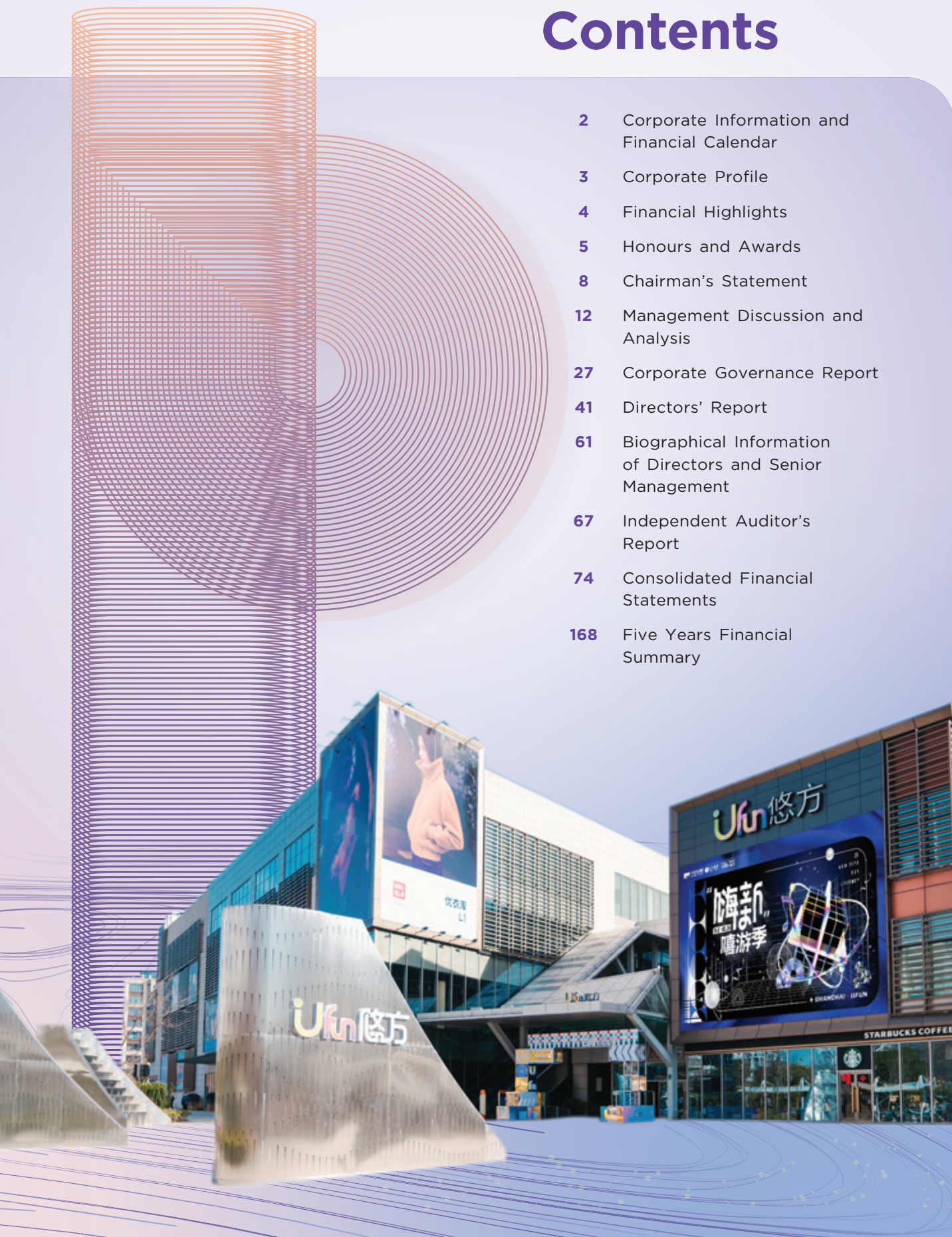

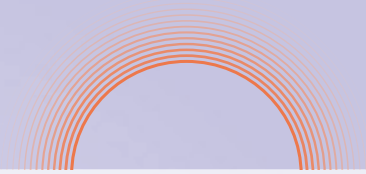

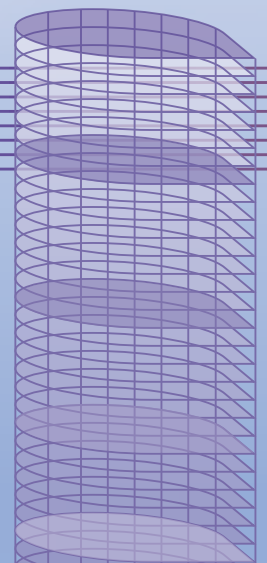

Corporate Profile

The history of KWG Living Group Holdings Limited (the “**Company**”, together with its subsidiaries, collectively the “**Group**”, “**we**”, “**us**” or “**our**”) can be traced back to 2004. Its shares (the “**Shares**”) were listed (the “**Listing**”) on the Main Board of The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the “**Stock Exchange**”) (stock code: 3913) on 30 October 2020 (the “**Listing Date**”).

The Group is a leading full-scale smart service operator in the People’s Republic of China (“**PRC**” or “**China**”). Leveraging over 20 years of professional operation, the Group has achieved in-depth coverage across diversified businesses, with service scenarios covering residence, office buildings, shopping malls, hotels, institutions, schools, hospitals, industrial parks, public buildings

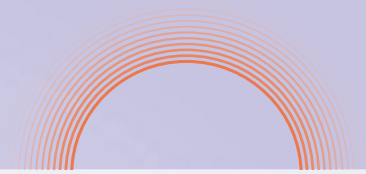
and city services. The Group has long been dedicated to deepening its presence in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area and the Yangtze River Delta region, continuously consolidating its regional leading advantages, while steadily expanding into core cities of the Bohai Economic Rim and Midwest China to enhance its market coverage and business share on a continuous basis.

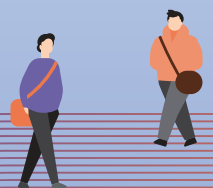

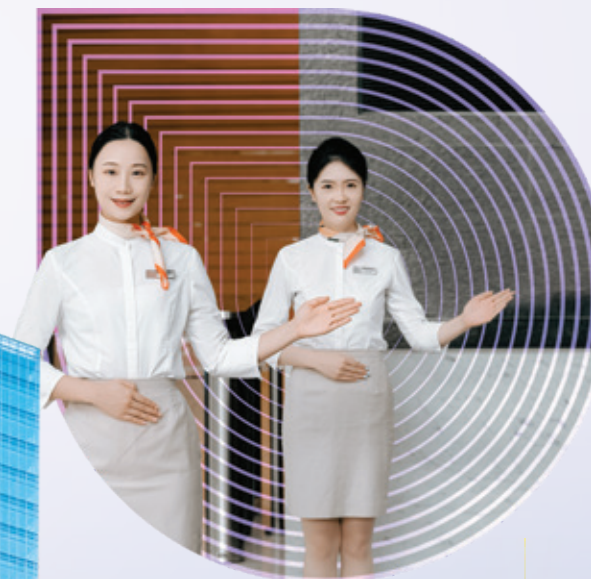

Chairman's Statement

We will continue to advance the service capability of business diversity in cities, focus on constructing economic ecology with partners, and stress on the continuous optimisation of customer service experience. By providing customers with a more “Intelligent and Pleasant” experience, the Company will move from full business coverage to full ecological operation, creating sustainable value for its shareholders.



Dear Shareholders,

Thanks for your continued support for the Group's development. I am pleased to present the business review and outlook of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2025.

2025 was a critical year for China's economy to advance in-depth structural reforms and seek high-quality development. It also marked a key phase in the transformation of the property service industry towards quality, professionalism and marketisation. The 15th Five-Year Plan explicitly outline policy guidance for improving the quality of housing and property services. The market and customers are placing higher demands on the professional capabilities, refined management, and diverse supply of property services. In response, property service enterprises are continuously striving for improvement and innovation in areas such as service upgrades, cost control, and capacity optimisation to actively adapt to market changes.

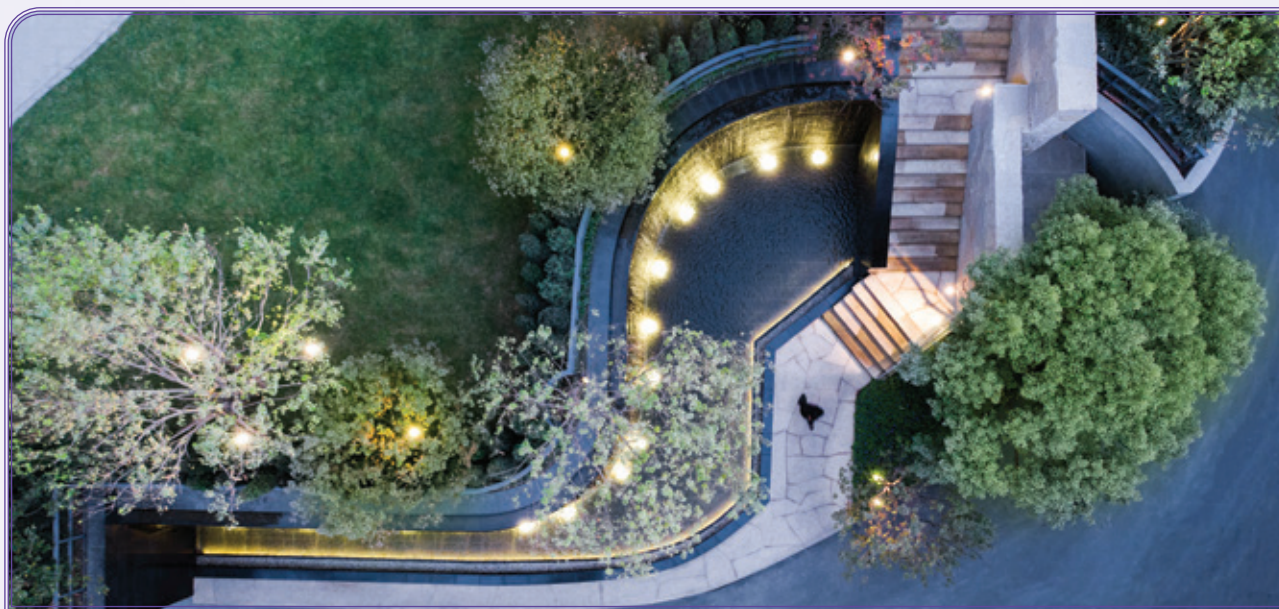
In 2025, amid industry restructuring and market challenges, the Group steadfastly implemented the "effectiveness-first" strategy by focusing on market-oriented development, consolidating its core businesses, upgrading service quality, and enhancing operational efficiency. Nevertheless, due to multiple factors including the industrial conditions, the Group's operating results came under pressure for the year. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group achieved a revenue of approximately Renminbi ("RMB") 3,329.9 million, representing a year-on-year decline. It recorded a net loss of approximately RMB316.3 million, reducing the loss by approximately RMB242.4 million compared to the previous year, and the extent of loss was effectively narrowed. At the same time, the Group has always adhered to the baseline of service quality and the principle of precise cost control, and its core profitability indicators remained relatively stable. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group achieved gross profit of approximately RMB829.4 million with gross profit margin maintaining at approximately 24.9%.



1. Deeply engaging in regions and independent development

The 2025 Central Urban Work Conference (2025 年中央城市工作會議) further specified the national regional development layout, and promoted the development of modern urban clusters and metropolitan areas, which further clarifies the direction for high-quality development in the industry. Adhering to a strategy of "focusing on core regions", the Group has highly aligned with the national development framework. Through deepening its presence in higher-tier cities, the Group steadily consolidated its operational advantages and service barriers in these core regions. Currently, the industry remains in a period of adjustment with certain challenges in the operations. Steadfast commitment to market-driven and independent development has become the key for enterprises to navigate economic cycles and achieve sustainable development. The Group stays committed to the path of market-driven and independent development, continuously enhancing its capabilities in third-party expansion and service delivery. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the proportion of revenue from third-party





steadily increased, which has become a core pillar for counteracting the pressure on the industry and supporting the Group's robust development.

2. Enhancing commercial services to empower synergistic growth

Leveraging years of experience and core competencies in commercial operation, the Group adheres to the philosophy of mutual growth and prosperity with tenants, closely aligning with their operational needs to build a full-cycle commercial operation system. Aiming at converting customer traffic and enhancing operational quality, it contributes to regional consumption and the prosperity of commercial districts. During the year ended 31 December 2025, sales and customer traffic at various commercial projects of the Group increased, while property fee collection rates continued to improve, demonstrating the solid foundation and robust resilience of the commercial operational services segment. In the high-end commercial and office sector, the Group has provided specialised, integrated, and scenario-based operational services tailored to the core businesses of tenant companies. This approach has curbed operating costs, enhanced operational efficiency, and enabled tenants to focus on their core businesses. Additionally, the Group has actively fostered a high-quality business

environment, established platforms for corporate exchange and collaboration, integrated resources, and refined the supporting facilities to promote synergy among various parties, thereby creating a mutually beneficial and win-win ecosystem for commercial and office buildings.

3. Laying a solid foundation for healthy development by stabilising the volume of existing properties and optimising growth

Currently, residents' demand for high-quality property services is continuously increasing, and the industry has entered an important development stage of parallel in-depth presence of existing properties and expansion of additional properties. Facing the profound changes in the industry landscape, the Group adheres to seeking progress while maintaining stability, and persistently implementing the dual-wheel driven development strategy. Taking the robust operation of existing properties as its core ballast, the Group adheres to the principle of stability first, quality and efficiency priority, and takes service quality-oriented. By focusing on the refinement of basic services, prompt responses to customer demands, and a diverse range of customised

services, and establishment of multi-channel communication mechanisms, the Group has continuously improved its refined operation systems and consolidated its fundamental business operations. In terms of expansion of newly added properties, the Group has aligned with the industrial trend toward high-quality development by establishing a full-cycle management system and deepening its diversified business portfolio. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group successfully expanded into new sectors such as headquarters of gaming companies and airports, and secured contracts for several landmark public construction projects worth tens of millions of Renminbi. These achievements have showcased the Group's professional strengths and brand influence, providing strong momentum for its sustainable development.

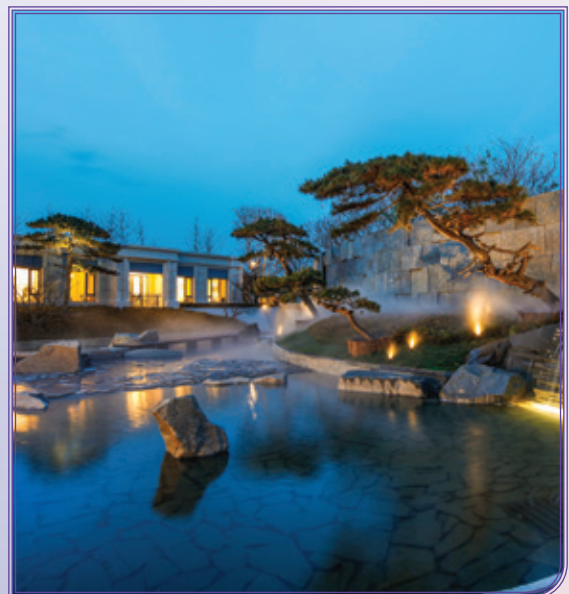
4. Optimising organisational structure, improving operational quality and efficiency

Efficient organisational operations are a key pillar of the Company's high-quality corporate development. The Group remains committed to enhancing management and boosting operational efficiency, continuously optimising its governance system and strengthening the synergies across the organisation. In terms of structures, a new Supply Chain Management Center has been established to consolidate supplier resources through centralised management, expand the scope of centralised procurement, effectively curb operating costs, and solidly foster operational resilience. In terms of service standardisation, the Group has refined the operational procedures by leveraging scenario-based standards and full-process norms, while establishing an integrated online and offline training mechanism. Additionally, by focusing on customer needs, it has strengthened the talent pool, expanded service offerings, and enhanced the professionalism of frontline service staff, thereby providing strong support for cost reduction, efficiency enhancement, and quality upgrades.

5. Future Outlook

In the future, the continuous implementation of standardised industry norms for property services on the policy side, and the increasingly prominent demands for diversified and personalised property services from customers on the demand side, will further accelerate the differentiation of the industry. Meanwhile, the continuous release of domestic consumption demand and the in-depth exploration of the operational value of the existing assets will become the key growth points driving macroeconomic development, and will also breed new opportunities for the transformation and development of the property service industry.

Amid a rapidly evolving landscape, opportunities continue to emerge alongside challenges. I would like to express my gratitude for the long-term trust and support of all the shareholders of the Company (the "**Shareholder(s)**"), the joint efforts and close collaboration of all partners, and the hard work and dedication of all employees. In 2026, the Group will continue to take professional services as the key focus and quality operations as the foundation of development, forge operating resilience in the wave of deep industry transformation, and seize new opportunities as the first mover in market development. We remain committed to working closely with all stakeholders to embrace a high-quality and sustainable future.

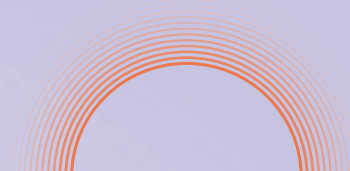




Management Discussion and Analysis







Business Review

In 2025, the property management industry in the PRC remained in a phase of profound adjustment. Under the combined effects of multiple factors including the shrinking growth opportunities, intensifying industry competition, and the continuous upgrading of public demand for “quality housing and quality services”, the industry as a whole demonstrated a trend of low-speed growth. In the face of a complex external business environment, the Group, on the basis of adhering to the high-quality operation of existing businesses and ensuring the renewal of key projects, has continuously reviewed its existing business layout, resolutely exited inefficient projects, and adopted a prudent expansion strategy for incremental businesses. At the same time, the Group simultaneously promoted the optimisation of its organisational structure, deepened measures to reduce costs and increase efficiency, fully leveraged its core advantages in business layout and in-depth regional development, and continued to enhance its brand value, striving to achieve high-quality development during the industry adjustment period.

Ongoing Pressure from Industry Adjustment

Amid continued pressure in the PRC real estate industry, the property management industry has entered a critical phase of transformation and development. Affected by the slowdown in the real estate development, the demand for both early-stage property involvement and value-added services decreased. For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group’s residential property management services segment reported revenue of approximately RMB1,675.2 million, representing a year-on-year decrease of 5.3%. Despite the weaker demand for early-stage businesses, the Group has remained committed to delivering high-quality services for core residential property management. By further refining the management level of fundamental services such as cleaning, security, and maintenance, the Group effectively maintained property owner satisfaction and the collection rate of in-service projects, thereby consolidating the foundation of its core businesses.

Strategic Focus on Certain Businesses

Amid the trend of ongoing domestic economic adjustment, the businesses in the urban services sector were affected by price competition in the market and the prolonged collection cycle, with the profitability of projects continuing to be squeezed. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group continued to implement its strategic focus strategy by proactively reducing inefficient resource input. At the same time, it conducted a risk re-assessment of certain public property projects to optimise the efficiency of project portfolio and resource allocation. For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group’s non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment recorded revenue of approximately RMB1,654.7 million, down 8.3% year-on-year. The Group will continue to focus on the well-selected markets in the non-residential sector with a value-oriented approach to ensure resources are mainly deployed to projects with lower risks and of higher quality. Meanwhile, the Group will also push forward business structure optimisation to achieve long-term sustainable value growth.

