We also have a growing exposure to technology driven activities. The Group is actively seeking new development opportunities in emerging sectors that complement our existing and growing capabilities.

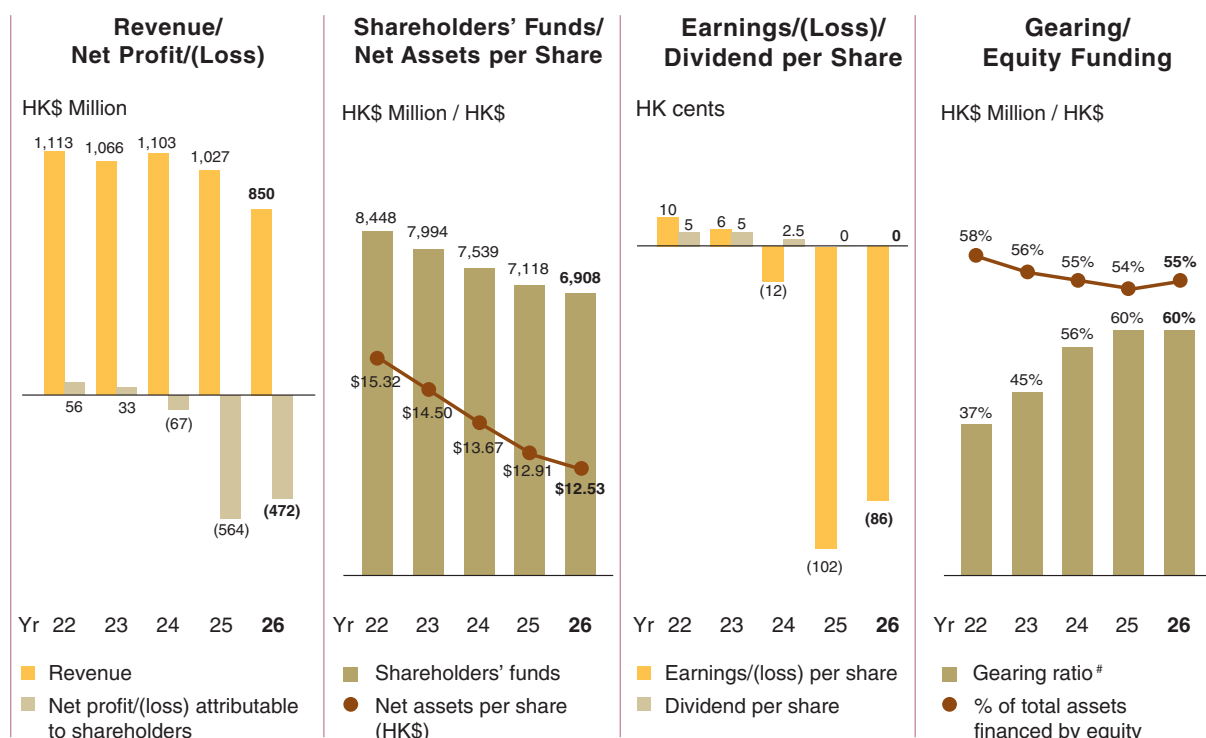

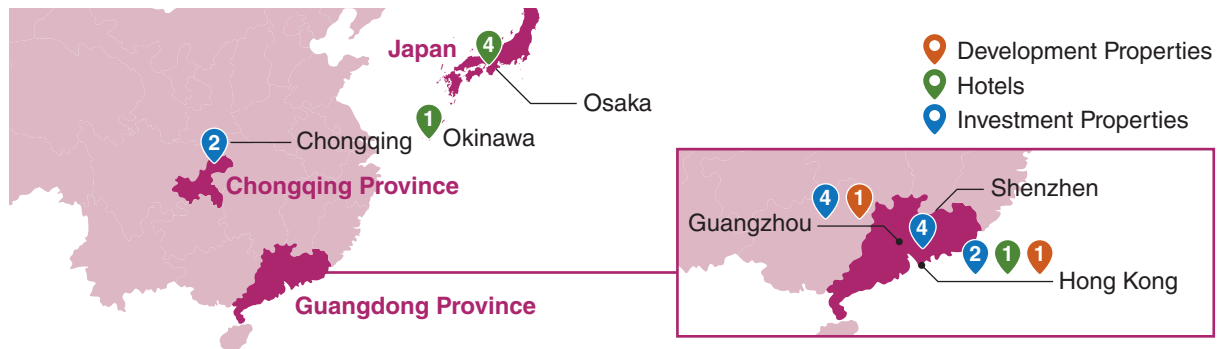

Dear Shareholders,

For the year ended 31 March 2026, we began to see signs of improvement across our core property markets after several brutal years. In Chinese Mainland, recovery is emerging, although unevenly, with higher-tier cities showing greater momentum. In Hong Kong, conditions are gradually finding a floor.

While these developments are encouraging, none of this has shown up in our numbers yet. Revenue and earnings were lower, primarily due to the expected decline in development property sales, only partially offset by stronger leasing income. Property valuation adjustments hit us again, although the declines in values began to ease in the second half. The one bright spot, shareholders' equity remained intact, and net assets per share attributable to shareholders held up well. It matters, but we aren't ready to start cheering.

RESILIENCE IN OUR CORE MARKETS

This was another challenging year for our property businesses in both Hong Kong and Chinese Mainland. The operating environment continues to be shaped by several powerful forces. Interest rates have remained higher for longer than many anticipated. Capital is available, but increasingly selective. At the same time, geopolitical tensions between the United States and China continue to influence investment decisions. Tariffs, technology restrictions and strategic competition are altering global capital flows and supply chains in ways that are likely to persist for years.

In China, policymakers have taken meaningful steps to support the economy and property market, including easing purchase restrictions, reducing mortgage rates and implementing measures to stimulate demand. These actions have helped stabilize transaction volumes. However, consumer and investor confidence is rebuilt over time, not overnight. That's just how people work.

Hong Kong's office market remains oversupplied and super competitive. Rental levels in prime locations have generally stabilized, while secondary markets remain under pressure. Retail activity has improved and residential transactions have increased, but a broad-based recovery in commercial real estate will likely be gradual.

