net loss allowances amounted to HK\$59,491,000 recognised in profit or loss for the year.

As set out in notes 4 and 30 to the consolidated financial statements, loss allowance of trade receivables are determined based on lifetime expected credit losses. When measuring expected credit losses, the management of the Group uses individual assessment and have taken into account the internal credit ratings, the customers' repayment history and forward-looking information that is available without undue costs or effort.

Our procedures in relation to the impairment assessment of trade receivables included:

- Obtaining an understanding, and evaluated the applicable internal control relevant to management assessment of expected credit losses of trade receivables; and
- Assessing the reasonableness of the assumptions used in the individual assessment performed by the management of the Group, on a sample basis, based on internal credit ratings, credit loss experience and customers' repayment history that are reasonable and supportable and taking into consideration forward-looking information available without undue costs or effort, and evaluating whether the loss rates applied are appropriate.

OTHER INFORMATION

The directors of the Company are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, but does not include the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the Group to express an opinion on the consolidated financial statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the group audit. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, actions taken to eliminate threats or safeguards applied.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. 1. **GENERAL**

The Company was incorporated as an exempted company in the Cayman Islands with limited liability on 6 September 2016. The Company's shares were listed on Growth Enterprise Market ("GEM") of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "Stock Exchange") by way of global offering on 20 July 2017. Then, the Company successfully transferred its share listing from GEM to Main Board on 5 November 2020. Its immediate holding company is Hong Kong Futong Optical Fiber Company Limited ("Futong HK"), a private company incorporated in Hong Kong, and the directors of the Company consider that the ultimate holding company of the Company is Hangzhou Futong Investments Co., Ltd., a private company incorporated in the People's Republic of China ("PRC"). The addresses of the registered office and principal place of business of the Company are disclosed in the section headed "Corporate Information" in this annual report.

The Company is an investment holding company. Details of the principal activities of its subsidiaries are set out in note 34.

The consolidated financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars ("HK\$"), which is also the functional currency of the Company.

The impacts of application, if any, will be disclosed in the Group's future consolidated financial statements.

Amendments to HKAS 8 Definition of Accounting Estimates

The amendments define accounting estimates as "monetary amounts in financial statements that are subject to measurement uncertainty". An accounting policy may require items in financial statements to be measured in a way that involves measurement uncertainty — that is, the accounting policy may require such items to be measured at monetary amounts that cannot be observed directly and must instead be estimated. In such a case, an entity develops an accounting estimate to achieve the objective set out by the accounting policy. Developing accounting estimates involves the use of judgements or assumptions based on the latest available, reliable information.

In addition, the concept of changes in accounting estimates in HKAS 8 is retained with additional clarifications.

The application of the amendments is not expected to have significant impact on the Group's consolidated financial statements.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation of consolidated financial statements

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA. For the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements, information is considered material if such information is reasonably expected to influence decisions made by primary users. In addition, the consolidated financial statements include applicable disclosures required by the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the Stock Exchange ("Listing Rules") and by the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

The directors of the Company have, at the time of approving the consolidated financial statements, a reasonable expectation that the Group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the consolidated financial statements.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Significant accounting policies

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Company and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Company:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date when the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring their accounting policies in line with the Group's accounting policies.

All intragroup assets, liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED) Significant accounting policies (Continued)

Revenue from contracts with customers

The Group recognises revenue when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, i.e. when "control" of the goods underlying the particular performance obligation is transferred to the customer.

A performance obligation represents a goods (or a bundle of goods) that is distinct or a series of distinct goods that are substantially the same.

Control is transferred over time and revenue is recognised over time by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the relevant performance obligation if one of the following criteria is met:

- the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the Group's performance as the Group performs;
- the Group's performance creates or enhances an asset that the customer controls as the Group performs; or
- the Group's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

Otherwise, revenue is recognised at a point in time when the customer obtains control of the distinct good.

A contract liability represents the Group's obligation to transfer goods to a customer for which the Group has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer.