Impacts of Impairment of Certain Assets

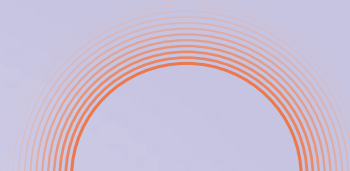
- (i) For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group recorded impairment provisions for trade receivables of approximately RMB393.2 million. This was primarily due to the ongoing downturn of the real estate market in the PRC, and the significant changes in the market environment, including weakened demand and downward pressure on housing prices, which brought challenges to the overall business environment and resulted in a slowdown in the pace of recovering trade receivables owed to the Group. Accordingly, the Company prudently assessed the amount of impairment provisions made for trade receivables and made appropriate accounting estimates.
- (ii) For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group derecognised certain deferred tax assets and had an increase in deductible temporary differences not recognised as deferred tax assets for certain subsidiaries, which led to an increase in income tax expenses of approximately RMB184.6 million. This was mainly due to the ongoing pressure from the macroeconomic environment, as the Group expects that these subsidiaries will not have sufficient taxable profits in future periods to utilise the benefits of the deductible temporary differences;
- (iii) For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group recorded impairment losses on goodwill and property, plant and equipment of approximately RMB83.8 million and RMB29.0 million, respectively. This was mainly because certain contracts of subsidiaries acquired by the Group in prior periods were not renewed due to intense market competition. The expansion of these subsidiaries' new customer base fell short of expectations, which, together with increased costs arising from service quality improvements, led to a decline in their revenue and operating profit. Despite the decrease in operating profit, these subsidiaries still recorded a net operating profit for the year ended 31 December 2025.

Further Improvement in Independence

For the year ended 31 December 2025, among the total revenue realised by the Group, revenue from independent third parties accounted for approximately 90.6%, representing an increase of approximately 2.0 percentage points as compared to 2024. In recent years, the Group gradually reduced its reliance on the business of a single related-party customer and focused on expanding its business development in independent markets. As such, revenue from independent third parties accounted for 63.1%, 78.6%, 82.9%, 88.6% and 90.6% in 2021, 2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025, respectively, demonstrating a momentum of year-on-year growth. The Group has been committed to enhancing its brand influence and market competitiveness. With the enhancement of brand recognition and comprehensive service capabilities, the Group will continue to focus on core city clusters, strengthen its differentiated competitive advantages, and build a sustainable and independent operating model.

Reducing Cost and Increasing Efficiency to Optimise Operation

The Group has made efforts across multiple dimensions including organisational structure, management processes, technology application, and resource integration to comprehensively enhance operational efficiency. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the administrative expenses of the Group declined by 9.2% year-on-year. In terms of labor costs, the Group continuously optimised its organisational structure, adopted a flat management and a cross-departmental position-sharing model, streamlined intermediate levels, and improved per capita management efficiency. In terms of technology application, the deeper adoption of intelligent inspection, remote monitoring and business-finance integrated systems has effectively reduced repetitive manual work and cut internal communication costs. In the procurement aspect, the Group further integrated procurement channels and strengthened its centralised procurement mechanism, thereby controlling material consumption costs while ensuring service quality.



Unwavering Dedication to Long-term and Sustainable Growth

Achieving customer satisfaction has always been the fundamental goal of the Group. Refined operations, enhanced life-cycle and element-based management, digitalisation and talent cultivation mechanisms will all promote structural optimisation and service empowerment, and drive long-term value creation. Looking forward, the Group will be guided by the goal of enhancing operational quality. While ensuring the commercial value and long-term sustainability of our projects, such goal will drive the shift of our business structure from scale-driven to value-driven, so as to consolidate the foundation for sustainable growth.

Business Model

The Group's revenue is primarily derived from two major business segments: (i) residential property management services; and (ii) non-residential property management and commercial operational services.

Residential Property Management Services

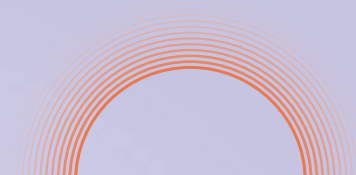
The Group provides residential property management services and introduces various services to meet the needs of living scenarios for households and residents living in the communities, including:

- pre-sale management services: providing pre-sale management services to property developers in their pre-sale activities, including cleaning, security and maintenance services for pre-sale display units and sales offices. The Group charges a fixed service fee for such services;
- property management services: providing property management services such as cleaning, security, gardening and repair and maintenance services to (i) property developers (for the undelivered portion of the properties); and (ii) property owners, property owners' associations or residents (for sold and delivered properties). The Group collects property management fees for such services; and
- community value-added services: such as (i) home-living services — integrating industrial and ecological resources to match the personalised needs of owners and providing diverse services; (ii) property agency services — providing property agency services to property owners, residents and property developers; and (iii) common area value-added services — aimed at providing daily living convenience for property owners and residents, and leveraging community space to enhance their sense of well-being. The Group typically charges a commission-based fee or a fixed fee depending on the nature of services rendered.

Non-residential Property Management and Commercial Operational Services

The Group manages and operates a diversified portfolio of non-residential properties, provides property management and commercial operational services to commercial properties such as shopping malls, office buildings and industrial parks, and provides property management services to schools, hospitals, government authorities and other public properties. The Group's services include:

- pre-sale management services: providing pre-sale management services to property developers, such as cleaning, security and maintenance services for pre-sale display units and sales offices. The Group charges a fixed service fee for such services;
- property management services: providing services such as file management, cleaning, security, gardening and repair and maintenance services to property owners or tenants. The Group charges property management fees for such services;
 - property management services for commercial properties: the Group charges property management fees for property management services provided to commercial properties (including shopping malls and office buildings);
 - public property services and urban services: the Group charges management fees for property management services provided to public properties (including schools, hospitals, government authorities, industrial parks, transportation hubs, etc.) and for urban cleaning services provided to urban spaces (including urban roads, rivers, etc.);
- commercial operational services: providing services such as preliminary planning and consultancy services, tenancy sourcing services, tenancy management services and marketing and promotion services to property owners and property developers. The Group typically charges (i) a commission-based fee with respect to the operation of shopping malls; (ii) a profit mark-up on top of the costs with respect to the operation of office buildings; and (iii) a fixed service fee on a per square metre basis for its preliminary planning and consultancy services and tenancy sourcing services; and
- other value-added services: such as providing common area value-added services. The Group typically charges a commission-based fee or a fixed fee depending on the nature of services rendered.

Residential Property Management Services

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group's revenue from the residential property management services segment decreased by 5.3% year-on-year to approximately RMB1,675.2 million from approximately RMB1,769.2 million for the year ended 31 December 2024. The revenue decrease was primarily due to the pressure on the real estate market, which led to a decrease in the number of residential property sales offices under the Group's management and a decrease in revenue from community value-added services in the residential segment. Nonetheless, benefiting from the Group's consistent adherence to fundamental service quality, the revenue from property management services of the residential property segment for 2025 was approximately RMB1,466.9 million, representing a year-on-year increase of approximately 0.2%.

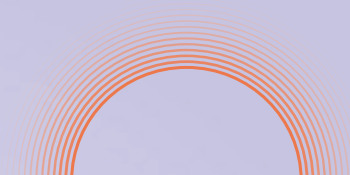
Although the Group's revenue from the residential property management services segment was affected by the pressure on the real estate market, such as the decrease in revenue from pre-sale management services and value-added services, the Group consistently focused on core regions and continuously pushed forward its strategy of in-depth layout in economically developed regions. The revenue distribution of the residential segment across the four regions remained basically stable, among which the proportion of revenue from the Greater Bay Area and the Yangtze River Delta region reached 57.1%.

Non-residential Property Management and Commercial Operational Services

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group's revenue from non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment decreased by approximately 8.3% year-on-year to approximately RMB1,654.7 million from approximately RMB1,804.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2024. The decrease was primarily due to the fact that the Group had carried out a strategic contraction in light of the pressure on profitability and changes in the market environment encountered by the urban services business, by adopting a more prudent approach to commencing business in regions facing fiscal pressure and selecting for evaluating market opportunities in the public property and urban services sector.

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the regional distribution of the revenue from the non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment remained basically stable. Among which, the decrease in revenue from the Greater Bay Area was mainly due to the strategic contraction of the urban services business and the adjustment of commercial terms from gross to net basis for certain property project management service contracts. The decrease in revenue from Midwest China and Hainan was mainly due to the adjustment of commercial terms from gross to net basis for certain property project management service contracts.

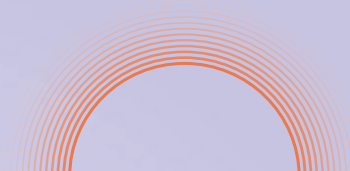

Pre-sale Management Services

Revenue generated from pre-sale management services under the Group's residential property management services segment decreased from approximately RMB82.5 million in 2024 to approximately RMB68.1 million in 2025. Such decrease was primarily due to the decrease in the number of sales offices of residential properties under the Group's management, as a result of the continuous downturn of the real estate market in the PRC.

Property Management Services

Revenue generated from property management services under the Group's residential property management services segment slightly increased from approximately RMB1,464.5 million in 2024 to approximately RMB1,466.9 million in 2025. Such increase was primarily due to the increase in the Group's gross floor area under management for residential properties during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Community Value-added Services

Revenue generated from community value-added services under the Group's residential property management services segment decreased from approximately RMB222.1 million in 2024 to approximately RMB140.2 million in 2025. Such decrease was primarily due to decline in revenue from second-hand leasing and sales services under the challenging market conditions and decreasing demand from non-property owners for value-added services.

Pre-sale Management Services

Revenue generated from pre-sale management services under the Group's non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment decreased from approximately RMB22.1 million in 2024 to approximately RMB10.5 million in 2025. Such decrease was primarily due to the decrease in the number of sales offices of non-residential properties under the Group's management during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Property Management Services

Revenue generated from property management services under the Group's non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment decreased from approximately RMB1,621.2 million in 2024 to approximately RMB1,487.5 million in 2025. Such decrease was primarily due to the strategic contraction of the urban services business during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Commercial Operational Services

Revenue generated from commercial operational services under the Group's non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment decreased from approximately RMB55.9 million in 2024 to approximately RMB52.8 million in 2025. Such decrease was primarily due to the lower demand from the Group's customers for commercial operational services.

Other Value-added Services

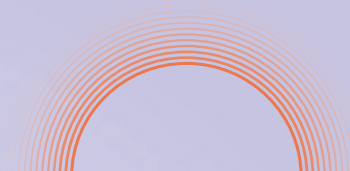
Revenue generated from other value-added services under the Group's non-residential property management and commercial operational services segment slightly decreased from approximately RMB105.1 million in 2024 to approximately RMB103.9 million in 2025.

Cost of Sales

The Group's cost of sales represents costs and expenses directly attributable to the provision of its services, which comprises (i) labor costs; (ii) subcontracting costs; (iii) utilities costs; (iv) office expenses; (v) cleaning expenses; (vi) rent and management fees for staff dormitory and car parks; (vii) security expenses; and (viii) others. For the year ended 31 December 2025, the total cost of sales of the Group was approximately RMB2,500.4 million, which was decreased by approximately RMB190.4 million or 7.1% as compared to approximately RMB2,690.8 million for the year ended 31 December 2024. Such decrease is generally in line with the decline in revenue of the Group during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Gross Profit and Gross Profit Margin

As a result of the foregoing, during the year ended 31 December 2025, the gross profit of the Group decreased by approximately RMB53.3 million or 6.0% to approximately RMB829.4 million in 2025 from approximately RMB882.7 million in 2024. The Group reported gross profit margin of 24.9% for the year ended 31 December 2025 (2024: 24.7%).



Other Income and Gains

The other income and gains of the Group decreased by approximately RMB101.8 million or 83.9% to approximately RMB19.5 million in 2025 from approximately RMB121.3 million in 2024, and mainly comprised government grants, tax incentives on value-added tax and late penalty income of approximately RMB5.8 million, RMB4.2 million and RMB3.4 million, respectively. Such decrease was primarily due to the provision for compensation on profit guarantee in relation to acquisition made in prior years in accordance with the terms of the relevant agreements of approximately RMB96.5 million in 2024, which was absent in 2025.

Administrative Expenses

Administrative expenses mainly consist of (i) salaries and allowances for the Group's administrative and management personnel; (ii) depreciation and amortisation costs; and (iii) office expenses. For the year ended 31 December 2025, the administrative expenses of the Group were approximately RMB428.3 million, which decreased by approximately RMB43.3 million or 9.2% as compared to approximately RMB471.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2024. Such decrease was primarily due to the decrease in amortisation costs in 2025 in relation to certain intangible assets generated from business combinations in previous years, which had been fully amortised or impaired in 2024. In addition, the decrease in administrative expenses also reflected the Group's continuous improvement in management efficiency.

Other Expenses, Net

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the other expenses of the Group was approximately RMB543.1 million, representing a decrease of 48.3% from approximately RMB1,050.0 million for the year ended 31 December 2024, and mainly comprised impairment losses on trade receivables of approximately RMB393.2 million, impairment losses on goodwill of approximately RMB83.8 million and impairment losses on property, plant and equipment of approximately RMB29.0 million. After taking into consideration of the credit risk and market environment, the Group recorded appropriate impairment provisions for trade receivables in view of the slow pace of recovery of trade receivables during the year ended 31 December 2025. In addition, the impairment losses on goodwill and property, plant and equipment recognised by the Group primarily stemmed from intense market competition, resulting in the non-renewal of certain contracts by subsidiaries acquired in previous years and the expansion of new customer base falling short of expectations. The decrease in other expenses was primarily due to a decrease in impairment losses on goodwill of the Group of approximately RMB546.2 million from approximately RMB630.0 million in 2024 to approximately RMB83.8 million in 2025.

Income Tax Expenses

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the income tax expenses of the Group was approximately RMB167.0 million, which increased by approximately RMB157.3 million as compared to approximately RMB9.7 million for the year ended 31 December 2024. Such increase was primarily due to the derecognition of previously recognised deferred tax assets and the increase in deductible temporary differences not recognised as deferred tax assets for certain subsidiaries of the Group in 2025, which led to an increase in income tax expenses of approximately RMB184.6 million for the year ended 31 December 2025. Based on the current challenging market environment and the existing operational arrangements, the Group expects that such subsidiaries will not have sufficient taxable profits in future periods to utilise the benefits of the deductible temporary differences.

Net Loss

As a result of the foregoing, the Group recorded a net loss of approximately RMB316.3 million for the year ended 31 December 2025 (2024: approximately RMB558.7 million).

Financial Position and Capital Structure

Total Assets, Total Liabilities and Current Ratio

As at 31 December 2025, the total assets of the Group was approximately RMB5,976.0 million (as at 31 December 2024: approximately RMB6,184.5 million), and the total liabilities was approximately RMB3,182.6 million (as at 31 December 2024: approximately RMB3,042.4 million). As at 31 December 2025, the current ratio of the Group was 1.67 (as at 31 December 2024: 1.84).

Cash and Cash Equivalents

As at 31 December 2025, the Group's cash and cash equivalents amounted to approximately RMB1,219.2 million, representing an increase of approximately 6.4% as compared with approximately RMB1,145.6 million as at 31 December 2024. Such increase was primarily due to the recovery of certain historical trade receivables during the year ended 31 December 2025. All of the Group's cash and cash equivalents were denominated in RMB except for approximately RMB0.4 million which were denominated in Hong Kong dollars ("HK\$") and United States dollars.

Borrowings and Charges on the Group's Assets

As at 31 December 2025, the Group's total borrowings were approximately RMB414.3 million (as at 31 December 2024: approximately RMB524.1 million). Amongst which, approximately RMB140.3 million will be repayable within 1 year and approximately RMB274.0 million will be repayable between 2 and 4 years. The Group's bank and other borrowings were secured by trade receivables, other receivables and property, plant and equipment of the Group with total carrying value of approximately RMB55.7 million, and equity interest of a subsidiary of the Group. All the Group's bank and other borrowings were denominated in RMB. All of the Group's bank and other borrowings were charged at floating interest rates except for loan balance of approximately RMB10.1 million which were charged at fixed interest rates of 6.82% to 8.21% per annum as at 31 December 2025.

Trade Receivables

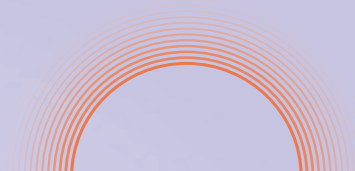
The Group's trade receivables mainly represent receivables from residential property management services and non-residential property management and commercial operational services. The Group's trade receivables as at 31 December 2025 amounted to approximately RMB2,742.3 million, representing a decrease of approximately RMB41.3 million or 1.5% as compared to approximately RMB2,783.6 million as at 31 December 2024. Due to the continuous downturn of the external environment during the year ended 31 December 2025, the pace of recovery of trade receivables continued to be slow. At the same time, the Group had made appropriate impairment provisions during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Trade Payables

The Group's trade payables as at 31 December 2025 amounted to approximately RMB684.7 million, representing an increase of approximately RMB75.7 million or 12.4% as compared to approximately RMB609.0 million as at 31 December 2024. In order to improve the efficiency of working capital, the Group continuously negotiated with certain third-party suppliers to extend the term of payment, resulting in an increase in trade payables as at 31 December 2025.

Gearing Ratio

The Group's gearing ratio is calculated by dividing the net debt (total debt net of cash and cash equivalents and restricted cash) by total equity. As the Group was in a net cash position as at 31 December 2025 and 2024, the gearing ratio was not applicable to the Group.



Contingent Liabilities

As at 31 December 2025 and 2024, the Group did not have any material contingent liabilities.

Foreign Exchange Risk

The Group mainly operates in the PRC and most of its operations are denominated in RMB. The Group will closely monitor the fluctuations of the RMB exchange rate and give prudent consideration as to entering into currency swap arrangement as and when appropriate for hedging corresponding risks. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Group had not engaged in hedging activities for managing foreign exchange rate risk.

Corporate Governance

The Group is committed to maintaining high standards of corporate governance to safeguard the interests of the Shareholders and to enhance corporate value and accountability. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Company has applied the principles of good corporate governance and complied with the code provisions as set out in the Corporate Governance Code contained in Part 2 to Appendix C1 (the “**CG Code**”) to the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the “**Listing Rules**”), save for the deviation for reasons set out below. The Company will continue to review and monitor its corporate governance practices to ensure the compliance of the CG Code.

The CG Code stipulates that independent non-executive directors and other non-executive directors should attend general meetings and code provision F.2.2 of the CG Code stipulates that the chairman of the board (the “**Board**”) of directors (the “**Director(s)**”) of the Company (the “**Chairman**”) should attend the annual general meeting. Mr. KONG Jianmin, a non-executive Director and the Chairman, was unable to attend the annual general meeting of the Company convened and held on 3 June 2025, due to his other engagements. In the absence of Mr. KONG Jianmin from the annual general meeting, Mr. KONG Jiannan, an executive Director, acted as the chairman of the annual general meeting to ensure an effective communication with the Shareholders. Mr. KONG Jianmin has also followed up with Mr. KONG Jiannan for any opinions or concerns of the Shareholders expressed at the annual general meeting afterwards.

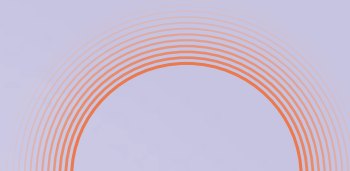
Corporate Culture

The Board leads to establishing the corporate culture and acts with integrity, leads by example, and is committed to promoting the desired corporate culture of the Company. The Company’s corporate culture instils all levels of the Group and continually reinforces the philosophy of “acting lawfully, ethically and responsibly”, as well as aligns with the Company’s mission, corporate values and strategies.

Model Code for Securities Transactions

The Company has adopted the Model Code for Securities Transactions by Directors of Listed Issuers as set out in Appendix C3 to the Listing Rules (the “**Model Code**”) as its own code of conduct regarding securities transactions of the Directors. In response to specific enquiry made by the Company, all Directors have confirmed that they have complied with the Model Code during the year ended 31 December 2025. No incident of non-compliance with the Model Code by the Company’s relevant employees have been noted for the year ended 31 December 2025 after making reasonable enquiry.