Within our affiliated businesses, Chinney Alliance Group delivered mixed results. While its aviation systems business saw lower earnings, it continues to demonstrate significant long-term potential. Chinney Kin Wing's foundations business remained robust in 2025, although the broader construction sector in Hong Kong weakened during the year and is expected to remain subdued in 2026.

Against this backdrop, our businesses demonstrated resilience. Teams across the Group are taking decisive actions to navigate current conditions, restore profitability, and position for long-term growth.

ARTICULATING OUR VISION

Here's the reality check: many of the challenges facing the property sector today are not merely cyclical. Some are structural. Markets evolve. Industries change. Successful companies adapt. That's why we've made the call to pursue a broader and more ambitious vision for the Group.

Our strategy comes down to two things:

- To maximize value and returns from our existing property and related businesses; and
- To leverage our capabilities to develop complementary businesses that we believe can generate durable long-term shareholder value.

As the property industry evolves, new opportunities are emerging. We are increasingly deploying digital technologies to improve efficiency, strengthen asset management capabilities and enhance competitiveness.

At the same time, we are making deliberate moves into adjacent sectors where we see long-term potential, including intelligent automation, AI infrastructure, and digital solutions. These areas are attracting significant investment globally and are becoming increasingly important to the future competitiveness of businesses across industries.

Making this work means changing how we operate, upgrading our talent, and being more disciplined about where we put our capital. We've already started:

- Optimizing performance and returns across our property portfolio;
- Rationalizing business units to improve efficiency and strengthen earnings;
- Actively evaluating investment opportunities in strategic growth sectors; and
- Strengthening internal systems, governance and operating disciplines to support execution.

Transformation is never accomplished through vision alone. It requires consistent execution over time. We believe these initiatives will strengthen the Group's competitive position and create new avenues for long-term growth. I look forward to updating shareholders on our progress throughout the coming year.