Revenue from contracts with customers (Continued)

Over time revenue recognition: measurement of progress towards complete satisfaction of a performance obligation

Output method

The progress towards complete satisfaction of a performance obligation is measured based on output method, which is to recognize revenue on the basis of direct measurements of the value of the goods or services transferred to the customer to date relative to the remaining goods or services promised under the contract, that best depict the Group's performance in transferring control of goods or services.

As a practical expedient, if the Group has a right to consideration in an amount that corresponds directly with the value of the Group's performance completed to date, the Group recognizes revenue in the amount to which the Group has the right to invoice.

Existence of significant financing component

In determining the transaction price, the Group adjusts the promised amount of consideration for the effects of the time value of money if the timing of payments agreed (either explicitly or implicitly) provides the customer or the Group with a significant benefit of financing the transfer of goods or services to the customer. In those circumstances, the contract contains a significant financing component. A significant financing component may exist regardless of whether the promise of financing is explicitly stated in the contract or implied by the payment terms agreed to by the parties to the contract.

For contracts where the period between payment and transfer of the associated goods or services is less than one year, the Group applies the practical expedient of not adjusting the transaction price for any significant financing component.

Leases

Definition of a lease

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

For contracts entered into or modified on or after the date of initial application of HKFRS 16, the Group assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease based on the definition under HKFRS 16 at inception, modification date or acquisition date, as appropriate. Such contract will not be reassessed unless the terms and conditions of the contract are subsequently changed.

The Group as a lessee

Allocation of consideration to components of a contract

For a contract that contains a lease component and one or more additional lease or non-lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative standalone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components.

The Group applies practical expedient not to separate non-lease components from lease component, and instead account for the lease component and any associated non-lease components as a single lease component.

Short-term leases

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to leases of properties that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option. Lease payments on short-term leases are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis or another systematic basis over the lease term.

The cost of right-of-use asset includes:

- the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability;
- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received; and
- any initial direct costs incurred by the Group.

Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of its estimated useful life and the lease term.

The Group presents right-of-use assets as a separate line item on the consolidated statement of financial position.

Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of a lease, the Group recognises and measures the lease liability at the present value of lease payments that are unpaid at that date. In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses the incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date if the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable.

The lease payments include fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable.

After the commencement date, lease liabilities are adjusted by interest accretion and lease payments.

The Group presents lease liabilities as a separate line item on the consolidated statement of financial position.

Lease modifications

Except for Covid-19-related rent concessions in which the Group applied the practical expedient, the Group accounts for a lease modification as a separate lease if:

- the modification increases the scope of the lease by adding the right to use one or more underlying assets; and
- the consideration for the leases increases by an amount commensurate with the stand-alone price for the increase in scope and any appropriate adjustments to that stand-alone price to reflect the circumstances of the particular contract.

For a lease modification that is not accounted for as a separate lease, the Group remeasures the lease liability, less any lease incentives receivable, based on the lease term of the modified lease by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate at the effective date of the modification.

The Group accounts for the remeasurement of lease liabilities by making corresponding adjustments to the relevant right-of-use asset.

When the modified contract contains one or more additional lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the modified contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component. The associated non-lease components are included in the respective lease components.

Covid-19-related rent concessions

In relation to rent concessions that occurred as a direct consequence of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Group has elected to apply the practical expedient not to assess whether the change is a lease modification if all of the following conditions are met:

- the change in lease payments results in revised consideration for the lease that is substantially the same as, or less than, the consideration for the lease immediately preceding the change;
- any reduction in lease payments affects only payments originally due on or before 30 June 2022; and
- there is no substantive change to other terms and conditions of the lease.

A lessee applying the practical expedient accounts for changes in lease payments resulting from rent concessions the same way it would account for the changes applying HKFRS 16 if the changes are not a lease modification. Forgiveness or waiver of lease payments are accounted for as variable lease payments. The related lease liabilities are adjusted to reflect the amounts forgiven or waived with a corresponding adjustment recognised in the profit or loss in the period in which the event occurs.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment including buildings held for use in the production or supply of goods, or for administrative purposes (other than freehold land and construction in progress as described below) are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Property, plant and equipment in the course of construction for production, supply or administrative purposes are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Costs include any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management, including costs of testing whether the related assets is functioning properly and, for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalised in accordance with the Group's accounting policy. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other property assets, commences when the assets are ready for their intended use.