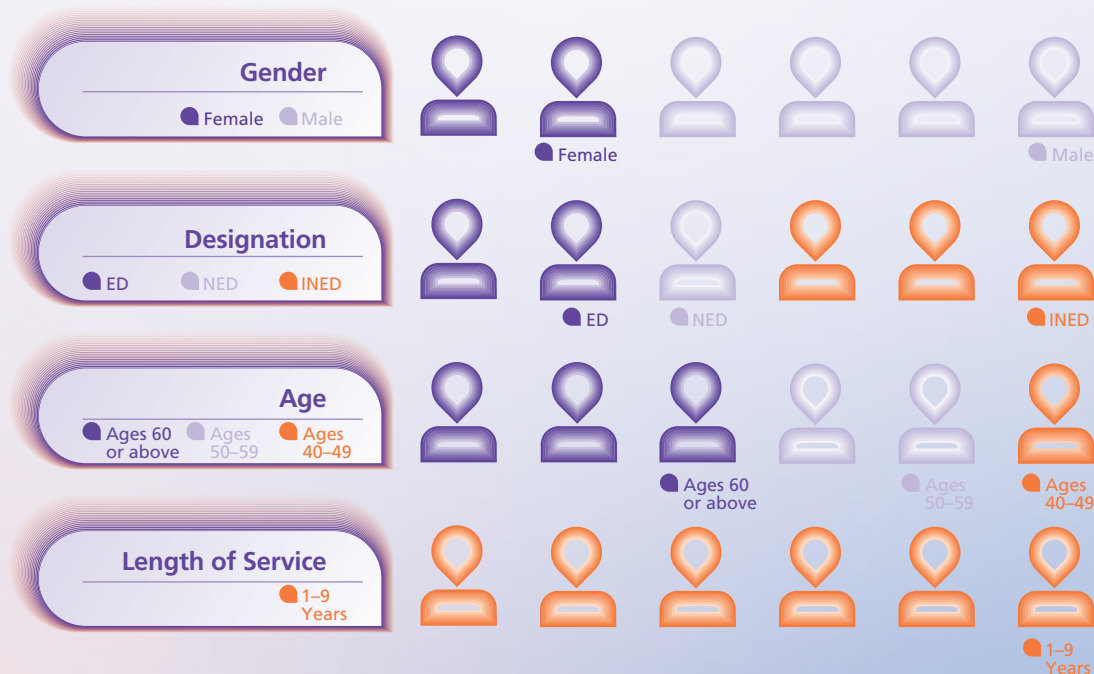
Board of Directors

The Board is in charge of the task of maximising the financial performance of the Company and making decisions in the best interest of the Company. The Board is also responsible for formulating business policies and strategies, directing and supervising management of the Group, adopting and monitoring internal business and management control, approving and monitoring annual budgets and business plans, reviewing operational and financial performance, considering dividend policy, reviewing and monitoring the Company's systems of financial control and risk management. The Board has delegated the day-to-day management, administration and operation of the Group and implementation and execution of Board policies and strategies to the Executive Directors and management of the Company. All Directors have full and timely access to all relevant information in relation to the Group's businesses and affairs as well as unrestricted access to the advice and services of the Company Secretary.

Board Composition

During the year ended 31 December 2025 and up to the date of this annual report, the Board comprises Mr. KONG Jianmin (*Chairman*) as Non-executive Director; Mr. KONG Jiannan and Mr. CHEN Wende as Executive Directors; and Ms. LIU Xiaolan, Mr. FUNG Che Wai, Anthony and Ms. NG Yi Kum as Independent Non-executive Directors. Messrs. KONG Jianmin and KONG Jiannan are brothers. Save as disclosed above, there is no family or other material relationship among the members of the Board.

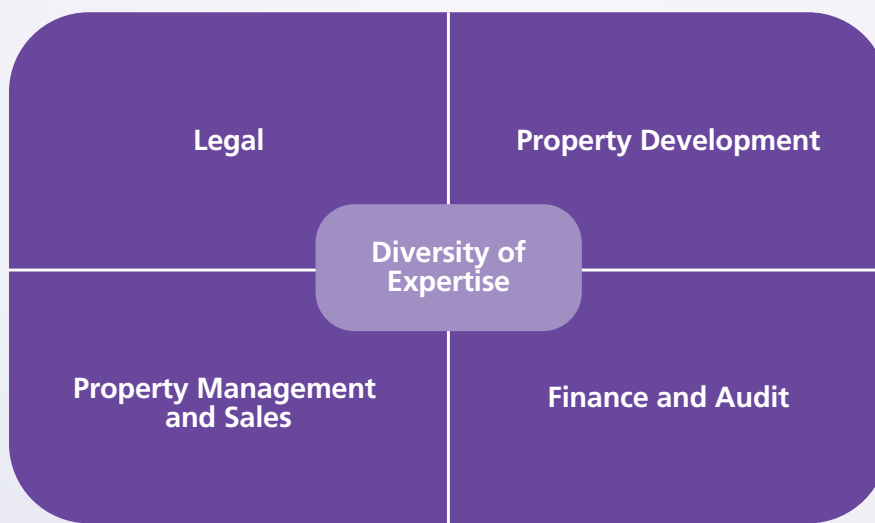


Mr. CHEN Wende, who was appointed as Executive Director with effect from 20 June 2025 attended a training session on 18 June 2025, at which an external legal advisor provided legal advice on Hong Kong law as regards the requirements under the Listing Rules that are applicable to him as a director of the Company and the possible consequences of making a false declaration or giving false information to the Stock Exchange. Mr. CHEN Wende has confirmed his understanding of the information provided by the legal advisor.

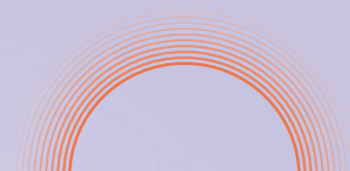
The current Board composition has provided the Company with a good balance and diversity of skills and experience appropriate to the requirements of its business.

Board Evaluation

The Board recognises the importance and benefits of conducting regular evaluations of its performance, an external performance evaluation on the Board for the year ended 31 December 2025 has been conducted in 2026. The Board evaluation was conducted by Sky Joy Consulting Company Limited (“**Sky Joy**”). Sky Joy designed a structured Board performance review questionnaire covering key governance areas, including Board composition, Board operations, oversight responsibilities, and information flow. The evaluation involved each Director and management completing a questionnaire to provide individual ratings as well as comments covering a range of topics.

The overall results of the Board performance review is positive and it indicates that the Board has discharged its duties in compliance with the applicable regulatory requirements, and has exercised an appropriate level of oversight in respect of the Company’s strategic direction, management performance and corporate governance matters. The review results further indicate that the Directors are satisfied with the performance of the Board and acknowledged that the Board plays an effective role in the development and determination of the Group’s corporate culture, strategic direction and overall business objectives.

The Company intended to carry out such board performance evaluation once every two years and the next evaluation is expected to be conducted in 2028.



Board Diversity

The Company has adopted a board diversity policy. Selection of board candidates will be based on a range of diversity perspectives with reference to the Company's business model and specific needs, including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, ethnicity, professional experience and qualification, skills, knowledge and length of service. The ultimate decision will be based on merit and contribution that the selected candidates will bring to the Board. The Board has reviewed the implementation of, and confirmed the effectiveness of, its board diversity policy for the year ended 31 December 2025.

The Board believes that the balance between Executive Directors and Non-executive Directors (including the Independent Non-executive Directors) is reasonable and adequate to provide sufficient checks and balances that safeguard the interests of the Shareholders and the Group. The views and participation of the Non-executive Director and Independent Non-executive Directors in the Board and committee meetings provide independent judgment and advice on the issues relating to the Group's strategy, performance, conflict of interest and management process to ensure that the interests of the Shareholders are considered and safeguarded. The Board considers that each of the Non-executive Director and Independent Non-executive Directors brings his/her own relevant expertise to the Board.

The Company currently has three Independent Non-executive Directors, representing more than one-third of the Board and at least one of them has appropriate professional qualifications or accounting or related financial management expertise. They have provided the Board with their diversified expertise, experience and professional advice.

The Board also recognises the particular importance of gender diversity. Our Board currently comprises two female Directors and four male Directors. In addition, we maintain an approximate 48:52 ratio of males to females in the workforce (including the senior management of the Group) as of 31 December 2025. The Board considers that gender diversity in respect of both the Board and the workforce has been achieved. For details on our process of employees recruitment and management, please refer to our Environmental, Social and Governance Report. The Company has established the Workforce Diversity Policy in 2025, which is published on the Company's website, to provide guidance in creating a diverse, inclusive and supportive working environment for its employees. The Board has reviewed the implementation and effectiveness of the workforce diversity policy of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2025. The Company targets to achieve or maintain at least one female director on its Board. This target will be reviewed on an annual basis and from time to time by the Nomination Committee, as warranted. The Company will continue to seek to ensure it has an appropriate mix of diversity and has a number of initiatives in place to meet its strategic imperative of ensuring it has a diverse Board. Structured recruitment, selection and training programmes at various levels within the Group will also continue to be conducted to develop a broader pool of skilled and experienced potential Board members.

Board Independence

The Board has established mechanisms to ensure independent views and input are available to the Board. The Board shall ensure the appointment of at least three Independent Non-executive Directors representing at least one-third of the Board, with at least one of them having appropriate professional qualifications or accounting or related financial management expertise, whilst the Nomination Committee strictly adheres to the Nomination Policy in respect of the nomination and appointment of Independent Non-executive Directors. The Independent Non-executive Directors will also be appointed to Board Committees as required under the Listing Rules and as far as practicable to ensure independent views are available.

All Directors (including Independent Non-executive Directors) are entitled to seek further information from the management on the matters to be discussed at Board meetings and, where necessary, independent professional advice at the Company's expense.

A Director (including Independent Non-executive Director) shall not vote on any resolution approving any contract or arrangement or any other proposal in which he/she or any of his/her close associates has a material interest nor shall he/she be counted in the quorum present at that meeting.

The Board has received from each Independent Non-executive Director a written annual confirmation of their independence pursuant to Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules. The Board considers that all Independent Non-executive Directors are independent in character and judgement and they also meet the independence criteria set out in Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules.

The Chairman meets with the independent Non-executive Directors annually without the presence of the executive Directors.

The Board has reviewed and considered that the mechanisms are effective in ensuring that independent views and input are provided to the Board during the year ended 31 December 2025.

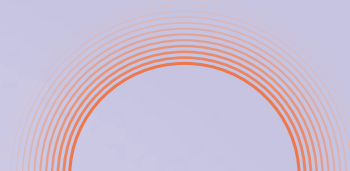
Board Meeting and General Meeting

The Board meets regularly and held a total of 4 regular meetings in March, June, August and December of 2025, respectively. At least 14 days' notice of all regular Board meetings together with the meeting agenda is given to all Directors such that all Directors are given the opportunity to include matters for discussion in the agenda. Meeting agenda and accompanying meeting papers are sent to all relevant Directors at least three days in advance of every regular Board meeting and committee meeting. Directors may participate in meetings in person, by phone or by other communication means. Between regular Board meetings, Directors may approve various matters by way of passing written resolutions. Additional Board meetings may be convened, if necessary.

The Company Secretary assists the Chairman in preparing the agenda for the Board meetings and ensures that all applicable rules and regulations regarding the proceedings of the Board meetings are followed. Draft and final versions of minutes of each Board meeting are sent to all Directors for their comments and records respectively within a reasonable time. The Company also keeps detailed minutes of each Board meeting, which are available for inspection by all Directors.

During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Board held 5 Board meetings and 1 general meeting (including an annual general meeting) were held by the Company. Attendance records of Board meetings and the general meetings by Directors are set out below:

In addition to regular Board meetings, the Chairman also held one meeting with the Independent Non-executive Directors without the presence of other Directors during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Responsibilities, Accountabilities and Contributions of the Board and Management

The Board directs and approves the Group's overall strategies whilst the responsibilities for execution and daily operations are delegated to management. The Board gives clear directions as to management's power, and reviews, from time to time, the delegations to management to ensure that they are appropriate and continue to be beneficial to the Group as a whole.

Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

Code provision C.2.1 of Part 2 of the CG Code provides that the roles of chairman and chief executive should be separate and should not be performed by the same individual.

The Chairman and the chief executive officer of the Company (the "**Chief Executive Officer**") are two distinctively separate positions. The position of the Chairman was held by Mr. KONG Jianmin while the position of the Chief Executive Officer was held by Mr. WANG Zhongqi ("**Mr. WANG**") until 15 September 2025. Following the resignation of Mr. WANG, the general manager of the Group, Mr. HU Nan, is responsible for the overall management and business development of the Group. The division of responsibilities between the Chairman and the Chief Executive Officer are clearly divided to ensure a balance of power and authority and to reinforce their independence and accountability. For details of the change in Chief Executive Officer, please refer to the announcement of the Company dated 15 September 2025.

The Chairman of the Board provides leadership for the Board. He is responsible for ensuring that all Directors are properly briefed on issues arising at Board meetings; Directors receive, in a timely manner, adequate information which is accurate, clear, complete and reliable; and the Board works effectively and performs its responsibilities. He encourages Directors to make a full and active contribution to the Board's affairs and take the lead to ensure that the Board acts in the best interests of the Company.

The Chief Executive Officer is responsible for the daily operation of the Group and leading the management of the Group. The Board will continue to evaluate the management structure and will appoint a suitable candidate if necessary for future operations.

Appointments and Re-election of Directors

Each Director (including Non-executive Director) has entered into a service contract or an appointment letter with the Company for a term of three years subject to retirement by rotation and re-election at the annual general meeting of the Company in accordance with the articles of association of the Company (the "**Articles of Association**").

Training and Support for Directors

All the Directors namely, Mr. KONG Jianmin, Mr. KONG Jiannan, Mr. CHEN Wende, Ms. LIU Xiaolan, Mr. FUNG Che Wai, Anthony and Ms. NG Yi Kum have complied with the CG Code and participated in continuous professional development to develop and refresh their knowledge and skills. Upon appointment to the Board, all newly appointed Directors have been provided with necessary induction training and materials to ensure that they have proper understanding of the operation and business of the Company and their responsibilities under the relevant laws, regulations and rules.

The Company regularly updates the Directors on the latest developments regarding the Listing Rules and other applicable legal and regulatory requirements to ensure compliance and enhance their awareness of good corporate governance practices. In addition, external experts are invited to give seminars to the Directors to update their skills and knowledge from time to time.

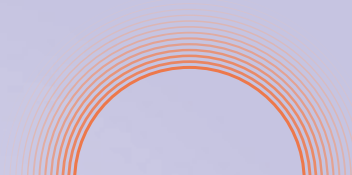
Board Committees

The Board has established three board committees, namely Remuneration Committee, Nomination Committee and Audit Committee, to oversee the particular aspect of the Company's affairs. The Board committees are provided with sufficient resources to discharge their duties.

Remuneration Committee

The Remuneration Committee was established in October 2020. The Remuneration Committee comprises three members, namely Ms. NG Yi Kum (*Chairperson*) and Mr. FUNG Che Wai, Anthony, both of them are Independent Non-executive Directors, and Mr. KONG Jiannan, an Executive Director.

The principal duties of the Remuneration Committee include but are not limited to making recommendations to the Board on the Company's policy and structure for Directors' and senior management's remuneration, as well as the remuneration packages of individual Executive Directors and senior management and remuneration of Non-executive Directors, and reviewing and/or approving matters relating to share schemes under Chapter 17 of the Listing Rules. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Nomination Committee reviewed the structure, size and composition of the Board, the diversity and the independence of the Board members, assessed the independence of the Independent Non-executive Directors and made recommendations to the Board on the re-appointment of Directors in accordance with the nomination policy of the Company and the diversity aspects as set out in the board diversity policy of the Company. Nomination Policy

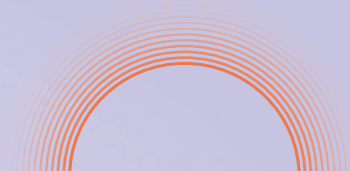
The Company has adopted a nomination policy setting out the nomination practice, such as the criteria and procedures for the selection, appointment and re-appointment of the Directors. Under the policy, the Nomination Committee will evaluate potential candidates by considering various factors, including their reputation for integrity, accomplishment and experience, potential time commitments, potential contribution to board diversity, and material conflict of interest with the Group (if any). The Nomination Committee shall make nominations/recommendations to the Board for consideration in respect of candidates to stand for election at a general meeting or for filling a casual vacancy. Shareholders may nominate a person to stand for election as a Director at a general meeting in accordance with the Articles of Associations and applicable laws and regulations. The procedures for such proposal are posted on the website of the Company. The Board shall have the final decision on all matters relating to the recommendation of candidates to stand for election at any general meeting.

Audit Committee

The Audit Committee was established in October 2020. The Audit Committee comprises three members who are all Independent Non-executive Directors, namely Ms. NG Yi Kum (*Chairperson*), Mr. FUNG Che Wai, Anthony and Ms. LIU Xiaolan.

The terms of reference of the Audit Committee are available on the Company's website and the HKEXnews website. The principal duties of the Audit Committee include but are not limited to the followings:

- making recommendations to the Board on the appointment, re-appointment and removal of external auditor of the Group and approving the remuneration and terms of engagement of the external auditor, and any issues related to its resignation or dismissal;
- reviewing and monitoring the external auditor's independence and objectivity and effectiveness of the audit process in accordance with applicable standards;
- reviewing and monitoring the integrity of the Groups' financial statements and annual reports and accounts, and interim reports;
- reviewing the Group's financial controls, and its risk management and internal control systems;
- reviewing the Group's internal audit function;
- reviewing the Group's financial and accounting policies and practices;



- reviewing the external auditor's management letter and questions raised by the external auditor to management, and management's response to such questions;
- reporting to the Board on matters in the code provision under the CG Code;
- reviewing and monitoring the Group's corporate governance functions under code provision A.2.1 of Part 2 of the CG Code; and
- reviewing and making recommendations to the Board on the Group's environmental, social and governance related matters under Appendix C2 of the Listing Rules.

Audit and Accountability

The Directors acknowledge their responsibility for preparing the financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2025 which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and of the Group at that date and of the Group's results and cash flows for the year then ended and are properly prepared on the going concern basis in accordance with the applicable statutory requirements and accounting standards. The statement of the external auditor of the Company about their reporting responsibilities on the financial statements is set out in the Independent Auditor's Report in this annual report.

External Auditor's Remuneration

At the 2025 annual general meeting of the Company, the Shareholders approved the re-appointment of Prism Hong Kong Limited ("**Prism**") as auditor of the Company. For the year ended 31 December 2025, the remuneration paid or payable to Prism in respect of audit services provided to the Group amounted to RMB3,600,000, and in respect of non-audit services (which comprised other reporting services) amounted to RMB100,000.

Company Secretary

Mr. YAU Kam Chuen (“**Mr. Yau**”) has resigned as the Company Secretary with effect from 31 January 2026 and Ms. TSEONG Ka Wai has been appointed as the Company Secretary in place of Mr. Yau. In compliance with Rule 3.29 of the Listing Rules, Mr. Yau confirmed that for the year ended 31 December 2025, he has taken no less than 15 hours of relevant professional training.

Risk Management and Internal Control

The Board is responsible for maintaining sound and effective systems of risk management and internal control in order to safeguard the Group’s assets and the Shareholders’ interests, and reviewing and monitoring the effectiveness of these systems on a regular basis. The Audit Committee assists the Board in performing its governance functions as to finance, operation, compliance, risk management and internal control of the Group. The risk management team of the Group assists the Board and/or the Audit Committee in reviewing the effectiveness of the risk management and internal control systems of the Group on a continual basis. These systems are designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives of the Group, and can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Group applies the “three lines of defense” model as the basic structure of the risk management and internal control systems:

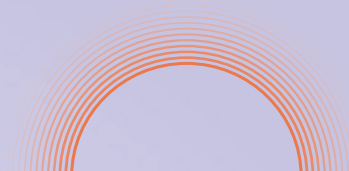
First line of defense: The Group integrates the risk management system into the core business operation practices. Each operating unit is responsible for identifying and assessing its respective risks, setting appropriate risk mitigating measures within the scope of its responsibilities, strictly implementing relevant risk mitigating measures and reporting to the management on the status of risk management in a timely manner.

Second line of defense: Each functional department of the Group provides and promotes the methodology and tools of risk management and control for the first line of defense, and at the same time, coordinates with each other for the management of significant matters involving various fields, processes and departments, and gives risk reminders and carries out control strategy study on such basis.