STRENGTHENING OUR LEADERSHIP TEAM

A strategy is only as good as the people responsible for executing it. During the year, we strengthened our leadership team to ensure we have the depth of experience and capability required for the opportunities and challenges ahead.

Mr. Raymond Chow joined the Group as Managing Director with responsibility for enhancing the performance of our existing businesses while helping drive expansion into new growth areas. Raymond brings extensive experience across the Hong Kong property sector, as well as expertise in complex operating and corporate environments.

We also welcomed Mr. Winfred Fan as Finance Director. Having served as an Independent non-Executive Director since 2019, Winfred assumed an executive role during the year. His financial expertise, combined with his experience in technology-related businesses, will be valuable as we prepare the Group for an increasingly digital and AI-driven future.

In addition, Mr. Donald Lam has continued to make strong progress at Hon Kwok Land, improving portfolio performance and enhancing shareholder value following his transition to Managing Director.

LOOKING FURTHER AHEAD

Last year I said we looked like we'd stabilized on revaluation losses and trading performance. Broadly speaking, that assessment remains valid.

While geopolitical tensions have intensified in various parts of the world, economic conditions have evolved largely as anticipated.

China's policy measures have helped provide stability during a period of uncertainty, supporting confidence in both the Mainland and Hong Kong economies. We expect the Mainland's growth to stay on a steady path. Better external trade and continued policy support should help consumer confidence recover gradually.

Hong Kong's commitment to infrastructure is going to pay off for us down the road. And Hong Kong keeps cementing its place as a top global financial center. There's a real sense of long overdue optimism building across the Territory right now.

Technology and data infrastructure are going to keep pulling in capital. Every business is going to have to engage with this next wave of innovation, and we intend to be right in the middle of it. We're not waiting around for the future to happen to us. We're going after it.

The future will belong to organizations that are adaptable, disciplined and willing to invest through periods of uncertainty. Our vision reflects that belief, and we are committed to building the Group accordingly.

On behalf of the Board, I would like to thank my fellow Directors for their guidance and stewardship during the year. I also extend my sincere appreciation to our management team and employees for their commitment, professionalism and hard work in a demanding environment.

Finally, I would like to thank our shareholders, customers and business partners for their continued trust and support.

Our focus remains unchanged: protecting and growing shareholder value over the long term. We approach the future with confidence, discipline and a clear sense of purpose.

MANAGING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

PERFORMANCE

The Group's revenue decreased by 17.3% to HK\$850 million for the year ended 31 March 2026 (2025: HK\$1,027 million) and the operating profit before revaluation of investment properties, finance costs and income tax credit/(expense) was 27.6% lower at HK\$320 million (2025: HK\$442 million). The main driver of the lower revenue and operating profit was the reduction in contributions from the sale of development properties as activity decreased, which was anticipated.

Reflecting the ongoing subdued property markets in Hong Kong and Chinese Mainland, we marked down the Group's investment properties by a further 4.6%, with the majority of the decline being recorded in the first half. This produced a fair value loss of HK\$700 million for the full year, unchanged from the HK\$704 million loss recorded in 2025. Finance costs were reduced by 14.3% to HK\$313 million (2025: HK\$365 million). Overall, there was a loss attributable to equity holders of HK\$472 million, compared to a HK\$564 million loss in prior financial year. Basic loss per share for the year was HK\$0.86 (2025: loss of HK\$1.02).

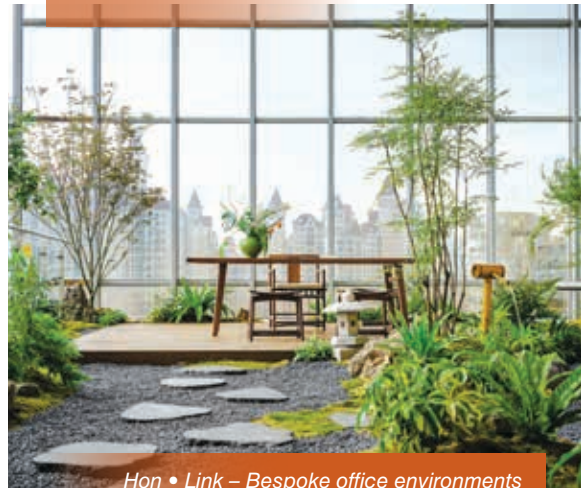
As at 31 March 2026, shareholders' equity was little changed at HK\$6,908 million (as at 31 March 2025: HK\$7,118 million), while net assets per share attributable to shareholders were HK\$12.53 (as at 31 March 2025: HK\$12.91).