Freehold land and construction in progress are not depreciated and is measure at cost, less subsequent accumulated impairment loss.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost of assets other than freehold land and construction in progress less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives, residual value and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment on property, plant and equipment and right-of-use assets

At the end of the reporting period, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its property, plant and equipment and right-of-use assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the relevant asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any.

The recoverable amount of property, plant and equipment and right-of-use assets are estimated individually. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an asset individually, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, corporate assets are allocated to the relevant cash-generating unit when a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be established, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash-generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be established. The recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units to which the corporate asset belongs, and is compared with the carrying amount of the relevant cash-generating unit or group of cash-generating units.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset (or a cash-generating unit) for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or a cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. For corporate assets or portion of corporate assets which cannot be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis to a cash-generating unit, the Group compares the carrying amount of a group of cash-generating units, including the carrying amounts of the corporate assets or portion of corporate assets or portion of corporate assets allocated to that group of cash-generating units, with the recoverable amount of the group of cash-generating units. In allocating the impairment loss, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill (if applicable) and then to the other assets on a pro-rata basis based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit or the group of cash-generating units. The carrying amount of an asset is not reduced below the highest of its fair value less costs of disposal (if measurable), its value in use (if determinable) and zero. The amount of the impairment loss that would otherwise have been allocated to the asset is allocated pro rata to the other assets of the unit or the group of cash-generating units. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or a cash-generating unit or a group of cash-generating units) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents presented on the consolidated statement of financial position include:

- (a) cash, which comprises of cash on hand and demand deposits, excluding bank balances that are subject to regulatory restrictions that result in such balances no longer meeting the definition of cash; and
- (b) cash equivalents, which comprises of short-term (generally with original maturity of three months or less), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. Cash equivalents are held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments rather than for investment or other purposes.

For the purposes of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs of inventories are determined on the first-in, first-out method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price for inventories less all estimated costs of completion and costs necessary to make the sale. Costs necessary to make the sale include incremental costs directly attributable to the sale and non-incremental costs which the Group must incur to make the sale.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when a group entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value except for trade receivables arising from contracts with customers which are initially measured in accordance with HKFRS 15 *Revenue from Contract with Customers* ("HKFRS 15"). Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset or financial liability, and of allocating interest income and interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts and payments (including all fees or points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial asset or financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Financial assets that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for financial assets measured subsequently at amortised cost. Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired (see below). For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset from the next reporting period. If the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset from the beginning of the reporting period following the determination that the asset is no longer credit-impaired.

Impairment of financial assets subject to impairment assessment under HKFRS 9 Financial Instruments ("HKFRS 9")

The Group performs impairment assessment under expected credit loss ("ECL") model on financial assets (including trade and bill receivables, deposits and other receivables and bank balances) which are subject to impairment assessment under HKFRS 9. The amount of ECL is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition.

Lifetime ECL represents the ECL that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of the relevant instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL ("12m ECL") represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date. Assessment is done based on the Group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current conditions at the reporting date as well as the forecast of future conditions.

The Group always recognises lifetime ECL for trade and bill receivables without significant financing component. The ECL on trade and bill receivables are assessed on individual basis.

For all other instruments, the Group measures the loss allowance equal to 12m ECL, unless when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, in which case the Group recognises lifetime ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition.

Impairment of financial assets

(i) Significant increase in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the Group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether credit risk has increased significantly:

- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the financial instrument's external (if available) or internal credit rating;
- significant deterioration in external market indicators of credit risk, e.g. a significant increase in the credit spread, the credit default swap prices for the debtor;
- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor;
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the Group presumes that the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

The Group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

(ii) Definition of default

For internal credit risk management, the Group considers an event of default occurs when information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the debtor is unlikely to pay its creditors, including the Group, in full (without taking into account any collaterals held by the Group).