Third line of defense: The Group’s risk management team is mainly responsible for monitoring the compliance with policies and procedures by the Group and its major departments as well as the effectiveness of its internal control structure, conducting independent assessment, providing constructive advice to relevant management and reporting to the chairman of the Board. The Group’s risk management team organises regular risk assessment of the Group and formulates internal audit plan for the current year based on the results of the risk assessment, and at the same time, reports to the Audit Committee on the results of the audit on a regular basis.

The Board has assessed and reviewed the effectiveness of the Group’s annual risk management and internal control systems for the year ended 31 December 2025 and considered that such systems are effective and adequate.

The Company has adopted a whistleblowing policy which provides a mechanism for employees and related third parties who deal with the Group (e.g. consultants, contractors, suppliers, agents and customers) to raise concerns on any suspected misconduct, malpractice or irregularities in any matter related to the Group through confidential reporting channels. The Company has also adopted an anti-corruption policy to provide information and guidance to personnel on how to recognise and deal with bribery and corruption and to handle corporate donation and sponsorship activities of the Group, which applies to all employees (full time and part time) of the Group and related third parties who deal with the Group.



Disclosure of Inside Information

The Company has adopted policies on monitoring, reporting and disclosure of inside information (as defined in the Listing Rules). This ensures timely reporting and disclosure as well as fulfilment of the Group's continuous disclosure obligations. In particular, the Group:

- has conducted its affairs with close regard to the disclosure requirements under the Listing Rules as well as the "Guidelines on Disclosure of Inside Information" published by the Securities and Futures Commission in June 2012;
- has established its own disclosure obligation procedures, which set out the procedures and controls for the assessment of potential inside information and the handling and dissemination of inside information. The procedures have been communicated to the senior management and staff of the Company, and the implementation was monitored by the Company; and
- has made broad and non-exclusive disclosure of information to the public through channels such as financial reports, public announcements and its website.

Shareholders' Rights

Procedures for Shareholders to Convene an Extraordinary General Meeting

Pursuant to Article 58 of the Articles of Association, any one or more members holding at the date of deposit of a requisition (the "**Requisition**") not less than one-tenth of the paid up capital of the Company carrying the right of voting at general meetings of the Company (on a one vote per share basis) (the "**Eligible Shareholder(s)**"), shall at all times have the right, by written requisition to the Board or the Company Secretary, to require an extraordinary general meeting ("**EGM**") to be called by the Board for the transaction of any business or resolution specified in such Requisition; and such meeting shall be held within two (2) months after the deposit of such Requisition.

The Eligible Shareholder(s) must deposit the Requisition to the Company's principal place of business in Hong Kong, which for the time being is at Room 1302, 13th Floor, Harcourt House, 39 Gloucester Road, Wanchai, Hong Kong. The Requisition must state clearly the name of the Eligible Shareholder(s) concerned, his/her/their shareholding in the Company, the reason(s) to convene an EGM, the agenda proposed to be included and the details of the business(es) proposed to be transacted at the EGM. Such Requisition must be signed by the Eligible Shareholder(s) concerned.

The Company will check the Requisition and the identity and the shareholding of the Eligible Shareholder(s) will be verified with the Company's Hong Kong share registrar. If the Requisition is found to be proper and in order, the Company Secretary will ask the Board considering to convene an EGM within two (2) months after the deposit of the Requisition and/or include the proposal or the resolution proposed by the Eligible Shareholder(s) at the EGM.

If within twenty-one (21) days of the deposit of the Requisition the Board has not advised the Eligible Shareholder(s) of any outcome to the contrary and fails to proceed to convene such EGM, the Eligible Shareholder(s) himself/herself/themselves may do so in accordance with the Articles of Association, and all reasonable expenses incurred by the Eligible Shareholder(s) concerned as a result of the failure of the Board shall be reimbursed to the Eligible Shareholder(s) concerned by the Company.

Putting forward Proposals at General Meeting

Any Eligible Shareholder(s) (as defined in the preceding paragraph headed “Procedures for Shareholders to Convene an Extraordinary General Meeting”) may by written requisition request the Company to convene a general meeting in accordance with the procedures set out in the said preceding paragraph.

Shareholders’ Communication Policy

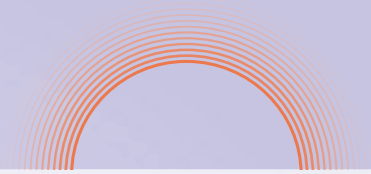

The Company endeavors to maintain an on-going dialogue with the Shareholders and other stakeholders. To further promote effective communication, the Company’s website, which is updated on a regular basis, provides additional information to the Shareholders, such as its principal business activities, business development and operations, financial information, press releases, newsletters and other information, and as one of the channels to receive enquiries from the Shareholders and other stakeholders. The Company arranges investor relations activities, performance briefings and calls with investors and analysts from time to time. Enquiries from the Shareholders and other stakeholders are dealt with in an informative and timely manner. The Company has reviewed the implementation and effectiveness of the Shareholders’ Communication Policy for the year ended 31 December 2025. In view of the foregoing, the Company considers that the Shareholders’ Communication Policy has been properly implemented and is effective.

Shareholder Engagement

The Company maintains close communication with investors and analysts through the investor relation department. Online and offline exchange conferences, results presentation and general meetings are organised on a regular basis to keep investors and analysts abreast of the development strategies and latest news of the Company.

In the year of 2025, 5 investor meetings were organised to discuss the development strategies of the Company, where the senior management of the Company attended the meetings to explain the results performance of the Group, communicated with the investors and answered the relevant enquiries from investors and analysts. To foster mutual understanding, feedback and views from shareholders and the investment community are regularly communicated to the Group’s Executive Directors and senior management.

Dividend Policy

Declaration of dividends is subject to the discretion of the Board, taking into consideration of factors such as the Group's financial results, Shareholders' interests, general business conditions and strategies, capital requirements, taxation considerations, contractual, statutory and regulatory restriction and any other factors that the Board may deem relevant. The Company has adopted a dividend policy which aims to provide the Shareholders with a sustainable dividend out of the profit of the Group.



The Directors are pleased to present their report together with the audited financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2025.

Principal Activities and Business Review

The principal activity of the Company is investment holding. Details of the principal activities of the principal subsidiaries are set out in note 1 to the financial statements. There was no significant changes in the nature of the Group's principal activities during the year.

A fair review of the Group's business during the year, including an analysis of the Group's performance using financial key performance indicators, a description of the principal risks and uncertainties facing the Group, an indication of likely future development in the Group's business, and particulars of important events affecting the Group that have occurred since the end of the year ended 31 December 2025 (if any) can be found in the sections headed "Financial Highlights", "Chairman's Statement" and "Management Discussion and Analysis" in this annual report. The financial risk management objectives and policies of the Group can be found in note 39 to the financial statements.

As far as the Board and management are aware, the Group has complied in all material aspects with the relevant laws and regulations that have a significant impact on the business and operation of the Group. During the year ended 31 December 2025, there was no material breach of, or non-compliance with, applicable laws and regulations by the Group.

Key Relationships with Employees, Customers, Suppliers and Other Stakeholders

The Group is of the view that employees are the foundation for the Group's business operations and an important asset of the Group. By providing employees with an ideal working environment and opportunities for sustainable development, the Group and our employees improve and grow together. More details of our relationship with employees are set out in the section headed "Employees and Remuneration Policy" in this annual report.

The Group maintains a good relationship with its customers and suppliers. The Group's property management services are based on the principle of customer orientation, and we strive to continuously improve the services provided to customers. We value customer feedback and has established customer complaint handling procedures to ensure customers' complaints are dealt with in a timely and effective manner. We also value collaboration with our business partners to set up sustainable supply chains and achieve win-win solution.

The Board also believes effective communication and timely information disclosure builds the Shareholders' and investors' confidence, and also facilitates the flow of constructive feedback that are beneficial for investor relations and future corporate development. Environmental Policies and Performance

The Group is committed to operate its business in compliance with applicable environmental protection laws and regulations and has implemented relevant environmental protection measures in compliance with the required standards under applicable laws and regulations.

Key Risks and Uncertainties

The following lists out the key risks and uncertainties facing the Group. As it is not exhaustive in listing out all factors, there may be other risks and uncertainties which are unknown or currently not but may become material in future, save as those disclosed below. Investors are advised to make their own judgment or consult professionals before making any investment in the securities of the Company.

Risk relating to the policies

Industry regulations are imposing increasingly stringent requirements on the attribution and disclosure of revenues and profits from public income businesses such as elevator advertisements and parking fees, as well as projects on commission basis. Improper handling may trigger litigation and regulatory penalties, undermining corporate reputation and operational stability.

Risk relating to the operation

As a labor-intensive industry, personnel wages and social insurance expenditures account for an extremely high proportion of costs. With the increase of minimum wage level, social insurance contributions in compliance with the relevant requirements, as well as rising labor and material costs, yet adjustments to property fees are subject to approval by property owners by way of voting and hence creates huge obstacles in actual operations, the profit margins continued to be squeezed.

Risk relating to the finances

Due to the downturn of the property industry, accounts receivable such as property fees for vacant properties from developers, outstanding marketing expenses, preliminary expenses and pre-delivery fees of construction often involve extended collection periods and result in difficulties in the recovery of receivables, which may hence easily turn into bad debts and affect the asset quality. The Company will proactively negotiate with co-developers and commence the business of offsetting outstanding debts with unsold properties to recover its capital.

Results and Dividends

The Group's results for the year ended 31 December 2025 are set out in the Consolidated Statement of Profit or Loss on page 74.

The Board does not recommend any payment of final dividend for the year ended 31 December 2025 (2024: Nil).

Significant Investments Held, Material Acquisitions and Disposals of Subsidiaries, Associates and Joint Ventures, and Future Plans for Material Investments or Capital Assets

There were no significant investments held, no material acquisitions or disposals of subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures during the year ended 31 December 2025, nor was there any plan authorised by the Board for other material investments or additions of capital assets at 31 December 2025.

Update on certain acquisitions in prior years

(a) Acquisition of Living Technology

Reference is made to the announcement of the Company dated 18 January 2021, in relation to the acquisition of 80% of the equity interest in Living Technology Co., Ltd. (formerly known as Cedar Technology Group Co., Ltd.), ("**Living Technology**") by the Group. Pursuant to the acquisition agreement, Living Technology's audited net profit (the "**Audited Net Profit**") for the financial years ended 31 December 2021 and 2022 should increase by not less than 5% as compared to that of the immediate preceding financial year, and the Company should recognise receivables from or payables to the vendor based on the shortfall or excess of the guaranteed net profit of Living Technology. It was also agreed in the acquisition agreement that such Audited Net Profit for each relevant period shall be determined by qualified auditors within three (3) months after the end of 31 December 2021 and 2022, respectively. As at the end of the reporting period, the Audited Net Profit for the year ended 31 December 2021 has been determined without any dispute. For the Audited Net Profit for the year ended 31 December 2022, since the beginning of 2023, the Group has commenced the audit work of Living Technology and has been in active negotiation with the original vendor to the acquisition of Living Technology (the "**Vendor**"). However, the parties have not reached consensus on the recoverability of the outstanding property management fees due from third party landlords and the relevant guarantors (as landlords) (the "**Receivables**"). In the event that Living Technology is unable to recover the Receivables, Living Technology shall make provision for impairment of the Receivables (the "**Impairment**"), which will in turn adversely affect the Audited Net Profit for the year ended 31 December 2022 and may trigger compensation mechanism under the relevant financial guarantees.

To keep track of the recovery progress of the Receivables, since the second half of 2023, the Group has (among others) sent legal letters to the relevant landlord and arranged professional debt collection teams to collect payments. However, the Group considers that the recovery rate is not satisfactory. As the parties were unable to reach a consensus on the appropriate Impairment to be made to the Receivables (and hence, whether the guaranteed profit could be fulfilled), as at 31 December 2025, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Group, Guangdong Hejing Youhuo Holdings Group Co., Ltd., is currently in litigation with the Vendor regarding the guaranteed net profit of Living Technology for the year ended 31 December 2022. The case remains under legal proceedings and ongoing negotiations. The Company believes that, having considered the fact that certain customers of Living Technology are already in serious debt crisis and legal disputes and most of the Receivables have aged 3 years or more, Living Technology should separately set aside a large proportion of Impairment for this part of the Receivables. This will result in Living Technology being unable to achieve the guaranteed net profit and would trigger the compensation mechanism.

The Company will continue to monitor the progress of the above-mentioned legal procedures and will make further announcement(s) as and when appropriate to inform the Shareholders and potential investors in relation to the actual performance of Living Technology for the year ended 31 December 2022 pursuant to the Listing Rules when the profit specific audit report of Living Technology becomes available.

(b) Acquisition of Guangdong Telijie

Reference is made to the announcement of the Company dated 10 January 2022 in relation to the acquisition of 50% of the equity interest in Guangdong Telijie Environment Engineering Co., Ltd. ("**Guangdong Telijie**") by the Group. Pursuant to the acquisition agreement, Guangdong Telijie must achieve certain guaranteed revenue and guaranteed net profits for the financial years ended 31 December 2022, 2023 and 2024, and the Company shall recognise an amount due from or to the vendors based on the shortfall or excess of the audited guaranteed net profit. As of 31 December 2025, the audited reports of Guangdong Telijie for each of the two years ended 31 December 2022 and 2023 are available, whereas the audited report for the year ended 31 December 2024 is not available yet. As at 31 December 2024, based on the unaudited management accounts of Guangdong Telijie, the Company has made a provision of approximately RMB96.5 million in compensation receivable from the vendors for the shortfall in the guaranteed net profits of Guangdong Telijie.

Since the beginning of 2025, the Group has commenced the audit work of Guangdong Telijie. As at 31 December 2025, the parties have not reached consensus on the recoverability of some long aged accounts receivables of Guangdong Telijie. Having considered most of the outstanding accounts receivables of Guangdong Telijie are due from governmental authorities, and the recovery rate of which largely depends on the approval of the local governmental's new budget for the year ending 31 December 2026, an additional observation period of approximately one year from 30 June 2025 is considered appropriate to monitor the collection of the outstanding receivables and finalise the audited report for the year ended 31 December 2024 and ensure the accuracy of the amount of compensation receivable by the Group. Based on publicly available information, the Company is given to understand that the Central People's Government is minded to take actions to assist and/or procure governmental authorities to settle the outstanding payables due to various enterprises as soon as possible in the next one to two years. The Company has also strengthened its collection efforts, including increasing the frequency of sending collection letters and door-to-door collection, in order to accelerate the collection of the long aged accounts receivables. The Company has been actively communicating with the vendor in relation to the engagement of an independent valuer to conduct an impairment assessment of the accounts receivables, if necessary, and the profit specific audit of the financial statements of Guangdong Telijie.

The Company will make further announcement(s) as and when appropriate to inform the Shareholders and potential investors in relation to the actual performance compensation of Guangdong Telijie pursuant to the Listing Rules when the profit specific audit report of Guangdong Telijie becomes available.

Share Capital

Details of movements in the Company's share capital during the year are set out in note 28 to the consolidated financial statements.

Purchase, Sale or Redemption of Listed Securities

Neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries has purchased, sold or redeemed any of the Company's listed securities (including sale of treasury shares) during the year ended 31 December 2025. As at 31 December 2025, the Company does not hold any treasury shares.

Tax Relief and Exemption of Holders of Listed Securities

The Company is not aware of any tax relief or exemption available to the Shareholders by reason of their holding of the Company's securities.

Pre-emptive Rights

There is no provision for pre-emptive rights under the Articles of Association or the laws of the Cayman Islands which would oblige the Company to offer new shares on a pro rata basis to existing Shareholders.

Reserves

Details of movements in the reserves of the Company and the Group during the year are set out in notes 41 and 30 to the financial statements and in the consolidated statement of changes in equity respectively.

Distributable Reserves

Total distributable reserves of the Company as at 31 December 2025, calculated in accordance with Article 143 of the Articles of Association, amounted to approximately RMB2,212,465,000.

Major Customers and Suppliers

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the transaction amount of the Group's top five customers accounted for 13.3% of the total revenue of the Group (2024: 15.1%), while the transaction amount of the Group's single largest customer, KWG Group Holdings Limited ("**KWG Holdings**", and together with its subsidiaries, "**KWG Group**") and its associates, accounted for 9.1% of the total revenue of the Group (2024: 11.4%).

For the year ended 31 December 2025, the transaction amount of the Group's top five suppliers accounted for 19.7% of the total purchase of the Group (2024: 21.3%), while the transaction amount of the Group's single largest supplier accounted for 8.7% of the total purchase of the Group (2024: 6.8%).

None of the Directors or any of their close associates or any Shareholders (which, to the best knowledge of the Directors, own more than 5% of the Company's issued share capital) had any beneficial interest in the Group's five largest customers and suppliers (other than KWG Group and its associates).

Directors

Pursuant to Article 84 of the Articles of Association, Mr. KONG Jiannan will retire from office by rotation and being eligible, offer himself for re-election at the forthcoming annual general meeting of the Company (the "**2026 AGM**").

Pursuant to Article 83(3) of the Articles of Association, Mr. CHEN Wende shall hold office as Director until the first annual general meeting of the Company after his appointment and shall then be eligible for re-election. Separate ordinary resolution will be proposed at the 2026 AGM to seek Shareholders' approval to the proposed re-election of Mr. CHEN Wende as an executive Director.

The Company has received from Ms. LIU Xiaolan, Mr. FUNG Che Wai, Anthony and Ms. NG Yi Kum their annual confirmations of independence pursuant to the independence guidelines set out in Rule 3.13 of the Listing Rules and confirms it considers that they are independent for the year ended 31 December 2025.

No Director proposed for re-election at the 2026 AGM has a service contract with the Group which is not determinable by the Group within one year without payment of compensation (other than statutory compensation).

Arrangements for Directors to Purchase Shares or Debentures

At no time during the year ended 31 December 2025 was the Company, its holding company or any of its subsidiaries, a party to any arrangements to enable the Directors to acquire benefits by means of the acquisition of shares in, or debentures of, the Company or any other body corporate.

Share Option Scheme

The Company has adopted a share option scheme (the "**Share Option Scheme**"), which was approved by the Shareholders by passing an ordinary resolution at the annual general meeting of the Company held on 3 June 2021 (the "**SO Adoption Date**").

The following is a summary of the principal terms of the Share Option Scheme:

(1) Purpose

The Share Option Scheme is a share incentive scheme prepared in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Listing Rules and is established to recognise and acknowledge the contributions the SO Eligible Participants (as defined hereinbelow) had or may have made to the Group. The Share Option Scheme will provide the SO Eligible Participants an opportunity to have a personal stake in the Company with the view to achieving the following objectives: (i) motivate the SO Eligible Participants to optimise their performance efficiency for the benefit of the Group; and (ii) attract and retain or otherwise maintain on-going business relationship with the SO Eligible Participants whose contributions are or will be beneficial to the long-term growth of the Group.

(2) Participants of the Share Option Scheme

The Board may, at its discretion, offer to grant an option ("**Option(s)**") to the SO Eligible Participants to subscribe for such number of new Shares as the Board may determine at an exercise price determined in accordance with the rules of the Share Option Scheme.

An "**SO Eligible Participant**" means:

- (i) any full-time or part-time employees, executives or officers of the Company or any of its subsidiaries; and

- (ii) any directors (including executive directors, non-executive directors and independent non-executive directors) of the Company or any of its subsidiaries.

(3) Total number of Shares available for issue under the Share Option Scheme

The maximum number of Shares in respect of which Options under the Share Option Scheme and options under other schemes of the Company may be granted is 201,781,023 Shares, representing approximately 9.96% of the total number of Shares in issue as at the date of this annual report.

(4) Maximum entitlement of each participant under the Share Option Scheme

The total number of Shares issued and which may fall to be issued upon exercise of the options granted under the Share Option Scheme and other schemes of the Company (including both exercised and outstanding options) to each SO Eligible Participant in any 12-month period up to and including the date of grant shall not exceed 1% of the Shares in issue as at the date of grant.