HIGHLIGHTS THIS YEAR

Property

In the property sector there were a number of significant developments in the year under review for Hon Kwok Land. *The Riverside* in Guangzhou continued to sell, producing HK\$308 million in recognized revenue, as it benefited from its prime riverside location, premium product and disciplined pricing. Additional units were released during the year, and more are coming to market. The pipeline has real upside.

The *Guangzhou commercial cluster* (including Hon Kwok Building, Tung Hing Fong and Ganghui Dasha alongside *The Riverside*) is working well. Hon Kwok Building went from 5% occupancy to 54% during the year, and has since reached 89%. Tung Hing Fong retail went from 42% to 71%, and



is now at 99%. The strong improvements are reflective of a commercial district coming alive.

Shenzhen's *Hon Kwok City Commercial Centre* achieved 75% occupancy, up from 63%. A hotel operator was added to the top floors to improve the tenant mix and commercial offering. The building is targeting 80% occupancy by the end of the third quarter of 2026.

Japan remained a standout performer with the hotel portfolio running at 91% average occupancy as the Group captured Japan's inbound tourism boom. Two hotel assets were disposed of post-year-end at meaningful premiums to acquisition cost.

The *Bauhinia Hotel and Serviced Apartment* in Central, Hong Kong reopened in January 2026, and its early performance was strong. The property was refurbished with thought and care, updating the image with a new design, solar-integrated curtain wall, and enviable ESG credentials. This is a flagship asset that will contribute in the coming year and grow the recurring income base.

The *data centre in Kwai Chung* remains 100% leased on a long-term basis to a leading international operator and producing stable returns. The asset is exactly aligned with where intelligent infrastructure demand is heading.

The *South Bay luxury residential joint venture* is on schedule. The infrastructure will be completed by the third quarter of 2026, with initial viewings available by 2027.

Other

Within our construction and trading businesses, Chinney Alliance Group delivered an overall weaker result in 2025, mainly due to revaluation write-downs for property held by the Group alongside mixed performances from its businesses.

The group's mainstay General Contracting and Building Construction operations returned to profitability despite market challenges, helped by strict cost controls. Shun Cheong Engineering Group experienced a difficult year with pressures on cash flows and profitability, but the business is responding with a disciplined project selection, tighter cost control, and greater operational flexibility. In particular, it is growing its interests in new automation and digitisation in the construction sector by crossing new technology and E&M domestic knowledge. CSC Robotics, in which Shun Cheong Engineering Group has a 30% interest, is developing automated construction products for international markets and is showing promising progress.



Chinney Alliance Engineering, the aviation systems business had a weaker year. However, with Hong Kong's airport operating at record levels and Macau's expansion underway, demand for aviation systems, weather monitoring, radar, and anti-drone capabilities will continue to grow. The company is the leader in this business segment, and we see significant potential over the next five years.

Chinney Kin Wing produced a very creditable result in 2025 in a subdued construction sector that continued to weaken as the year progressed. Construction output is expected to contract further in 2026 intensifying competition for a limited pipeline of projects and driving down prices. The longer-term prospects, however, remain encouraging.

We are beginning to seek selective investments in businesses active in the fields of intelligent automation, AI infrastructure and digital solutions that align with our new strategy. We are building the nucleus of a team of executives with experience in the sector to lead our new initiative. Key will be taking a measured approach and concentrating on areas where we already possess related underlying business sector experience.

Developing our Capabilities

As the Group enters a period of change and realignment, we are taking actions necessary to strengthen capabilities, clarify accountability and improve operational efficiency. Where appropriate, our businesses are seeking to recruit selectively to address capability gaps, align headcounts with future-state operating models, match KPIs with strategic objectives and link compensation with measurable results.