(iii) Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events of default that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that financial asset have occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes observable data about the following events:

- (a) significant financial difficulty of the issuer or the borrower;
- (b) a breach of contract, such as a default or past due event;
- (c) the lender(s) of the borrower, for economic or contractual reasons relating to the borrower's financial difficulty, having granted to the borrower a concession(s) that the lender(s) would not otherwise consider; or
- (d) it is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation.

(iv) Write-off policy

The Group writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the counterparty is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, for example, when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings, or in the case of trade receivables, when the amounts are over 2 years past due, whichever occurs sooner. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the Group's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. A write-off constitutes a derecognition event. Any subsequent recoveries are recognised in profit or loss.

(V) Measurement and recognition of ECL

The measurement of ECL is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based on historical data and forward-looking information. Estimation of ECL reflects an unbiased and probability-weighted amount that is determined with the respective risks of default occurring as the weights.

Generally, the ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Group in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at the effective interest rate determined at initial recognition.

Interest income is calculated based on the gross carrying amount of the financial asset unless the financial asset is credit-impaired, in which case interest income is calculated based on amortised cost of the financial asset.

The Group recognises an impairment loss or reversal of impairment loss in profit or loss for all financial instruments by adjusting their carrying amount, with the exception of trade and bill receivables where the corresponding adjustment is recognised through a loss allowance account.

Derecognition of financial assets

The Group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of a group entity after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the Company are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Financial liabilities at amortised cost

Financial liabilities including trade payables, other payables and bank and other borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

Non-current assets held for sale

Non-current assets are classified as held for sale if their carrying amount will be recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use. This condition is regarded as met only when the asset is available for immediate sale in its present condition subject only to terms that are usual and customary for sales of such asset and its sale is highly probable. Management must be committed to the sale, which should be expected to qualify for recognition as a completed sale within one year from the date of classification.

Non-current assets classified as held for sale are measured at the lower of their previous carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell.

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle that obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (where the effect of the time value of money is material).

Government grants

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants related to income that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable. Such grants are presented under "other income".

Retirement benefit costs

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are recognised as an expense when employees have rendered service entitling them to the contributions.

Short-term and other long-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are recognised at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid as and when employees rendered the services. All short-term employee benefits are recognised as an expense unless another HKFRS requires or permits the inclusion of the benefit in the cost of an asset.

A liability is recognised for benefits accruing to employees (such as wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave) after deducting any amount already paid.

Liabilities recognised in respect of other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows expected to be made by the Group in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Any changes in the liabilities' carrying amounts resulting from service cost, interest and remeasurements are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that another HKFRS requires or permits their inclusion in the cost of an asset.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED) Significant accounting policies (Continued) Taxation

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from loss before taxation because of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period which the liability is settled or the asset is realised, based on tax rate (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax for leasing transactions in which the Group recognises the right-ofuse assets and the related lease liabilities, the Group first determines whether the tax deductions are attributable to the right-of-use assets or the lease liabilities.

For leasing transactions in which the tax deductions are attributable to the lease liabilities, the Group applies HKAS 12 *Income Taxes* requirements to right-of-use assets and lease liabilities separately. Temporary differences on initial recognition of relevant right-of-use assets and lease liabilities are not recognised due to application of the initial recognition exemption. Temporary differences arising from subsequent revision to the carrying amounts of right-of-use assets and lease liabilities and lease modifications, that are not subject to initial recognition exemption are recognised on the date of remeasurement or modification.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied to the same taxable entity by the same taxation authority.

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss.

Foreign currencies

In preparing the financial statements of each individual group entity, transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of that entity (foreign currencies) are recognised at the rates of exchanges prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At the end of the reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on the retranslation of monetary items, are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

For the purposes of presenting the consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations are translated into the presentation currency of the Group (i.e. HK\$) using exchange rates prevailing at the end of each reporting period. Income and expenses items are translated at the average exchange rates for the period, unless exchange rates fluctuate significantly during that period, in which case the exchange rates at the date of transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity under the heading of foreign exchange reserve.

Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

4. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Group's accounting policies, which are described in Note 3, management is required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of each reporting period that may have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets within the next financial year.

Impairment assessment for trade receivables

The Group uses individual assessment to assess impairment and calculate ECL for trade receivables. The provision rates are based on internal credit ratings, credit loss experience, and customers' repayment history that are reasonable and supportable and taking into consideration forward-looking information available without undue costs or effort. At every reporting date, the historical observed default rates are reassessed and changes in the forward-looking information are considered.

In respect of the credit-impaired trade receivables amounted to HK\$166,196,000 as at 31 December 2022 (2021: HK\$124,655,000), the Group has taken follow-up actions to recover the overdue trade receivables. Subsequent to the end of the reporting period, the management took further actions to proactively follow up with these debtors for the settlement of the overdue accounts receivables and negotiated for a revised repayment schedule and/or any collateral or other credit enhancements from these debtors. Despite of continuous follow-up actions, only certain debtors agreed to sign a revised repayment schedule with the Group. However, the Group was not able to obtain any credit enhancements from these debtors and no subsequent settlement from these debtors was noted. In addition, without further information came to the attention of the management about the financial ability of these debtors to settle the overdue trade receivables, management is of the opinion that such overdue trade receivables were credit impaired, the chance of collecting the outstanding balances from these debtors is remote. As a result, the Group recognised full allowance for these credit-impaired trade receivables as at 31 December 2022.

(ii) Performance obligations for contracts with customers

The Group manufactures and sells the optical fibre cables, optical fibres, optical cable cores and other related products to customers.

For manufacturing and sales of the optical fibre cables, optical fibre, optical cable cores and other related products to the customers, revenue is recognised when control of the goods has transferred, being when the goods have been shipped to the customers' specific location ("Delivery").

When the Group receives a deposit before the production activity commences, this will give rise to contract liabilities at the start of a contract, until the revenue recognised on the relevant contract exceeds the amount of the deposit. The Group typically receives a 20%–30% (2021: 15%–50%) deposit depending on the contract terms.

Following the Delivery, the customers have full discretion over the manner of distribution and price to sell the goods, have the primary responsibility when on selling the goods and bear the risks of obsolescence and loss in relation to the goods. The normal credit term is 14 to 360 days (2021: 0 to 365 days) upon delivery.

(iii) Transaction price allocated to the remaining performance obligation for contracts with customers

The transaction price allocated to the remaining performance obligations (unsatisfied or partially unsatisfied) as at 31 December 2022 and 2021 and the expected timing of recognising revenue are as follows:

No Corporate Income tax has been provided within the Exemption Period; and (ii) the 50% exemption from payment of corporate income tax during the period from 1 March 2021 to 28 February 2025 ("50% Exemption Period"), 50% Corporate Income Tax has been provided by the direct application of Corporate Income Tax rate to the profit before tax of management account during the "50% Exemption Period".

Limits and scoring attributed to customers are reviewed regularly. Other monitoring procedures are in place to ensure that follow-up action is taken to recover overdue debts. In addition, the Group performs individual impairment assessment under ECL model on trade balances.

The Group has concentration of credit risk with exposure limited to certain major customers. Trade and bill receivables from the largest customers and top three customers amounting to HK\$14,361,000 and HK\$30,470,000 (2021: HK\$88,053,000 and HK\$129,994,000), in aggregate, comprised approximately 25% and 54% (2021: 48% and 71%) of the Group's trade and bill receivables as at 31 December 2022. The management closely monitors the subsequent settlement of the customers.

For other receivables, the Group performs individual impairment assessment under ECL model on other receivables with gross carrying amount of HK\$10,763,000 (2021: Nil), the Group measures the loss allowance at lifetime ECL, in view of the past repayment history, subsequent settlement or recent evidences for default payments, the Group has provided HK\$10,654,000 (2021: Nil) allowance for credit losses (lifetime (credit-impaired)) on the related other receivables during the year ended 31 December 2022.

The Group is required to make annual contributions to the Workmen's Compensation Fund and monthly contributions to the Social Security Fund, and the only obligation of the Group with respect to these funds is to make the required contributions.