Any further grant of Options in excess of this 1% limit shall be subject to:

- (i) the issue of a circular by the Company containing the identity of the SO Eligible Participant, the number of and terms of the Options to be granted (and Options previously granted to such participant) in the 12-month period, the purpose of granting Options to the SO Eligible Participant and an explanation as to how the terms of the Options serve such purpose; and
- (ii) the approval of the Shareholders in general meeting and/or other requirements prescribed under the Listing Rules from time to time with such SO Eligible Participant and his/her close associates (or his/her associates if the SO Eligible Participant is a connected person) abstaining from voting. The number and terms (including the exercise price) of Options to be granted to such participant must be fixed before the Shareholders' approval and the date of the Board meeting at which the Board proposes to grant the Options to such SO Eligible Participant shall be taken as the date of grant for the purpose of calculating the exercise price of the Options.

(5) Period within which the Option may be exercised by the grantee under the Share Option Scheme

An Option may be exercised in accordance with the terms of the Share Option Scheme at any time after the date upon which the Option is deemed to be granted and accepted and prior to the expiry of 10 years from that date. The period during which an Option may be exercised will be determined by the Board in its absolute discretion, save that no Option may be exercised more than 10 years after it has been granted. No Option may be granted more than 10 years after the date of approval of the Share Option Scheme. There is no minimum period specified by the Share Option Scheme for which the Option must be held before it can be exercised.

(6) Amount payable on application or acceptance of the Options and period within which payments or calls must or may be made or loans for such purposed must be repaid

An Option shall be deemed to have been granted and accepted by the grantee and to have taken effect when the duplicate offer document constituting acceptance of the Option duly signed by the grantee, together with a remittance or payment in favour of the Company of HK\$1.00 by way of consideration for the grant thereof, is received by the Company not later than 30 days after the date of grant. Such remittance or payment shall in no circumstances be refundable. To the extent that the offer to grant an Option is not accepted by the prescribed 30-day period, it shall be deemed to have been irrevocably declined.

(7) Basis of determining the exercise price

Subject to any adjustments made under the Share Option Scheme, the subscription price of a Share in respect of any particular Option granted under the Share Option Scheme shall be such price as the Board in its absolute discretion shall determine, save that such price must be at least the highest of:

- (i) the official closing price of the Shares as stated in the Stock Exchange's daily quotations sheet on the date of grant, which must be a day on which the Stock Exchange is open for the business of dealing in securities;
- (ii) the average of the official closing prices of the Shares as stated in the Stock Exchange's daily quotations sheet for the five business days immediately preceding the date of grant; and
- (iii) the nominal value of a Share.

(8) Remaining life of the Share Option Scheme

Subject to earlier termination by the Company in general meeting or by the Board, the Share Option Scheme shall be valid and effective for a period of 10 years commencing from the SO Adoption Date and ending on 2 June 2031. As at the date of this annual report, the remaining life of the Share Option Scheme is approximately 5 years and 2 months.

(9) Number of Options available for grant

The number of Shares in respect of which Options are available for grant under the Share Option Scheme as at 1 January 2025 and 31 December 2025 were 201,551,523 (representing approximately 9.95% of the total Shares in issue as at the date of this annual report).

Share Award Scheme

The Company has adopted a share award scheme (the "**Share Award Scheme**"), which was approved by the Board at the Board meeting held on 23 July 2021 (the "**SA Adoption Date**"). A summary of the Share Award Scheme was set out in the announcement of the Company dated 23 July 2021 headed "Adoption of Share Award Scheme and Grant of Awarded Shares".

(1) Purposes and objectives

The specific objectives of the Share Award Scheme are: (i) to recognise and motivate the contributions by certain SA Eligible Participants (as defined hereinafter) and to give incentives thereto in order to retain them for the continual operation and development of the Group; (ii) to attract suitable professional personnel beneficial for further growth of the Group; and (iii) to provide certain SA Eligible Participants with a direct economic interest in attaining a long-term relationship between the Group and such SA Eligible Participants.

(2) Participants of the Share Award Scheme

Pursuant to the rules of the Share Award Scheme (the "**SA Scheme Rules**"), the Board may, from time to time, at its absolute discretion select any SA Eligible Participant for participation in the Share Award Scheme as a selected participant (the "**Selected Participant**") and determine the number of Shares to be awarded (the "**Awarded Shares**").

An "**SA Eligible Participant**" means: any employee (whether full time or part time, including without limitation any executive director) of the Company and/or any member of the Group ("**Employee**"); and non-executive director of the Company and/or any member of the Group (excluding any Excluded Participants (as defined in the SA Scheme Rules)) who, in the sole opinion of the Board, will contribute or have contributed to the Company and/or any member of the Group.

(3) Duration

Subject to any early termination as may be determined by the Board pursuant to the SA Scheme Rules, the Share Award Scheme shall be valid and effective for a term of 10 years commencing from the SA Adoption Date and ending on 22 July 2031. As at the date of this annual report, the remaining life of the Share Award Scheme is approximately 5 years and 3 months.

(4) Maximum limit

The Board shall not make any further grant of Awarded Shares under the Share Award Scheme such that the total number of Shares granted under the Share Award Scheme will exceed 5% of the total number of issued Shares as of the SA Adoption Date, being 100,890,511 Shares, representing approximately 4.98% of the total issued Shares as at the date of this annual report. No maximum entitlement of each participant is prescribed under the Share Award Scheme but the entitlement of each participant shall be in compliance with the Listing Rules.

If the relevant subscription or purchase would result in the trustee (the “**Trustee**”), TMF Trust (HK) Limited and any additional or replacement trustee, holding in aggregate, more than 5% of the total number of Shares in issue of the Company as of the SA Adoption Date, the Trustee shall not subscribe or purchase any further Shares.

(5) Vesting period

A Selected Participant shall be entitled to receive the Awarded Shares held by the Trustee in accordance with the vesting schedule upon when the Selected Participant has satisfied all vesting conditions specified by the Board at the time of making the award. Vesting of the Shares will be conditional on the Selected Participant remaining a director or employee of the Group until and on each of the relevant vesting dates and his/her execution of the relevant documents to effect the transfer from the Trustee.

(6) Purchase price of the award

The Board shall cause to pay the Trustee the purchase price and the related expense using the Company's internal resources. The Trustee shall purchase from the market the relevant number of Awarded Shares and shall hold the Awarded Shares on trust for the Selected Participants, in accordance with the terms of the Scheme Rules, until the Board has notified the Trustee that all the vesting conditions specified by the Board have been satisfied.

(7) Basis of determining the purchase price of the share awards

The purchase price of the awarded shares is determined by the prevailing market price of the Shares at the time of purchase by the Trustee on the Stock Exchange.

(8) Operation

Pursuant to the SA Scheme Rules, the Board may, from time to time, at its absolute discretion select any SA Eligible Participant for participation in the Share Award Scheme as a Selected Participant and determine the number of Shares to be awarded. The Board shall, after having regard to all relevant circumstances and affairs of the Group including without limitation the Group's business and financial performance, determine the maximum amount of funds to be allocated by the Board out of the Company's resources for the purchase or subscription of the Awarded Shares, as the Board deems appropriate, pursuant to the Share Award Scheme. The Board, through its authorised representative(s), shall cause to pay the Trustee the subscription or purchase price for the Shares and the related expenses from the Company's resources. The Trustee shall purchase from the open market or subscribe for the relevant number of Shares awarded and shall hold such Shares until they are vested in accordance with the SA Scheme Rules. No consideration or vesting price is payable by the SA Grantees (as defined hereinafter) upon acceptance or vesting of the Awarded Shares. No new Shares will be issued by the Company to satisfy any Awarded Shares.

(9) Number of Awarded Shares available for grant

The number of Awarded Shares available for grant under the Share Award Scheme as at 1 January 2025 and 31 December 2025 were 99,985,011 (representing approximately 4.94% of the total Shares in issue as at the date of this annual report).

During the year ended 31 December 2025, no Awarded Shares were granted, vested, lapsed or outstanding under the Share Award Scheme.

Directors' Interests in a Competing Business

During the year and up to the date of this annual report, none of the Directors are considered to have interests in a business which competes or is likely to compete, either directly or indirectly, with the businesses of the Group, as defined in the Listing Rules.

Directors' Remuneration

The Directors' remunerations are subject to the recommendations of the Remuneration Committee and the Board's approval. The remunerations are determined by the Board with reference to Directors' duties, responsibilities, performances and the results of the Group.

Equity-linked Agreements

Other than the Share Option Scheme and the Share Award Scheme as disclosed above, no equity-linked agreements was entered into by the Company during the year or subsisted at the end of the year ended 31 December 2025.

Directors' Rights to Acquire Shares or Debentures

The annual cap for the year ended 31 December 2025 under the Property Lease Framework Agreement is RMB38.6 million. The actual transaction amount for the transactions under the Property Lease Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB16.5 million.

2. Residential Property Management Services Framework Agreement

On 21 November 2022, the Company (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) entered into a residential property management services framework agreement with KWG Holdings (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) (the "**Residential Property Management Services Framework Agreement**"), pursuant to which the Group agreed to provide KWG Group and its associates with residential property management services, including but not limited to (i) pre-sale management services, such as cleaning, security and maintenance services for pre-sale display units and sales offices owned by KWG Group and/or its associates; and (ii) property management services, such as cleaning, security, gardening and repair and maintenance services for residential properties developed by KWG Group and/or its associates which are unsold or sold but not yet delivered to the property owners for a term commencing from 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2025.

The annual cap for the year ended 31 December 2025 under the Residential Property Management Services Framework Agreement is RMB523.8 million. The actual transaction amount for the transactions under the Residential Property Management Services Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB131.1 million.

3. Property Agency Services Framework Agreement

On 21 November 2022, the Company (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) entered into a property agency services framework agreement with KWG Holdings (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) (the **"Property Agency Services Framework Agreement"**), pursuant to which the Group agreed to provide KWG Group and its associates with property agency services for properties developed by KWG Group and/or its associates for a term commencing from 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2025.

The annual cap for the year ended 31 December 2025 under the Property Agency Services Framework Agreement is RMB344.2 million. The actual transaction amount for the transactions under the Property Agency Services Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB9.2 million.

4. Commercial Property Management Services Framework Agreement

On 21 November 2022, the Company (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) entered into a commercial property management services framework agreement with KWG Holdings (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) (the **"Commercial Property Management Services Framework Agreement"**), pursuant to which the Group agreed to provide KWG Group and its associates with commercial property management services, including but not limited to (i) pre-sale management services, such as cleaning, security and maintenance services for pre-sale display units and sales offices of commercial properties owned by KWG Group and/or its associates; and (ii) commercial property management services, such as file management, cleaning, security, gardening, and repair and maintenance services for commercial properties developed by KWG Group and/or its associates which are (a) unsold or sold but not yet delivered to the new owners; (b) pending to be leased out; or (c) owned by KWG Group and/or its associates for their own use for a term commencing from 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2025.

The annual cap for the year ended 31 December 2025 under the Commercial Property Management Services Framework Agreement is RMB297.2 million. The actual transaction amount for the transactions under the Commercial Property Management Services Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB88.0 million.

5. Commercial Operational and Value-added Services Framework Agreement

On 21 November 2022, the Company (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) entered into a commercial operational and value-added services framework agreement with KWG Holdings (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) (the **"Commercial Operational and Value-added Services Framework Agreement"**), pursuant to which the Group agreed to provide KWG Group and its associates with (i) commercial operational services, such as preliminary planning and consultancy, tenant sourcing and management, and marketing and promotion services, for commercial properties owned by KWG Group and/or its associates; and (ii) commercial value-added services, such as providing assistance in leasing out common areas, advertising spaces and empty floor space, for properties owned by KWG Group and/or its associates for a term commencing from 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2025.

The annual cap for the year ended 31 December 2025 under the Commercial Operational and Value-added Services Framework Agreement is RMB166.4 million. The amount for the transactions under the Commercial Operational and Value-added Services Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB67.9 million.

6. Publicity Planning Service Framework Agreement

On 21 November 2022, the Company (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) entered into a publicity planning service framework agreement with KWG Holdings (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) (the **"Publicity Planning Service Framework Agreement"**), pursuant to which the Group agreed to provide KWG Group and its associates with publicity planning services, such as promotion design, advertisement promotion and official account marketing for the residential properties developed by KWG Group and/or its associates for a term commencing from 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2025.

The annual cap for the year ended 31 December 2025 under the Publicity Planning Service Framework Agreement is RMB63.5 million. The actual transaction amount for the transactions under the Publicity Planning Service Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB6.8 million.

7. Marketing Channel Service Framework Agreement

On 21 November 2022, the Company (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) entered into a marketing channel service framework agreement with KWG Holdings (for itself and on behalf of its subsidiaries) (the **"Marketing Channel Service Framework Agreement"**), pursuant to which the Group agreed to provide KWG Group and its associates with marketing channel management services for the Universal Marketing Plan (a marketing plan that uses all resources available to develop sales channel and facilitate transactions) of properties developed by KWG Group and its associates for a term commencing from 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2025. Leveraging the Group's experience on management of property agents, the Group will be asked to provide administrative management services regarding the non-employees participants of the Universal Marketing Plan including human resource management, awards settlement, tax declaration and other administrative work.

The annual cap under the Marketing Channel Service Framework Agreement for the year ended 31 December 2025 is RMB28.6 million. The actual transaction amount for the transactions under the Marketing Channel Service Framework Agreement during the year ended 31 December 2025 was approximately RMB0.1 million.

As at the date of the aforementioned agreements of the continuing connected transactions, Mr. KONG Jianmin (a Non-Executive Director), Mr. KONG Jiantao and Mr. KONG Jiannan (an Executive Director) are the ultimate controlling shareholders of each of the Company and KWG Holdings pursuant to the respective shareholders' agreements entered into among their respective controlled entities. Therefore, KWG Holdings, as an associate of the controlling shareholders of the Company, is a connected person of the Company.

Pursuant to Rule 14A.55 of the Listing Rules, the Independent Non-executive Directors have reviewed the continuing connected transactions under each of the Property Lease Framework Agreement, the Residential Property Management Services Framework Agreement, the Property Agency Services Framework Agreement, the Commercial Property Management Services Framework Agreement, the Commercial Operational and Value-added Services Framework Agreement, the Publicity Planning Service Framework Agreement and the Marketing Channel Service Framework Agreement as mentioned above (collectively the **"Agreements"**), and confirmed the transactions have been entered into: (i) in the ordinary and usual course of the Group's business; (ii) on normal commercial terms or better; and (iii) in accordance with the respective terms of the Agreements that are fair and reasonable and in the interests of the Company and the Shareholders as a whole.

The auditor of the Company has been engaged to report on the continuing connected transactions of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2025 in accordance with the Hong Kong Standard on Assurance Engagements 3000 (Revised) "Assurance Engagements Other Than Audits or Reviews of Historical Financial Information" and with reference to Practice Note 740 "Auditor's Letter on Continuing Connected Transactions under the Hong Kong Listing Rules" issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The Board has received an unqualified letter from the auditor of the Company in accordance with Rule 14A.56 of the Listing Rules, stating that the auditor did not notice any of these continuing connected transactions:

- have not been approved by the Board;
- (for the connected transactions involving the provision of goods or services by the Group) were not in accordance with the pricing policies of the Group in all material aspects;
- were not entered into in accordance with the terms of the relevant agreements governing such continuing connected transactions in all material aspects; and
- have exceeded the relevant caps for the year ended 31 December 2025.

The Company has complied with the disclosure requirements in accordance with Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules in respect of the connected transactions and continuing connected transactions conducted by the Group during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Related Party Transactions

Details of the related party transactions of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2025 are set out in note 36 to the consolidated financial statements.

The related party transactions set out in note 36 to consolidated financial statements include related party transactions disclosed under accounting standards and related party transactions which also constitute continuing connected transactions of the Company under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules. The related party transactions in respect of the remuneration of Directors and chief executives of the Company constitute continuing connected transactions as defined in Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules. However, these transactions are exempt from reporting, announcement and independent shareholders' approval requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules. The related party transactions in respect of the remuneration of key management personnel (other than Directors and chief executives) of the Company did not fall under the definition of connected transactions or continuing connected transactions as defined in Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules. Unless otherwise disclosed in this annual report, the Directors believe, all other related party transactions set out in note 36 to the consolidated financial statements do not fall within the definition of "connected transactions" or "continuing connected transactions" under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules (as the case may be). The Company confirmed that it was in compliance with the disclosure requirements under Chapter 14A of the Listing Rules for the year ended 31 December 2025 or a waiver from such provisions has been obtained from the Stock Exchange.

Management Contracts

No contract, other than employment contracts, concerning the management and administration of the whole or any substantial part of the Company's business was entered into or existed during the year ended 31 December 2025.

Employees and Remuneration Policy

As at 31 December 2025, the Group had 12,244 employees (2024: 15,577 employees). Compensation for employees of the Group is made with reference to the market as well as individual performance and contributions, and extensive use of bonuses to link performance with reward is adopted. The Group reviews the remuneration policies and packages on a regular basis and make necessary adjustments that accommodate the pay levels in the industry. In addition to basic salaries, the Group also provides a comprehensive benefit package and career development opportunities, including performance-based bonus payments, share options, retirement schemes, medical benefits, and both internal and external training appropriate to individual needs.

Permitted Indemnity Provision

The Articles of Association provides that Directors, secretary and other officers and every auditor of the Company at any time, whether at present or in the past, and the liquidator or trustees (if any) acting or who have acted in relation to any of the affairs of the Company, and everyone of them, and everyone of their heirs, executors and administrators, shall be entitled to be indemnified out of the assets of the Company against all losses or liabilities which he or she may sustain or incur in or about the execution of the duties of his or her office or otherwise in relation thereto. During the year, the Company has maintained appropriate directors and officers liability insurance in respect of relevant legal actions against the Directors.

Public Float

Based on information that is publicly available to the Company and within the knowledge of the Directors, the Directors confirmed that the Company maintained a sufficient public float of at least 25% of the issued shares as required by the Listing Rules as at the latest practicable date prior to the issue of this annual report.

Significant Events after the Reporting Period

There were no significant events of the Group subsequent to 31 December 2025 and up to the date of this annual report.

Use of Net Proceeds from the Listing

The Shares were listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange on 30 October 2020 by way of Global Offering (as defined in the Prospectus), raising the total net proceeds (after deducting professional fees, underwriting commissions and other related listing expenses) of approximately HK\$2,913.1 million (the **"Net Proceeds"**). For details of the original proposed allocation of the Net Proceeds, please refer to the section headed "Future Plans and Use of Proceeds — Use of Proceeds" in the Prospectus.

On 29 June 2021, the Group resolved to revise the allocation of the Net Proceeds to apply the unutilised and unplanned Net Proceeds as follows: (i) approximately HK\$705.7 million for pursuing strategic acquisitions and investment opportunities to further develop strategic alliances, expand its business scale and increase its market shares in residential property management service market and other non-residential property management and commercial operational service market; (ii) approximately HK\$241.3 million for upgrading the intelligent service systems in order to further enhance its operational efficiency and service quality; (iii) approximately HK\$145.6 million for further diversifying its value-added services; and (iv) approximately HK\$72.8 million for its general corporate purposes and working capital. Details of the re-allocation are set out in the Company's announcement dated 29 June 2021.

On 10 January 2022, the Board resolved to further adjust the allocation proportion of the Net Proceeds as set out in the announcement of the Company dated 10 January 2022 (the “**Announcement**”), and the unutilised and unplanned Net Proceeds were intended to be allocated and used as follows: (i) approximately HK\$250.0 million for pursuing strategic acquisitions and investment opportunities to further develop strategic alliances, expand its business scale and increase its market shares in residential property management service market and other non-residential property management and commercial operational service market; (ii) approximately HK\$120.6 million for upgrading the intelligent service systems in order to further enhance its operational efficiency and service quality; (iii) approximately HK\$36.4 million for further diversifying its value-added services; and (iv) approximately HK\$52.7 million for its general corporate purposes and working capital.