Important will be the embedding of applied intelligence in our systems and workflows to improve automation and the availability of real-time reporting. Enhanced document workflows, improved cost controls and risk reduction are benefits we see stemming from our initiatives in these areas.

We shall be taking our people along with us on this journey in areas such as targeted training for new systems, leadership pathways and succession planning. It will be an exciting time to work with the Group.

ESG

The Group is committed to building a better future by incorporating sustainability practices into its day-to-day operations. We give our best efforts to manage all risks relating to ESG which we believe provide an essential dimension to the quality of products and services that we provide with pride.

Among the highlights this year were the LEED Platinum Certification, the highest globally recognized tier of green building achievement, received by Hon Kwok Land's Shenzhen Hon Kwok City Commercial Centre in September 2025. Meanwhile, Chinney Kin Wing received the Harmony@Workplace Organisation 2025-26 (Branch/SMEs Category) Merit Award from Hong Kong's Department of Health, Labour Department, and Occupational Safety and Health Council.

Our 2025/26 Environmental, Social and Governance Report provides the full extent the Group's ESG performance, including the work we have undertaken with our stakeholders to incorporate their expectations and opinions into our projects and operations.

LOOKING AHEAD

My focus in the year ahead is on implementing our Vision, as outlined by the Chairman.

In our property business we are entering a phase of stabilization. The priorities are straightforward and deliverable: maintain financial discipline, keep building recurring income, drive occupancy across every asset, and recycle capital when good prices are offered. We have a portfolio of investment properties that in a normalized environment will generate substantially more income than they do today.

Elsewhere, in our building services interests the goals in the businesses are run efficiently in what is expected to be a relatively slow year, but we are hopeful for the markets to pick up in the next year or two. We shall be looking at ways that we can control costs and increase efficiencies, as well as bring into the operations the benefits of AI infrastructure and new digital solutions that we believe can radically enhance operating performances.

We shall also be seeking further opportunities to play a pro-active role in new sectors that leverage our skills, expertise and passion in the new technologies where we see our homeland, the Greater Bay Area, as a future global hub for development.

BUSINESS REVIEW

The Group continued to focus on property development and property investment businesses, mainly conducted by Hon Kwok Group with regional focus in Hong Kong, Chinese Mainland and Japan. In addition, the Group is interested in construction and trading through Chinney Alliance Group.

PROPERTY

During the year, Hon Kwok Land continued to focus on property development, property investment, property management services and hotel operations in Hong Kong, the Chinese Mainland and Japan.

As part of its macroeconomic policies to further strengthen domestic consumption, the Mainland Government relaxed home purchase restrictions, reduced the minimum down payment ratio and lowered housing loan interest rates to support the real estate market and stimulate housing demand. Residential property transaction volumes showed a gradual recovery. The general market in Guangzhou has been recovering slowly, but sales of The Riverside in Guangzhou remained stable, supported by its prime location and premium quality.

During the year, the number of visitor arrivals to Hong Kong and overnight stays continued to increase. The Group's hotel and serviced apartment operations in Central, Hong Kong have delivered strong revenue growth since its reopening in January 2026.

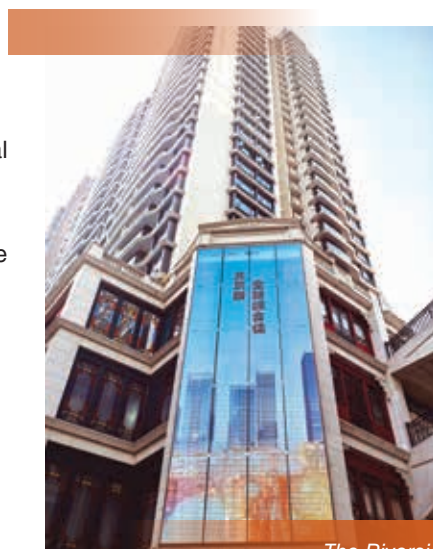
The leasing markets in Hong Kong and the Chinese Mainland remained challenging. Driven by contributions from its newly built retail and office properties in Guangzhou and its newly acquired hotel portfolio in Japan, the Group recorded an increase in rental income despite the prevailing market slowdown. The Group remains confident in the demand for grade A offices as prospective tenants continue their flight to quality towards premium buildings in prime locations. The Group's unique range of self-developed leasing products such as Hon • Link, Hon • Work and Hon • Cowork that designed to address the evolving needs of modern businesses has been well received in the market since their launch. Each product offering provides tailored workspace solutions that combine flexibility, functionality and premium service quality.

(i) Property Development

(1) *The Riverside* 港匯臺, Guangzhou

The Riverside is one of the few new riverside residential developments in Beijing Road of Guangzhou. It offers ready-for-sale residential units with prime orientations overlooking the Pearl River, featuring premium high-rise residences with a distinctive retro-style Qilou design and high-quality finishes. By the end of 2025, four residential units previously subject to a court-ordered restriction were released and available for sale. Up to 31 March 2026, 148 saleable units (previously 144) have been made available for sale and more will be made available in coming months. This is expected to bring additional revenue upside for the Group.

Since its launch for pre-sale in October 2023, The Riverside recorded a sale of 89 units as at the date of this report, with an aggregate sales amount of approximately HK\$926 million. Revenue of approximately HK\$308 million in respect of 34 fully paid and delivered units were recognised during the year, as compared to 40 units with the revenue of HK\$399 million recognized in the prior year.

(2) *Botanica 寶翠園, Guangzhou*

Botanica is a residential project located in Tianhe District of Guangzhou and was completed in 2016 with all residential units sold in prior years. The remaining car parking spaces were held as inventory, of which revenue of approximately HK\$8 million was recognised for the year (2025: HK\$45 million).

(3) *Metropolitan Oasis 雅瑤綠洲, Nanhai*

Metropolitan Oasis is a residential project located in Dali District of Foshan Nanhai and was completed in 2020. The remaining residential units were sold last year, with revenue of approximately HK\$84 million recognised in 2025. During the year, all the remaining car parking spaces and retail shops were fully sold, contributing approximately HK\$21 million to Hon Kwok Group's revenue.

(4) *Enterprise Square 僑城坊, Shenzhen*

The Enterprise Square is a large-scale, premium eco-friendly business complex located in the Overseas Chinese Town area of Nanshan District of Shenzhen, with a total gross floor area of approximately 224,500 square meters. The project comprises 12 standalone buildings and integrates a diverse range of functions, including premium luxury residential apartment, offices buildings and commercial mall. The unsold residential units are classified

as properties held for sale, the office tower and commercial mall are recognized as investment properties for rental income generation, with a stable occupancy rate of 90% as at the year-end date. During the year, Enterprise Square recorded total revenue of approximately HK\$189 million (2025: HK\$172 million), comprising both property sales and rental income. The complex recorded a net loss attributable to Hon Kwok Group, after deducted fair value loss on investment properties, amounted to approximately HK\$7 million (2025: net profit of HK\$0.2 million).

(5) *Development project on South Bay Road, Repulse Bay*

The Repulse Bay project is located at traditional luxury residential area in Repulse Bay whereas Hon Kwok Group holds 50% equity interest. It is being developed into luxury residences with endless intoxicating sea views, featuring a stunning panoramic view of Repulse Bay. The development project is expected to be completed in 2028.

BUSINESS REVIEW *(Continued)*

(ii) Property Investment

The Group's investment properties contributed rental income of approximately HK\$478 million (2025: HK\$453 million) to revenue for the year ended 31 March 2026, representing a year-on-year increase of 5.5%. The property portfolio comprises a diversified mix of retail, office, data centre and hotel properties located in Hong Kong, the Chinese Mainland and Japan, and is strategically positioned to capture growth opportunities and deliver steady long-term value. During the year, the Group's major property investment projects demonstrated strong resilience despite industry pressures, maintaining competitive rental levels and increasing occupancy rates at the forefront of the market.