As of the date of this annual report, the Company expects that the unutilised or unplanned Net Proceeds will be fully utilised on or before 31 December 2027. However, the actual timing for utilising the Net Proceeds is subject to change.

Executive Directors

KONG Jiannan

(Appointed on 11 September 2019 — Present)

KONG Jiannan, aged 60, was appointed as a Director on 11 September 2019 and was re-designated as an Executive Director and Chief Executive Officer on 19 June 2020. Mr. Kong is also the member of the Remuneration Committee of the Company. On 2 June 2023, he had stepped down as Chief Executive Officer. He currently holds directorships in various subsidiaries of the Group.

Mr. Kong graduated from the Guangzhou Radio and TV University (廣州市廣播電視大學) (also known as the Open University of China (Guangzhou) (國家開放大學(廣州))) in the PRC majoring in law in October 1988. Mr. Kong has over 24 years of experience in the real estate industry. He joined the Group in May 2004 as a director of Guangzhou Ningjun Property Management Co., Ltd. ("**Ningjun Property**"), where he was primarily responsible for the overall management of Ningjun Property. Prior to joining the Group, from September 1984 to October 1997, he worked at the Dongshan District Justice Bureau (東山區司法局) in Guangzhou, the PRC, where he last served as a section chief. From November 1997 to June 2007, he served as a director of Guangzhou Hejing Real Estate Co., Ltd. (廣州合景房地產開發有限公司), a subsidiary of KWG Group Holdings Limited ("**KWG Holdings**") (listed on the main board of the Stock Exchange, stock code: 1813), where he was primarily responsible for coordinating and managing human resources, administrative management and IT management. Since June 2007, he has been an executive director and an executive vice president of KWG Holdings, where he is responsible for coordinating and managing human resources, administrative management, IT management and legal affairs.

Mr. Kong has been a president of the 17th and the 18th General Committee of Hong Kong Industrial & Commercial Association (香港工商總會) since August 2019 and March 2022, respectively, and an executive council member of the 2nd Council of Happy Hong Kong Foundation (築福香港基金會) since September 2018. He has also been a council member of Guangzhou Chuanshuo Children's Culture Foundation (廣州船說少兒文化基金會) since March 2017.

Mr. Kong is the elder brother of Mr. Kong Jianmin, a Non-executive Director and the Chairman of the Board.

Pursuant to the service agreement with the Company, Mr. Kong is entitled to receive a basic annual director's fee of HK\$150,000.

CHEN Wende

(Appointed on 20 June 2025 – Present)

CHEN Wende, aged 48, is the group operations general manager of the Group. Prior to joining the Group, he was the general manager of the Southwest China District of KWG Holdings. Mr. Chen joined KWG Holdings in March 1997 and has held key positions in KWG Holdings, including general manager of the Western China District, general manager of Shenzhen District and deputy general manager of the branding and marketing department, with over 28 years of extensive experience in real estate industry operations and management. Since January 2025, Mr. Chen began serving as the group operations general manager of the Group, and is primarily responsible for the management and operations of the property management business of the Group.

Pursuant to the service agreement with the Company, Mr. Chen is entitled to receive a basic annual director's fee of HK\$150,000.

Non-executive Director

KONG Jianmin

(Appointed on 19 June 2020 – Present)

KONG Jianmin, aged 58, was appointed as a Non-executive Director and the Chairman of the Board on 19 June 2020. Mr. Kong is also the chairman of the Nomination Committee of the Company. He is responsible for providing guidance and formulation of business strategies for the overall development of the Group.

Mr. Kong graduated from Jinan University (暨南大學) in the PRC majoring in computer science in June 1989. Mr. Kong has over 30 years of experience in property development and investment. He founded KWG Group in November 1994. From November 1994 to April 1995, he served as a general manager of Guangzhou Xinhengchang Enterprises Development Co., Ltd. (廣州新恒昌企業發展有限公司), a subsidiary of the KWG Holdings, where he was primarily responsible for the formulation of strategies and operation plans as well as the implementation of the business plans. From June 1995 to June 2007, he served as the chairman of the board of Guangzhou Hejing Real Estate Development Ltd. (廣州合景房地產開發有限公司), a subsidiary of KWG Holdings, where he was responsible for strategic planning and implementation, sales and marketing of the company. Since July 2007, he has been an executive director and the chairman of the board of directors of KWG Holdings and is responsible for the formulation of the development strategies, as well as supervising project planning, business operation and sales and marketing of KWG Group. Prior to founding KWG Group, from December 1985 to July 1993, he worked at the Baiyun Road Sub-Branch of the Guangzhou Branch of Industrial and Commercial Bank of China Limited (中國工商銀行股份有限公司廣州白雲路支行), where he served as a credit officer.

Mr. Kong has been an executive president of the executive committee of Guangdong Real Estate Chamber of Commerce (廣東省地產商會) since March 2008 and has been a director of the board of directors of Jinan University (暨南大學) in the PRC since November 2010. From January 2011 to August 2014, Mr. Fung served as the chief financial officer and company secretary of Zall Smart Commerce Group Ltd. (卓爾智聯集團有限公司) (formerly known as Zall Development (Cayman) Holding Co., Ltd. (卓爾發展(開曼)控股有限公司)), a developer and operator of large-scale consumer product focused wholesale shopping malls in the PRC whose shares are listed on the main board of the Stock Exchange (stock code: 2098), where he was primarily responsible for financial and compliance matters. He has over 24 years of experience in accounting and financial management. He was qualified as an intermediate auditor by the Department of Human Resources of Guangdong Province in 2013, and obtained the professional qualification of a Certified Practising Accountant member of CPA Australia from CPA Australia in 2025.

GU Rongjuan, aged 41, joined the Group in May 2025 as a general manager of the Human Resources and Administration Center. Ms. Gu obtained a bachelor's degree in administrative management from Central South University in China in 2007. Prior to joining the Group, she served as the head of human resources and administration department of Cityscape Development Property (宸嘉物業) under Cityscape Development Group Company Limited from February 2023 to May 2024, where she was responsible for preliminary planning and development of the property company, and the human resources and administrative work of the property company.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

KEY AUDIT MATTERS

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the consolidated financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. For the matter below, our description of how our audit addressed the matter is provided in that context.

We have fulfilled the responsibilities described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the consolidated financial statements* section of our report, including in relation to these matters. Accordingly, our audit included the performance of procedures designed to respond to our assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements. The results of our audit procedures, including the procedures performed to address the matter below, provide the basis for our audit opinion on the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Key audit matter

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

Impairment assessment of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations

As at 31 December 2025, the net carrying amounts of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations amounted to approximately RMB630,120,000 and RMB299,563,000, respectively. The Group's other intangible assets arising from business combinations comprised (i) property management contracts, (ii) customer relationships and (iii) non-compete agreements, and all these other intangible assets are with finite useful lives.

In accordance with Hong Kong Accounting Standard 36 *Impairment of Assets* ("HKAS 36"), the Group is required to annually test the goodwill for impairment. Besides, according to HKAS 36, for an intangible asset with a finite useful life, the Group shall also assess at the end of each reporting period whether there is any indication that the intangible asset may be impaired and shall test the intangible asset for impairment if such indication exists.

For impairment testing, goodwill acquired through business combination is allocated to each of the cash-generating units ("CGUs"), or groups of CGUs. The Group engages an independent valuer to assist in the estimation. The key estimates involved in preparing the expected future cash flows include (i) annual revenue growth rate; (ii) gross profit margins; (iii) terminal growth rate and (iv) discount rate, etc.

The audit procedures in relation to the impairment assessment of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations included:

- Obtain an understanding and evaluate the appropriateness and reasonableness of impairment policies for goodwill and related intangible assets;
- Test the Group's internal controls over impairment assessment, including the design and implementation of policies and procedures;
- Evaluate the reasonableness and appropriateness for allocating goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations to each of CGUs, or groups of CGUs;
- Evaluate the objectivity, independence and competency of the valuer engaged by the Group;
- Involve our auditor's expert to assist us to assess the methodologies and assumptions regarding (i) Annual revenue growth rate; (ii) Gross profit margins; (iii) Terminal growth rate and (iv) Discount rate, used in the impairment assessment; and
- Focus on the adequacy of the entity's disclosures related to impairment of goodwill and other intangible assets in the consolidated financial statement.

Key audit matter

We have identified impairment of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations as a key audit matter due to the overall significance of the balances to the consolidated financial statements, and the management's assessment on the impairment was complex and involves significant management judgements and estimates.

Relevant disclosure information can be found in the notes to the consolidated financial statements 2.4, 3, 16 and 17.

Impairment assessment of trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets

As at 31 December 2025, the gross amount of the Group's trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets amounted to approximately RMB4,136,523,000 and RMB838,628,000 respectively, against which an allowance for impairment of RMB1,394,241,000 and RMB142,387,000 respectively, were made based on the expected credit loss approach under Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standard 9 *Financial Instruments*.

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

Based on the above, we found that the significant management judgements and key assumptions used in the impairment assessment of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations are supported by the available evidence.

For the impairment assessment of trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets, We performed the audit procedures including:

- Review the Group's credit policy and provision policy for determining loss allowance in respect of trade receivables and, prepayments, other receivables and other assets respectively;
- Assess the design and implementation of key internal controls which govern the debt collection and estimate of expected credit loss;
- Inquire the management for the basis on groupings of various customer segments for expected credit loss assessment by (i) its business nature, (ii) internal credit rating; and (iii) days past due and consider that the basis of groupings is reasonable;

Key audit matter

How our audit addressed the key audit matter

For trade receivables, the Group applied the simplified approach in calculating expected credit losses that recognised a loss allowance based on lifetime expected credit losses at each reporting date. The Group engaged an independent valuer to assist in the estimation. The Group used a provision matrix to measure expected credit losses based on groupings of various customer segments with similar loss patterns and takes into account historical default rates and forward-looking information.

For prepayments, other receivables and other assets, the Group measured the loss allowance equal to 12-month expected credit loss, unless when there was a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Group recognised lifetime expected credit losses. The assessment of whether lifetime expected credit losses should be recognised was based on significant increase in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition.

As the assessment of the expected credit loss allowance of trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets involved significant management judgements and estimates, it was identified as a key audit matter.

The relevant disclosure is included in the consolidated financial statements notes 2.4, 3, 21, 22 and 39.

- Evaluate the objectivity, independence and competency of the valuer engaged by the Group;
- Involve our auditor's expert to assist us to assess the methodologies and assumptions adopted including: (i) referring to the contract, credit information and historical settlement performance of debtors for the loss rate; (ii) understanding of the Group's business, industry and external macroeconomic data, challenge, debtors' financial condition and current market conditions for historical and forward-looking information; (iii) considering the effect on time value of currency appropriately;
- Test on a sample basis the accuracy of management's aging analysis of trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets;
- Verify the mathematical accuracy of the calculation of the loss allowance; and
- Evaluate the adequacy of disclosures related to expected credit losses on trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets in the consolidated financial statement.

Based on the above, we found that the significant judgments and estimates made by management for the expected credit loss assessment, are supported by available evidence.

1. Corporate and Group Information

General information

KWG Living Group Holdings Limited (the “**Company**”) is a limited liability company incorporated in the Cayman Islands on 11 September 2019. The registered office of the Company is located at Cricket Square, Hutchins Drive, P.O. Box 2681, Grand Cayman KY1-1111, Cayman Islands.

The Company is an investment holding company. During the year ended 31 December 2025, the Company and its subsidiaries (collectively the “**Group**”) were involved in the provision of residential property management services and non-residential property management and commercial operational services in the People’s Republic of China (the “**PRC**”).

In the opinion of the directors, the immediate and ultimate holding company of the Company was Plus Earn Consultants Limited (“**Plus Earn**”), which was incorporated in the British Virgin Islands (“**BVI**”).

2.1 Basis of Preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with HKFRS Accounting Standards (which include all Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("**HKFRSs**"), Hong Kong Accounting Standards ("**HKASs**") and Interpretations) issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("**HKICPA**"), and the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. They have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment properties. These financial statements are presented in Renminbi ("**RMB**") and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand except when otherwise indicated.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 2025. A subsidiary is an entity (including a structured entity), directly or indirectly, controlled by the Company. Control is achieved when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee (i.e., existing rights that give the Group the current ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee).

Generally, there is a presumption that a majority of voting rights results in control. When the Company has, less than a majority of the voting or similar rights of an investee, the Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether it has power over an investee, including:

- (a) the contractual arrangement with the other vote holders of the investee;
- (b) rights arising from other contractual arrangements; and
- (c) the Group's voting rights and potential voting rights.

The financial statements of the subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting period as the Company, using consistent accounting policies. The results of subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which the Group obtains control, and continue to be consolidated until the date that such control ceases.

Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the parent of the Group and to the non-controlling interests, even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance. All intra-group assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control described above. A change in the ownership interest of a subsidiary, without a loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction.

If the Group loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises the related assets (including goodwill), liabilities, any non-controlling interest and the exchange reserve; and recognises the fair value of any investment retained and any resulting surplus or deficit in profit or loss. The Group's share of components previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified to profit or loss or retained profits, as appropriate, on the same basis as would be required if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities.

2.2 Changes in Accounting Policies and Disclosures

The Group has adopted amendments to HKAS 21 *Lack of Exchangeability* for the first time for the current year's financial statements. The Group has not early adopted any other standard or amendment that has been issued but is not yet effective.

Amendments to HKAS 21 specify how an entity shall assess whether a currency is exchangeable into another currency and how it shall estimate a spot exchange rate at a measurement date when exchangeability is lacking. The amendments require disclosures of information that enable users of financial statements to understand the impact of a currency not being exchangeable. As the currencies that the Group had transacted in and the functional currencies of overseas subsidiaries, joint ventures and associates for translation into the Group's presentation currency were exchangeable, the amendments did not have any impact on the Group's financial statements.

In addition, the HKICPA has issued amendments to Illustrative Examples on HKFRS 7, HKFRS 18, HKAS 1, HKAS 8, HKAS 36 and HKAS 37 Disclosures about Uncertainties in the Financial Statements, which added illustrative examples in the corresponding HKFRS Accounting Standards. These examples reflect existing requirements in the corresponding HKFRS Accounting Standards to report the effects of uncertainties in the financial statements using climate-related examples. Therefore, the amendments do not have an effective date or transitional provisions. The Group has considered the guidance in these illustrative examples which has had no significant impact on the Group's financial statements.

Entities are required to classify all income and expenses within the statement of profit or loss into one of the five categories: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations and to present two new defined subtotals. It also requires disclosures about management-defined performance measures in a single note and introduces enhanced requirements on the grouping (aggregation and disaggregation) and the location of information in both the primary financial statements and the notes. Some requirements previously included in HKAS 1 are moved to HKAS 8 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, which is renamed as HKAS 8 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements. As a consequence of the issuance of HKFRS 18, limited, but widely applicable, amendments are made to HKAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows, HKAS 33 Earnings per Share and HKAS 34 Interim Financial Reporting. In addition, there are minor consequential amendments to other HKFRS Accounting Standards. HKFRS 18 and the consequential amendments to other HKFRS Accounting Standards are effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 with earlier application permitted. Retrospective application is required. The Group is currently analysing the new requirements and assessing the impact of HKFRS 18 on the presentation and disclosure of the Group's financial statements.

HKFRS 19 allows eligible entities to elect to apply reduced disclosure requirements while still applying the recognition, measurement and presentation requirements in other HKFRS Accounting Standards. To be eligible, at the end of the reporting period, an entity must be a subsidiary as defined in HKFRS 10 *Consolidated Financial Statements*, cannot have public accountability and must have a parent (ultimate or intermediate) that prepares consolidated financial statements available for public use which comply with HKFRS Accounting Standards. The standard was further amended in October 2025 to (i) remove disclosure objectives from HKFRS 19; (ii) reduce the disclosure requirements relating to supplier finance arrangements and a specific class of financial liabilities; and (iii) replace disclosure requirements relating to management-defined performance measures with a cross-reference to HKFRS 18 for entities that use these measures. Earlier application is permitted. As the Company is a listed company, it is not eligible to elect to apply HKFRS 19 and its amendments.

Amendments to HKFRS 9 and HKFRS 7 *Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments* clarify the date on which a financial asset or financial liability is derecognised and introduce an accounting policy option to derecognise a financial liability that is settled through an electronic payment system before the settlement date if specified criteria are met. The amendments clarify how to assess the contractual cash flow characteristics of financial assets with environmental, social and governance and other similar contingent features. Moreover, the amendments clarify the requirements for classifying financial assets with non-recourse features and contractually linked instruments. The amendments also include additional disclosures for investments in equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income and financial instruments with contingent features. The amendments shall be applied retrospectively with an adjustment to opening retained profits (or other component of equity) at the initial application date. Prior periods are not required to be restated and can only be restated without the use of hindsight. Earlier application of either all the amendments at the same time or only the amendments related to the classification of financial assets is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.

2.3 Issued but not yet Effective HKFRS Accounting Standards *(Continued)*

Amendments to HKFRS 9 and HKFRS 7 *Contracts Referencing Nature-dependent Electricity* clarify the application of the “own-use” requirements for in-scope contracts and amend the designation requirements for a hedged item in a cash flow hedging relationship for in-scope contracts. The amendments also include additional disclosures that enable users of financial statements to understand the effects these contracts have on an entity’s financial performance and future cash flows. The amendments relating to the own-use exception shall be applied retrospectively. Prior periods are not required to be restated and can only be restated without the use of hindsight. The amendments relating to the hedge accounting shall be applied prospectively to new hedging relationships designated on or after the date of the initial application. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments to HKFRS 9 and HKFRS 7 shall be applied at the same time. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group’s financial statements.

Amendments to HKFRS 10 and HKAS 28 address an inconsistency between the requirements in HKFRS 10 and in HKAS 28 in dealing with the sale or contribution of assets between an investor and its associate or joint venture. The amendments require full recognition of a gain or loss resulting from a downstream transaction when the sale or contribution of assets constitutes a business. For a transaction involving assets that do not constitute a business, a gain or loss resulting from the transaction is recognised in the investor’s profit or loss only to the extent of the unrelated investor’s interest in that associate or joint venture. The amendments are to be applied prospectively. The previous mandatory effective date of amendments to HKFRS 10 and HKAS 28 was removed by the HKICPA. However, the amendments are available for adoption now.

Amendments to HKAS 21 *Translation to a Hyperinflationary Presentation Currency* require the translation from a non-hyperinflationary functional currency into a hyperinflationary presentation currency at the closing rate. The amendments also require an entity whose functional currency and presentation currency are the currency of a hyperinflationary economy to restate the comparative amounts of a foreign operation whose functional currency is that of a non-hyperinflationary economy, by applying the general price index, in accordance with paragraph 34 of HKAS 29 *Financial Reporting in Hyperinflationary Economies*, to the foreign operation’s comparative figures. The amendments introduce certain additional disclosures. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group’s financial statements.

Annual Improvements to HKFRS Accounting Standards — Volume 11 set out amendments to HKFRS 1, HKFRS 7 (and the accompanying Guidance on implementing HKFRS 7), HKFRS 9, HKFRS 10 and HKAS 7. Details of the amendments that are expected to be applicable to the Group are as follows:

- HKFRS 7 *Financial Instruments: Disclosures*: The amendments have updated certain wording in paragraph B38 of HKFRS 7 and paragraphs IG1, IG14 and IG20B of the Guidance on implementing HKFRS 7 for the purpose of simplification or achieving consistency with other paragraphs in the standard and/or with the concepts and terminology used in other standards. In addition, the amendments clarify that the Guidance on implementing HKFRS 7 does not necessarily illustrate all the requirements in the referenced paragraphs of HKFRS 7 nor does it create additional requirements. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group’s financial statements.