(1) *Hon Kwok Building and Tung Hing Fong* 漢國大廈及同慶坊, Guangzhou

Hon Kwok Building is a 32-storey office tower with a gross floor area of approximately 31,300 square meters. Located at Beijing Road of Guangzhou and adjacent to The Riverside, the building sits within an area renowned for its rich historical character and ongoing urban revitalisation. The building has been awarded the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold certification. Completed in late 2024, Hon Kwok Building has demonstrated strong leasing momentum, with its occupancy rate surging from 5% in March 2025 to 54% by this financial year-end and further to 89% at the date of this report.

Tung Hing Fong is the retail component occupying the podium levels of The Riverside and Hon Kwok Building, comprising five exquisitely designed podium structures with distinctive retro-style Qilou design, it enjoys high pedestrian traffic in this prime location. The occupancy rate of Tung Hing Fong increased significantly from 42% in March 2025 to 71% by this financial year-end and further to 99% at the date of this report.



(2) *Ganghui Dasha* 港滙大廈, Guangzhou

Ganghui Dasha is a 20-storey commercial and office building with a total gross floor area of approximately 13,000 square meters. As at the year-end date, Ganghui Dasha achieved an improvement in occupancy rate to 85% from 79% in the previous year.

It is located along Beijing Road of Guangzhou in close proximity to The Riverside. Ganghui Dasha, Hon Kwok Building and Tung Hing Fong together form an integrated cluster of developments that create strong synergy in attracting high pedestrian traffic. They contribute to a vibrant and evolving commercial ecosystem, enhancing the overall vitality and attractiveness of the area.

(3) *Hon Kwok City Commercial Centre* 漢國城市商業中心, *Shenzhen*

Hon Kwok City Commercial Centre is a landmark 75-storey office tower rising 330 meters above the ground with a total gross floor area of approximately 128,000 square meters. The building is located in the prime commercial district of Futian in Shenzhen. It offers high-quality grade A office and retail component positioned at the heart of the Shenzhen Hong Kong Science and Technology Innovation Cooperation Zone. It was awarded the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum certification and continued to maintain the WELL Health-Safety Rating during the year.

During the year, the top nine floors were leased to a tenant for hotel operations under “InterCity” four-star brand. This arrangement is expected to enhance the building’s tenant mix and overall commercial offerings. As at the year-end date, Hon Kwok City Commercial Centre achieved an increase in overall occupancy rate to 75% from 63% in the previous year, with further growth expected to reach 80% by the end of the third quarter of 2026.



(4) *City Square and City Suites* 城市天地廣場及寶軒公寓, *Shenzhen*

City Square is a 5-storey commercial building located in Jiabin Road of Shenzhen, adjacent to Luohu Port and directly opposite to China Resources MixC in Luohu. Along with the City Suites on the upper floors, City Square is designed as a vibrant urban hub, offering a curated mix of retail and lifestyle offerings to meet the needs of the surrounding business community and residents.

City Suites occupies levels 32 to 39 of City Square, offering a collection of 64 premium serviced apartment units that deliver refined urban living experience for residents in one of Shenzhen’s most desirable locations.

During the year, City Square and City Suites implemented a series of upgrades, enhanced tenant operations and elevated the overall customer experience. As at the year-end date, the occupancy rate increased to 96% from 93% in the previous year.

(5) *Chongqing Hon Kwok Centre* 重慶漢國中心, *Chongqing*

Chongqing Hon Kwok Centre is a 25-storey twin-tower integrated office complex with a 4-storey retail and commercial podium, offers a total gross floor area of approximately 108,000 square meters. The building is located in Liangjiang New District of Chongqing, the core of Chongqing’s northern CBD area, a key district earmarked for growth by the municipal government. As at the year-end date, Chongqing Hon Kwok Centre achieved an increase in occupancy rate to 67% from 65% in the previous year.

Chongqing Hon Kwok Centre offers open-plan shared spaces, enhanced by natural ventilation and daylighting systems to promote energy conservation and environmental sustainability. The design incorporates multi-layered vertical landscaping features, creating a green and engaging urban office environment. The office spaces are further enhanced by the provision of open-plan shared areas, fostering collaboration, flexibility and a dynamic workplace culture. The full suite of self-developed leasing solutions including Hon • Link, Hon • Work and Hon • Cowork are fully deployed in Chongqing.