2.3 Issued but not yet Effective HKFRS Accounting Standards *(Continued)*

- **HKFRS 9 *Financial Instruments*:** The amendments clarify that when a lessee has determined that a lease liability has been extinguished in accordance with HKFRS 9, the lessee is required to apply paragraph 3.3.3 of HKFRS 9 and recognise any resulting gain or loss in profit or loss. However, the amendments do not address how a lessee distinguishes between a lease modification as defined in HKFRS 16 and an extinguishment of a lease liability in accordance with HKFRS 9. In addition, the amendments have updated certain wording in paragraph 5.1.3 of HKFRS 9 and Appendix A of HKFRS 9 to remove potential confusion. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.
- **HKFRS 10 Consolidated Financial Statements:** The amendments clarify that the relationship described in paragraph B74 of HKFRS 10 is just one example of various relationships that might exist between the investor and other parties acting as de facto agents of the investor, which removes the inconsistency with the requirement in paragraph B73 of HKFRS 10. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.
- **HKAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows:** The amendments replace the term "cost method" with "at cost" in paragraph 37 of HKAS 7 following the prior deletion of the definition of "cost method". Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any impact on the Group's financial statements.

2.4 Material Accounting Policies

Investments in associates and joint ventures

An associate is an entity in which the Group has a long term interest of generally not less than 20% of the equity voting rights and over which it has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee, but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a type of joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint venture. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require the unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The Group's investments in associates and joint ventures are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at the Group's share of net assets under the equity method of accounting, less any impairment losses. Adjustments are made to bring into line any dissimilar accounting policies that may exist. The Group's share of the post-acquisition results and other comprehensive income of associates and joint ventures is included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and consolidated other comprehensive income, respectively. In addition, when there has been a change recognised directly in the equity of the associate or joint venture, the Group recognises its share of any changes, when applicable, in the consolidated statement of changes in equity. Unrealised gains and losses resulting from transactions between the Group and its associates or joint ventures are eliminated to the extent of the Group's investments in the associates, except where unrealised losses provide evidence of an impairment of the assets transferred. Goodwill arising from the acquisition of associates or joint ventures is included as part of the Group's investments in associates or joint ventures.



2.4 Material Accounting Policies *(continued)*

Business combinations other than those under common control and goodwill

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method. The consideration transferred is measured at the acquisition date fair value which is the sum of the acquisition date fair values of assets transferred by the Group, liabilities assumed by the Group to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the Group in exchange for control of the acquiree. For each business combination, the Group elects whether to measure the non-controlling interests in the acquiree at fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. All other components of non-controlling interests are measured at fair value. Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred.

The Group determines that it has acquired a business when the acquired set of activities and assets includes an input and a substantive process that together significantly contribute to the ability to create outputs.

When the Group acquires a business, it assesses the financial assets and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic circumstances and pertinent conditions as at the acquisition date. This includes the separation of embedded derivatives in host contracts of the acquiree.

If the business combination is achieved in stages, the previously held equity interest is remeasured at its acquisition date fair value and any resulting gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Any contingent consideration to be transferred by the acquirer is recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. Contingent consideration classified as an asset or liability is measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration that is classified as equity is not remeasured and subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

Goodwill is initially measured at cost, being the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred, the amount recognised for non-controlling interests and any fair value of the Group's previously held equity interests in the acquiree over the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If the sum of this consideration and other items is lower than the fair value of the net assets acquired, the difference is, after reassessment, recognised in profit or loss as a gain on bargain purchase.

After initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Goodwill is tested for impairment annually or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired. The Group performs its annual impairment test of goodwill as at 31 December. For the purpose of impairment testing, goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the Group's cash-generating units, or groups of cash-generating units, that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the Group are assigned to those units or groups of units.

Impairment is determined by assessing the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit (group of cash-generating units) to which the goodwill relates. Where the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit (group of cash-generating units) is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised. An impairment loss recognised for goodwill is not reversed in a subsequent period.

Where goodwill has been allocated to a cash-generating unit (or group of cash-generating units) and part of the operation within that unit is disposed of, the goodwill associated with the operation disposed of is included in the carrying amount of the operation when determining the gain or loss on the disposal. Goodwill disposed of in these circumstances is measured based on the relative value of the operation disposed of and the portion of the cash-generating unit retained.

Fair value measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability, or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Group. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 — based on quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 — based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is observable, either directly or indirectly
- Level 3 — based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Where an indication of impairment exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required (other than deferred tax assets and investment properties), the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of the asset's or cash-generating unit's value in use and its fair value less costs of disposal, and is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or groups of assets, in which case the recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, a portion of the carrying amount of a corporate asset (e.g., a headquarters building) is allocated to an individual cash-generating unit if it can be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis or, otherwise, to the smallest group of cash-generating units.

An impairment loss is recognised only if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. An impairment loss is charged to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which it arises in those expense categories consistent with the function of the impaired asset.

An assessment is made at the end of each reporting period as to whether there is an indication that previously recognised impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount is estimated. A previously recognised impairment loss of an asset other than goodwill is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount of that asset, but not to an amount higher than the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of any depreciation/amortisation) had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of such an impairment loss is credited to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which it arises, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is accounted for in accordance with relevant accounting policy for that revalued asset.

Related parties

A party is considered to be related to the Group if:

- (a) the party is a person or a close member of that person's family and that person
 - (i) has control or joint control over the Group;
 - (ii) has significant influence over the Group; or
 - (iii) is a member of the key management personnel of the Group or of a parent of the Group;

or

- (b) the party is an entity where any of the following conditions applies:
- (i) the entity and the Group are members of the same group;
 - (ii) one entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or of a parent, subsidiary or fellow subsidiary of the other entity);
 - (iii) the entity and the Group are joint ventures of the same third party;
 - (iv) one entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity;
 - (v) the entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the Group or an entity related to the Group;
 - (vi) the entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (a);
 - (vii) a person identified in (a)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity); and
 - (viii) the entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the Group or to the parent of the Group.

Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use.

Expenditure incurred after items of property, plant and equipment have been put into operation, such as repairs and maintenance, is normally charged to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred. In situations where the recognition criteria are satisfied, the expenditure for a major inspection is capitalised in the carrying amount of the asset as a replacement. Where significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Group recognises such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Property, plant and equipment and depreciation *(continued)*

Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line basis to write off the cost of each item of property, plant and equipment to its residual value over its estimated useful life. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are as follows:

Buildings (excluding the right-of-use assets)	5% to 33%
Plant and machinery	9% to 33%
Furniture and fixtures	18% to 33%
Motor vehicles (excluding the right-of-use assets)	9% to 50%

Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, the cost of that item is allocated on a reasonable basis among the parts and each part is depreciated separately. Residual values, useful lives and the depreciation method are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at least at each financial year end.

An item of property, plant and equipment including any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss on disposal or retirement recognised in the statement of profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised is the difference between the net sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the relevant asset.

Investment properties

Investment properties are interests in land and buildings (including the leasehold property held as a right-of-use asset which would otherwise meet the definition of an investment property) held to earn rental income and/or for capital appreciation, rather than for use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes; or for sale in the ordinary course of business. Such properties are measured initially at cost, including transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are stated at fair value, which reflects market conditions at the end of each reporting period.

Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair values of investment properties are included in the statement of profit or loss in the year in which they arise.

Any gains or losses on the retirement or disposal of an investment property are recognised in the statement of profit or loss in the year of the retirement or disposal.

If a property occupied by the Group as an owner-occupied property becomes an investment property, the Group accounts for such property in accordance with the policy stated under "Property, plant and equipment and depreciation" up to the date of change in use, and any difference at that date between the carrying amount and the fair value of the property is accounted for as an asset revaluation reserve. For a transfer from properties under development or completed properties held for sale to investment properties, any difference between the fair value of the property at that date and its previous carrying amount is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

2.4 Material Accounting Policies *(continued)*

Intangible assets (other than goodwill)

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a business combination is the fair value at the date of acquisition. The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed to be either finite or indefinite. Intangible assets with finite lives are subsequently amortised over the useful economic life and assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. The amortisation period and the amortisation method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life are reviewed at least at each financial year end.

Software

Software is stated at cost less any impairment losses and is amortised on the straight-line basis over its estimated useful lives of 1 to 10 years.

Property management contracts acquired in business combinations

Property management contracts acquired in business combinations are recognised at fair value at the acquisition date and are amortised on the straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives of 2 to 4 years.

Customer relationships acquired in business combinations

Customer relationships acquired in business combinations are recognised at fair value at the acquisition date and are amortised on the straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives of 10 years. The Group estimates the useful life of the customer relationships and determines the amortisation periods with reference to its industry experience and taking into account the customer turnover history and expectation of the renewal pattern of property management contracts.

Non-compete agreements acquired in business combinations

Non-compete agreements acquired in business combinations are recognised at fair value at the acquisition date and are amortised on the straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives of 9 months to 7 years.

Leases

The Group assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Leases *(continued)*

Group as a lessee

The Group applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets. The Group recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets. At inception or on reassessment of a contract that contains a lease component and non-lease component(s), the Group adopts the practical expedient not to separate non-lease component(s) and to account for the lease component and the associated non-lease component(s) (e.g., property management services for leases of properties) as a single lease component.

(a) Right-of-use assets

Right-of-use assets are recognised at the commencement date of the lease (that is the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets (relate to the buildings and motor vehicles) are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Where applicable, the cost of a right-of-use asset also includes an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease terms and the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

Buildings	1 to 20 years
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If ownership of the leased asset transfers to the Group by the end of the lease term or the cost reflects the exercise of a purchase option, depreciation is calculated using the estimated useful life of the asset.

(b) Lease liabilities

Lease liabilities are recognised at the commencement date of the lease at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Group and payments of penalties for termination of a lease, if the lease term reflects the Group exercising the option to terminate the lease. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognised as an expense in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in lease payments (e.g., a change to future lease payments resulting from a change in an index or rate) or a change in assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

(c) Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of buildings (that is those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option). When the Group enters into a lease in respect of a low-value asset, the Group decides whether to capitalise the lease on a lease-by-lease basis. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Investments and other financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income, and fair value through profit or loss.

The classification of financial assets at initial recognition depends on the financial asset's contractual cash flow characteristics and the Group's business model for managing them. With the exception of trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a significant financing component, the Group initially measures a financial asset at its fair value plus in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs. Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient are measured at the transaction price determined under HKFRS 15 in accordance with the policies set out for "Revenue recognition" below.

In order for a financial asset to be classified and measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income, it needs to give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI") on the principal amount outstanding. Financial assets with cash flows that are not SPPI are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, irrespective of the business model.

The Group's business model for managing financial assets refers to how it manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows. The business model determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling the financial assets, or both. Financial assets classified and measured at amortised cost are held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows, while financial assets classified and measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are held within a business model with the objective of both holding to collect contractual cash flows and selling. Financial assets which are not held within the aforementioned business models are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the period generally established by regulation or convention in the marketplace are recognised on the trade date, that is, the date that the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Investments and other financial assets *(continued)*

Subsequent measurement

The subsequent measurement of financial assets depends on their classification as follows:

Financial assets at amortised cost (debt instruments)

Financial assets at amortised cost are subsequently measured using the effective interest method and are subject to impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are carried in the statement of financial position at fair value with net changes in fair value recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e., removed from the Group's consolidated statement of financial position) when:

- the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired; or
- the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a "pass-through" arrangement; and either (a) the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Group has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if, and to what extent, it has retained the risk and rewards of ownership of the asset. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset nor transferred control of the asset, the Group continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Group's continuing involvement. In that case, the Group also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Group has retained.

Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the Group could be required to repay.

2.4 Material Accounting Policies *(continued)*

Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises an allowance for expected credit losses ("**ECLs**") for all debt instruments not held at fair value through profit or loss. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

General approach

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12 months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of the timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

At each reporting date, the Group assesses whether the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition. When making the assessment, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition and considers reasonable and supportable information that is available without undue cost or effort, including historical and forward-looking information. The Group considers that there has been a significant increase in credit risk when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due.

The Group considers a financial asset to be in default when internal or external information indicates that the Group is unlikely to receive the outstanding contractual amounts in full before taking into account any credit enhancements held by the Group. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

Financial assets at amortised cost are subject to impairment under the general approach and they are classified within the following stages for measurement of ECLs except for trade receivables which apply the simplified approach as detailed below.

Simplified approach

For trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or when the Group applies the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a significant financing component, the Group applies the simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Under the simplified approach, the Group does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Group has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment.

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings, and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Group's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, interest-bearing bank and other borrowings and lease liabilities.

Subsequent measurement

The subsequent measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification as follows:

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit or loss.

Financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit or loss are designated at the initial date of recognition, and only if the criteria in HKFRS 9 are satisfied. Gains or losses on liabilities designated at fair value through profit or loss are recognised in the statement of profit or loss, except for the gains or losses arising from the Group's own credit risk which are presented in other comprehensive income with no subsequent reclassification to the statement of profit or loss. The net fair value gain or loss recognised in the statement of profit or loss does not include any interest charged on these financial liabilities.

Financial liabilities at amortised cost

After initial recognition, trade payables, other payables and accruals, and interest-bearing bank and other borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost. Gains and losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the effective interest rate amortisation process.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. The effective interest rate amortisation is included in finance costs in the statement of profit or loss.

Financial guarantee contracts

Financial guarantee contracts issued by the Group are those contracts that require a payment to be made to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because the specified debtor fails to make a payment when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument. A financial guarantee contract is recognised initially as a liability at its fair value, adjusted for transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issuance of the guarantee. Subsequent to initial recognition, the Group measures the financial guarantee contracts at the higher of: (i) the ECL allowance determined in accordance with the policy as set out in "Impairment of financial assets"; and (ii) the amount initially recognised less, when appropriate, the cumulative amount of income recognised.

2.4 Material Accounting Policies *(continued)*

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled, or expires.

When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and a recognition of a new liability, and the difference between the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the statement of financial position if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position comprise cash on hand and at banks, and short term highly liquid deposits with a maturity of generally within three months that are readily convertible in to known amounts of cash, subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value and held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments.

For the purpose of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and at banks, and short-term deposits as defined above, less bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Group's cash management.

Provisions

A provision is recognised when a present obligation (legal or constructive) has arisen as a result of a past event and it is probable that a future outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, provided that a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

When the effect of discounting is material, the amount recognised for a provision is the present value at the end of the reporting period of the future expenditures expected to be required to settle the obligation. The increase in the discounted present value amount arising from the passage of time is included in finance costs in the statement of profit or loss.

Income tax

Income tax comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period, taking into consideration interpretations and practices prevailing in the countries in which the Group operates.

Deferred tax is provided, using the liability method, on all temporary differences at the end of the reporting period between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Income tax *(continued)*

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except:

- when the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences; and
- in respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures, when the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, and the carryforward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carryforward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised, except:

- when the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary differences arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences; and
- in respect of deductible temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures, deferred tax assets are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that the temporary differences will reverse in the foreseeable future and taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at the end of each reporting period and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if and only if the Group has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets and current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entities which intend either to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously, in each future period in which significant amounts of deferred tax liabilities or assets are expected to be settled or recovered.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods that the costs, for which it is intended to compensate, are expensed.

Revenue recognition

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of goods or services is transferred to the customers at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Group expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services.

When the consideration in a contract includes a variable amount, the amount of consideration is estimated to which the Group will be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods or services to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and constrained until it is highly probable that a significant revenue reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur when the associated uncertainty with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved.

When the contract contains a financing component which provides the customer with a significant benefit of financing the transfer of goods or services to the customer for more than one year, revenue is measured at the present value of the amount receivable, discounted using the discount rate that would be reflected in a separate financing transaction between the Group and the customer at contract inception. When the contract contains a financing component which provides the Group with a significant financial benefit for more than one year, revenue recognised under the contract includes the interest expense accreted on the contract liability under the effective interest method. For a contract where the period between the payment by the customer and the transfer of the promised goods or services is one year or less, the transaction price is not adjusted for the effects of a significant financing component, using the practical expedient in HKFRS 15.

(a) Residential property management services

The Group provides residential property management services, pre-sale management services and community value-added services related to the residential properties to property developers, property owners, property owners' associations or residents.

- (i) For residential property management services, the Group bills a fixed amount for services provided on a monthly or quarterly basis and recognises as revenue in the amount to which the Group has a right to invoice and that corresponds directly with the value of performance completed.
- (ii) Pre-sale management services mainly include cleaning, security and maintenance services for pre-sale display units and sales offices to property developers at the pre-delivery stage. The Group agrees the price for each service with the property developers upfront, issues the monthly bill to the property developers which varies based on the actual level of service completed in that month, and recognises revenue in the amount to which the Group has a right to invoice and that corresponds directly with the value of performance completed.
- (iii) For community value-added services, such as resident services and property agency services to property developers, revenue is recognised when the related value-added services are rendered. Payment of the transaction is due immediately when the value-added services are rendered to the customer.

(b) Non-residential property management and commercial operational services

The Group provides commercial property management services, pre-sale management services, commercial operational services and other value-added services related to the commercial properties, including office buildings and shopping malls, to property developers, owners of the commercial properties or tenants.

- (i) The Group enters into commercial property management service contracts with property owners or tenants, pursuant to which the Group provides commercial property management services including file management, cleaning, security and maintenance services.

For the provision of commercial property management services to property owners or tenants at the operation stage of the commercial properties, the Group recognises the fee received or receivable as its revenue over time in the period in which the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits provided by the services performed by the Group and all the related management costs as its cost of services.

- (ii) The Group enters into pre-sale management services with property developers or owners of the commercial properties, pursuant to which the Group provides cleaning, security and maintenance services for pre-sale display units and sales offices at the pre-delivery stage. The Group agrees the price for each service with the customers upfront and issues the monthly bill to the customers which varies based on the actual level of service completed in that month.

- (iii) The Group enters into commercial operational service contracts with property developers or owners of office buildings and shopping malls, pursuant to which the Group provides the following services:

- preliminary planning and consultancy services, tenant sourcing services, and marketing and promotion services to property owners during the preparation stage; and
- commercial operational services during the operation stage, including tenant management services.

Revenue in respect of the provision of preliminary planning and consultancy services, tenant sourcing services, and marketing and promotion services was recognised over the period of the contract by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of the performance obligation.

For commercial operational services during the operational stage, the Group bills a service fee based on a net basis with respect to shopping malls or a profit mark-up on top of cost with respect to office buildings.

(b) Non-residential property management and commercial operational services (continued)

- (iv) The Group provides other value-added services including mainly car parks, advertising spaces and common area management services.

When the Group leases car parks from property developers and operates the leased car parks, revenue is recognised when the related service is rendered. The Group bills a fixed amount for services provided on a monthly basis and recognises as revenue in the amount to which the Group has a right to invoice and that corresponds directly with the value of performance completed.

For property management service income from properties managed under a lump sum basis, where the Group acts as a principal and is primarily responsible for providing the property management services to the property owners, the Group recognises the fee received or receivable from property owners as its revenue and all related property management costs as its cost of services. For property management service income from properties managed under a commission basis, the Group recognises the revenue, which is calculated by a certain percentage of the total property management fee received or receivable from the property units on behalf of the property owners, for arranging and monitoring the services as provided by other suppliers to the property owners.

Other income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method by applying the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts over the expected life of the financial instrument or a shorter period, when appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is recognised when a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the Group transfers the related goods or services. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Group performs under the contract (i.e., transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer).

Share-based payments

The Company operates a share option scheme. Employees (including directors) of the Group receive remuneration in the form of share-based payments, whereby employees render services in exchange for equity instruments ("**equity-settled transactions**").

The cost of equity-settled transactions with employees is measured by reference to the fair value at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by an external valuer using a binomial model, further details of which are given in note 29 to the financial statements.

Share-based payments *(continued)*

The cost of equity-settled transactions is recognised in employee benefit expense, together with a corresponding increase in equity, over the period in which the performance and/or service conditions are fulfilled. The cumulative expense recognised for equity-settled transactions at the end of each reporting period until the vesting date reflects the extent to which the vesting period has expired and the Group's best estimate of the number of equity instruments that will ultimately vest. The charge or credit to the statement of profit or loss for a period represents the movement in the cumulative expense recognised as at the beginning and end of that period.

Service and non-market performance conditions are not taken into account when determining the grant date fair value of awards, but the likelihood of the conditions being met is assessed as part of the Group's best estimate of the number of equity instruments that will ultimately vest. Market performance conditions are reflected within the grant date fair value. Any other conditions attached to an award, but without an associated service requirement, are considered to be non-vesting conditions. Non-vesting conditions are reflected in the fair value of an award and lead to an immediate expensing of an award unless there are also service and/or performance conditions.

For awards that do not ultimately vest because non-market performance and/or service conditions have not been met, no expense is recognised. Where awards include a market or non-vesting condition, the transactions are treated as vesting irrespective of whether the market or non-vesting condition is satisfied, provided that all other performance and/or service conditions are satisfied.

Where the terms of an equity-settled award are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the terms had not been modified, if the original terms of the award are met. In addition, an expense is recognised for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based payments, or is otherwise beneficial to the employee as measured at the date of modification.

Where an equity-settled award is cancelled, it is treated as if it had vested on the date of cancellation, and any expense not yet recognised for the award is recognised immediately. This includes any award where non-vesting conditions within the control of either the Group or the employee are not met. However, if a new award is substituted for the cancelled award, and is designated as a replacement award on the date that it is granted, the cancelled and new awards are treated as if they were a modification of the original award, as described in the previous paragraph.

The dilutive effect of outstanding options is reflected as additional share dilution in the computation of earnings per share.

Other employee benefits

Pension schemes

The employees of the Group's subsidiaries which operate in Chinese Mainland are required to participate in a central pension scheme operated by the local municipal governments. These subsidiaries are required to contribute a certain portion of their payroll costs to the central pension scheme. The contributions are charged to the statement of profit or loss as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the central pension scheme.

The Group also operates pension scheme under the rules and regulations of the Mandatory Provident Fund ("MPF") Scheme Ordinance (the "**MPF Scheme**") for all its qualifying employees in Hong Kong, further details of which are given in note 27 to the financial statement. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the Group, in funds under the control of trustees. Under the rules of the MPF Scheme, the employer and its employees are each required to make contributions to the scheme at rates specified in the rules.

Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, i.e., assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are capitalised as part of the cost of those assets. The capitalisation of such borrowing costs ceases when the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred. Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds.

Events after the reporting period

If the Group receives information after the reporting period, but prior to the date of authorisation for issue, about conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period, it will assess whether the information affects the amounts that it recognises in its financial statements. The Group will adjust the amounts recognised in its financial statements to reflect any adjusting events after the reporting period and update the disclosures that relate to those conditions in light of the new information. For non-adjusting events after the reporting period, the Group will not change the amounts recognised in its financial statements, but will disclose the nature of the non-adjusting events and an estimate of their financial effects, or a statement that such an estimate cannot be made, if applicable.

Dividends

Final dividends are recognised as a liability when they are approved by the shareholders in a general meeting. Proposed final dividends are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Interim dividends are simultaneously proposed and declared, because the Company's memorandum and articles of association grant the directors the authority to declare interim dividends. Consequently, interim dividends are recognised immediately as a liability when they are proposed and declared.



2.4 Material Accounting Policies *(continued)*

Foreign currencies

The financial statements is presented in RMB. Each entity in the Group determines its own functional currency and items included in the financial statements of each entity are measured using that functional currency. Foreign currency transactions recorded by the entities in the Group are initially recorded using their respective functional currency rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency rates of exchange ruling at the end of the reporting period.

Differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in the statement of profit or loss. These are recognised in other comprehensive income until the net investment is disposed of, at which time the cumulative amount is reclassified to the statement of profit or loss. Tax charges and credits attributable to exchange differences on those monetary items are also recorded in other comprehensive income.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was measured. The gain or loss arising on translation of a non-monetary item measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation difference on the item whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in other comprehensive income or profit or loss is also recognised in other comprehensive income or profit or loss, respectively).

In determining the exchange rate on initial recognition of the related asset, expense or income on the derecognition of a non-monetary asset or non-monetary liability relating to an advance consideration, the date of initial transaction is the date on which the Group initially recognises the non-monetary asset or non-monetary liability arising from the advance consideration. If there are multiple payments or receipts in advance, the Group determines the transaction date for each payment or receipt of the advance consideration.

The functional currency of the Company and certain of its Hong Kong and overseas subsidiaries is the Hong Kong dollar ("HK\$"). As at the end of the reporting period, the assets and liabilities of these entities are translated into RMB at the exchange rates prevailing at the end of the reporting period and their statements of profit or loss are translated into RMB at the exchange rates that approximate to those prevailing at the dates of the transactions. The resulting exchange differences are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the exchange reserve. On disposal of a foreign operation, the component of other comprehensive income relating to that particular foreign operation is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Any goodwill arising on the acquisition of a foreign operation and any fair value adjustments to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities arising on acquisition are treated as assets and liabilities of the foreign operation and translated at the closing rate.

For the purpose of the consolidated statement of cash flows, the cash flows of the Company, and its Hong Kong and overseas subsidiaries are translated into RMB at the exchange rates ruling at the dates of the cash flows. Frequently recurring cash flows of the Company and its overseas subsidiaries which arise throughout the reporting period are translated into RMB at the weighted average exchange rates for the reporting period.

3. Significant Accounting Judgements and Estimates

The preparation of the Group's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and their accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of the assets or liabilities affected in the future.

Estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below.

Impairment of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations

The Group determines whether goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combinations is impaired at least on an annual basis. This requires an estimation of the value in use of the cash-generating units to which the goodwill is allocated. Estimating the value in use requires the Group to make an estimate of the expected future cash flows from the cash-generating units and also to choose a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows. The net carrying amount of goodwill and other intangible assets arising from business combination at 31 December 2025 were approximately RMB630,120,000 and RMB299,563,000 respectively (2024: approximately RMB713,896,000 and RMB364,385,000 respectively). Further details are given in note 16 and note 17 to the financial statements.

Provision for expected credit losses on trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets

The Group uses a provision matrix to calculate ECLs for trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets. The provision rates are based on days past due for groupings of various customer segments that have similar loss patterns (i.e., by customer type and rating).

The provision matrix is initially based on the Group's historical observed default rates. The Group will calibrate the matrix to adjust the historical credit loss experience with forward-looking information. For instance, if forecast economic conditions are expected to deteriorate over the next year which can lead to an increased number of defaults in the property development sector, the historical default rates are adjusted. At each reporting date, the historical observed default rates are updated and changes in the forward-looking estimates are analysed.

The assessment of the correlation among historical observed default rates, forecast economic conditions and ECLs is a significant estimate. The amount of ECLs is sensitive to changes in circumstances and forecast economic conditions. The Group's historical credit loss experience and forecast of economic conditions may also not be representative of a customer's actual default in the future. The information about the ECLs on the Group's trade receivables and prepayments, other receivables and other assets is disclosed in note 21 and note 22 to the financial statements, respectively.

Estimation uncertainty *(Continued)*

Deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for unused tax losses to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses can be utilised. Significant management judgement is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and level of future taxable profits together with future tax planning strategies. The carrying value of deferred tax assets relating to recognised tax losses at 31 December 2025 were approximately RMB3,680,000 (2024: approximately RMB25,807,000). The amount of unrecognised tax losses at 31 December 2025 were approximately RMB108,304,000 (2024: approximately RMB12,979,000). Further details are contained in note 20 to the financial statements.

4. Operating Segment Information

For management purposes, the Group is organised into two reportable operating segments as follows:

- (a) Residential property management services; and
- (b) Non-residential property management and commercial operational services.

Management monitors the results of the Group's operating segments separately for the purpose of making decisions about resource allocation and performance assessment. Segment performance is evaluated based on reportable segment profit, which is a measure of adjusted profit before tax. The adjusted profit before tax is measured consistently with the Group's profit before tax except that interest income, finance costs, as well as head office and corporate income and expenses are excluded from such measurement.

The revenue from external customers reported to management is measured as segment revenue, which is the revenue derived from the customers in each segment.

No analysis of segment assets and segment liabilities is presented as this information is not regularly provided to management for review.

Pre-tax discount rate — Reflects the current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to each of the group of CGUs.

The values assigned to the key assumptions are consistent with external information sources.

As of 31 December 2025, the recoverable amount of the Gangyu Enterprise asset group, calculated using the discounted future cash flow method, was approximately RMB213,830,000, which exceeded its carrying amount, incurring a headroom of approximately RMB127,292,000.

As of 31 December 2025, the operating profit of Guangzhou Runtong asset group continued to decline, with a projected future net cash outflow, and the net amount of fair value less disposal costs was close to zero. Therefore, the recoverable amount of this asset group was zero. Since the goodwill arising from the acquisition of Guangzhou Runtong was fully impaired in prior years, no further impairment is made for the year. As of 31 December 2025, the original amount of Guangzhou Runtong's goodwill was approximately RMB125,490,000, with the cumulative impairment of approximately RMB125,490,000 (2024: the cumulative impairment of approximately RMB125,490,000).

27. Long service payment obligations

Pursuant to the Hong Kong Employment Ordinance, Chapter 57, Hong Kong employees that have been employed continuously for at least five years are entitled to long service payment ("**LSP**") under certain circumstances (e.g. dismissal by employers or upon retirement).

The amount of LSP payable is determined with reference to the employee's last monthly salary (capped at HK\$22,500) and the years of service, reduced by the amount of any accrued benefits derived from the Group's contributions to MPF Scheme, with an overall cap of HK\$390,000 per employee. Currently, the Group does not have any separate funding arrangement in place to meet its LSP obligations.

In June 2022, the Hong Kong SAR Government (the "**HK Government**") gazetted the Hong Kong Employment and Retirement Schemes Legislation (Offsetting Arrangement) (Amendment) Ordinance 2022 (the "**Amendment Ordinance**") with effective on 1 May 2025 (the "**Transition Date**"). The Amendment Ordinance abolishes the use of the accrued benefits derived from employers' mandatory MPF contributions to offset the LSP. Separately, the HK Government has indicated that it would launch a subsidy scheme to assist employers after the abolition.

Among other things, once the abolition of the offsetting mechanism takes effect, an employer can no longer use any of the accrued benefits derived from its mandatory MPF contributions (irrespective of the contributions made before, on or after the Transition Date) to reduce the LSP in respect of an employee's service from the Transition Date. However, where an employee's employment commenced before the Transition Date, the employer can continue to use the above accrued benefits to reduce the LSP in respect of the employee's service up to that date. In addition, the LSP in respect of the service before the Transition Date will be calculated based on the employee's monthly salary immediately before the Transition Date and the years of service up to that date.

The benefit payment under LSP remains capped at HK\$390,000 per employee. If an employee's total benefit payment exceeds HK\$390,000, the amount in excess of the cap is deducted from the portion accrued from the Transition Date.

The Group assessed that there were no impacts of the LSP obligation due to the Amendment Ordinance on the consolidated financial statements of the Group.

29. Employees Share Schemes

(a) Share Option Scheme

Pursuant to the shareholder's resolutions of the Company passed on 3 June 2021, the Company has adopted a share option scheme (the **"Share Option Scheme"**) for the purpose of providing incentives and rewards to SO Eligible Participants (as defined hereinbelow) who will contribute and has contributed to the success of the Group's operations. SO Eligible Participants include any full-time or part-time employees, executives or officers of the Company or any of its subsidiaries and any directors (including executive directors, non-executive directors and independent non-executive directors) of the Company or any of its subsidiaries. Upon becoming effective, the Share Option Scheme will remain in force for 10 years from that date.

The maximum number of shares that may be issued upon the exercise of the options that may be granted under the Share Option Scheme is 10% of the total number of issued shares as at the date of the adoption of the Share Option Scheme. The aggregate number of shares which may be issued upon the exercise of all options that may be granted under the Share Option Scheme has not exceeded 30% of the shares in issue as at the latest practicable date. The maximum number of shares issuable under share options to each SO Eligible Participant in the Share Option Scheme within any 12-month period is limited to 1% of the shares of the Company in issue at any time. Any further grant of share options in excess of this limit is subject to the issue of a circular by the Company and the shareholders' approval in a general meeting.

Share options granted to a director, chief executive or substantial shareholder of the Company, or to any of their associates, are subject to approval in advance by the independent non-executive directors. In addition, any share options granted to a substantial shareholder or an independent non-executive director of the Company, or to any of their associates, in excess of 0.1% of the shares of the Company in issue at any time and with an aggregate value (based on the price of the Company's shares at the date of grant) in excess of HK\$5,000,000 or such other sum as may be from time to time provided under the Listing Rules, within any 12-month period, are subject to the issue of a circular by the Company and the shareholders' approval in advance in a general meeting.

An option may be exercised in accordance with the terms of the Share Option Scheme at any time after the date upon which the option is deemed to be granted and accepted and prior to the expiry of 10 years from that date. The period during which an option may be exercised will be determined by the board of directors of the Company in its absolute discretion, save that no option may be exercised more than 10 years after it has been granted.

The exercise price of share options is determinable by the directors, but may not be less than the highest of (i) the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited closing price of the Company's shares on the date of offer of the share options; (ii) the average Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited closing price of the Company's shares for the five trading days immediately preceding the date of offer; and (iii) the nominal value of a share of the Company.

Share options do not confer rights on the holders to dividends or to vote at shareholders' meetings.

On 23 July 2021, the Company granted 594,000 share options to the grantees, including certain employees of the Group.

The exercise in full of the outstanding share options would, under the present capital structure of the Company, result in the issue of 189,000 (2024: 270,000) additional ordinary shares of the Company and additional share capital of HK\$1,890 (2024: HK\$2,700) (before issue expenses).

The Group recognised no gains or expenses for the year ended 31 December 2025 (2024: total expense of approximately RMB39,000) in relation to share options granted by the Company with corresponding change in share option reserve.

The number of share options granted that are expected to be vested has been reduced to reflect the management's best estimate of lapse of options granted prior to the completion of the vesting period and accordingly the share option expense has been adjusted. At the end of the reporting period, the Group revised its estimates of the number of options that are expected to ultimately vest.

(b) Share Award Scheme

The share award scheme was adopted by the Board on 23 July 2021 (the "**Share Award Scheme**") in order to recognise the contributions by certain employees including certain former executive directors of the Company and/or members of the Group (the "**SA Eligible Participant**"). Subject to the rules of the Share Award Scheme (the "**Scheme Rules**"), the Board may, from time to time, at its absolute discretion select any SA Eligible Participant (other than any excluded participant as defined under the Scheme Rules) for participation in the Share Award Scheme as a selected participant (the "**Selected Participant**"), and determine the number of shares to be granted to the Selected Participant.

The Share Award Scheme shall be valid and effective for a term of 10 years commencing on the date of adoption. Pursuant to the Share Award Scheme, the trustee, Computershare Hong Kong Trustees Limited and any additional or replacement trustee, shall purchase from the open market or subscribe for the relevant number of shares awarded and shall hold such shares on trust for the Selected Participants until they are vested in the relevant Selected Participant in accordance with the provisions of the Share Award Scheme. The Board, through its authorised representative(s), shall cause to pay to the trustee the subscription or purchase price for the shares and the related expenses from the Company's resources.

The Board shall not make any further award of awarded shares which will result in the total number of shares granted under the Share Award Scheme exceeding 5% of the total number of issued Shares of the Company from the date of adoption. If the relevant subscription or purchase would result in the trustee holding in aggregate, more than 5% of the total number of issued shares of the Company as of the adoption date, the trustee shall not subscribe or purchase any further shares.

(b) Capital reserve

In March 2020, as part of the reorganisation, Guangdong Hejing Youhuo, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company, acquired 100% equity interests in Ningjun Property and its subsidiaries with a capital injection of RMB63,000,000 to Ningjun Property and a cash consideration of RMB34,550,000 to Total Super, a wholly-owned subsidiary of KWG Holdings. As both parties were under control of KWG Holdings before and after the combination and such control was not provisional, this combination was a business combination involving entities under common control. The difference of RMB27,550,000 between (i) the cash consideration of RMB34,550,000 and (ii) the outstanding merger reserve of RMB7,000,000 was debited to the capital reserve.

On 24 June 2020, KWG Holdings, the then sole shareholder of Happy Harmony, which in turn holds one ordinary share of the Company, approved the transfer of the entire issued share capital of Happy Harmony (the **"Transferred Share"**) to an employee (the **"Employee"**), at a consideration of US\$6,075,000. The consideration was fully settled on 24 June 2020 and has been funded by an interest-free loan from Mr. KONG Jianmin (the **"Loan"**), one of the Company's controlling shareholders. Upon completion of the aforesaid share transfer and immediately after the subscription of 35 shares of the Company by KWG Holdings at par on 24 June 2020, KWG Holdings and the Employee through Happy Harmony held 97.22% and 2.78% equity interests in the Company, respectively. The share transferred to the Employee constitutes a share-based payment arrangement under HKFRS 2 *Share-based Payment* and the share-based payment expense which represents the difference of RMB320,000 between (i) the fair value of the Transferred Share and (ii) the consideration of US\$6,075,000 was charged to profit or loss as an expense in full immediately upon the completion of the share transfer with a corresponding increase in capital reserve of approximately RMB320,000 during the year ended 31 December 2021. The deemed interest expense of the Loan to the Employee, calculated based on the outstanding Loan principal and a general market interest rate that the Employee could possibly obtain from financial institutions in Hong Kong on an arm's length basis as of the date of the Loan agreement entered into between Mr. KONG Jianmin and the Employee, was charged to profit or loss with a corresponding increase in capital reserve of approximately RMB1,189,000 during the year ended 31 December 2025 (2024: approximately RMB1,189,000) to reflect the contribution to the Company from Mr. KONG Jianmin, one of the Company's controlling shareholders.

(c) Employee share-based compensation reserve

On 25 March 2022, the Group acquired Living Technology with 80% of equity interests. Before the acquisition, Living Technology has adopted an equity incentive plan granting share-based awards (the **"Award"**) by its original shareholder to specific employees containing with service vesting condition period from 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2022. The portion relating to the acquisition date fair value based measure of the Award that was attributable to precombination service was recognised as non-controlling interest and the portion relating to any remaining postcombination service was recognised as share-based compensation expenses with a corresponding increase in capital reserve of approximately RMB3,776,000 in the Group's consolidated financial statements.

No expenses or gains were recognised in profit or loss under the Share Option Scheme and the Share Award Scheme during the year ended 31 December 2025, and there were no corresponding movements in reserve (2024: an increase in reserve of approximately RMB39,000 under the Share Option Scheme and an increase of approximately RMB289,000 under the Share Award Scheme). Details of the employees' share schemes are disclosed in note 29 to the financial statements.

30. Reserves *(continued)***(d) Statutory surplus funds**

In accordance with the PRC Company Law and the articles of association of the subsidiaries established in the PRC, the Group is required to appropriate 10% of its net profit after tax, as determined under the Chinese Accounting Standards, to the statutory surplus funds until the reserve balance reaches 50% of its registered capital. Subject to certain restrictions set out in the relevant PRC regulations and in the articles of association of these subsidiaries, the statutory surplus funds may be used either to offset losses, or to be converted to increase the share capital of the subsidiaries provided that the balance after such conversion is not less than 25% of the registered capital of them. The reserve cannot be used for purposes other than those for which it is created and is not distributable as cash dividends.

The main purpose of these financial instruments is to raise finance for the Group's operations.

The main risks arising from the Group's financial instruments are foreign currency risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The Group's overall risk management programme focuses on minimising potential adverse effects of these risks, with a material impact, on the Group's financial performance. The board of directors of the Company reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below.

The Group's most businesses are mainly located in Chinese Mainland and the transactions are mainly conducted in RMB. Most of the Group's assets and liabilities are denominated in RMB. (b) Credit risk