BUSINESS REVIEW (Continued)

(6) *Chongqing Jinshan Shangye Zhongxin* 重慶金山商業中心, Chongqing

Chongqing Jinshan Shangye Zhongxin is another twin-tower development adjacent to Chongqing Hon Kwok Centre, comprising a 41-storey office tower and a 42-storey hotel-cum-office composite tower, each with a 4-storey retail and commercial podium, with a total gross floor area of approximately 173,000 square meters. As at the year-end date, Chongqing Jinshan Shangye Zhongxin recorded an increase in occupancy rate to 85% from 81% in the previous year.

Benefited from the recent merger of three districts in Chongqing which is expected to enhance regional integration, with improved connectivity and growing demand, Chongqing Jinshan Shangye Zhongxin and Chongqing Hon Kwok Centre are well positioned to attract more tenants and increase occupancy rates further.

(7) *HF608, Shanghai* (100% owned by the Group)

HF608, Shanghai. Situated on Xikang Road, Shanghai, it is a 4-storey commercial premises with total gross floor area of approximately 6,660 square meters. The property had an occupancy rate of over 90% as at 31 March 2026.

(8) *Digital Realty Kin Chuen* (HKG11)

Digital Realty Kin Chuen is a 12-storey above ground and a 2-level basement with a gross floor area of approximately 228,000 square feet. Located at Kin Chuen Street of Kwai Chung of New Territories, the building is entirely leased to a leading international data centre operator on a long-term basis with progressive rental increments. During the year, Digital Realty Kin Chuen continues to generate stable and solid income stream to the Group.

(9) *Hon Kwok Jordan Centre* 漢國佐敦中心

Hon Kwok Jordan Centre is a 23-storey commercial and office building with a gross floor area of approximately 62,000 square feet. The building is located at Hillwood Road of Tsim Sha Tsui. As at the year-end date, Hon Kwok Jordan Centre recorded an improvement in occupancy rate to 88% from 86% in the previous year, reflecting positive leasing momentum and sustained demand for its office space.

BUSINESS REVIEW *(Continued)*

(10) *The Bauhinia Hotel (Central) and The Bauhinia Serviced Apartment* 寶軒酒店(中環)及寶軒服務式住宅

The Bauhinia (Central) is a 20-storey commercial building composite retail, hotel and serviced apartments, located in the heart of Sheung Wan. The Bauhinia Hotel (Central) and the Bauhinia Serviced Apartment re-opened in January 2026 with a new design concept incorporating stamp-frame motif aesthetics. The project has made meaningful progress in enhancing sustainability and climate resilience through the introduction of a new glass curtain wall with a grid-connected solar solution. This building-Integrated Photovoltaic (BIPV) system integrates solar panels directly into the building structure, improving energy efficiency and reducing carbon emissions.



The Bauhinia Hotel (Central) is a four-star boutique hotel comprises 44 rooms, occupying the four podium floors of the building, of which 31 rooms were available for rent as at the year-end date. The Bauhinia Serviced Apartment comprises of 112 units located above the hotel, of which 48 units were available for leasing as at the year-end date. The complex of hotel and serviced apartments provides a range of amenities including a fitness centre and restaurant, while selected rooms offer views of Victoria Harbour.

(11) *Hotels in Japan*

During the year, the Group operated seven hotels in Japan in collaboration with a joint venture partner, primarily located in Tokyo, Osaka and Okinawa. One of the hotels in Tennoji has been temporarily closed for renovation since January 2026 and is scheduled to reopen in October 2026. Supported by a full year of operations and a booming tourism market in Japan, the investment portfolio posted higher rental income, with an average occupancy rate of 91% at the year-end date.

(iii) **Property Management and Other Business**

Hon Kwok Group provides property and car park management services in Hong Kong and continues to explore the catering business under the name Chef Kam Japanese Cuisine. During the year, property management and other businesses contributed approximately HK\$35 million (2025: HK\$46 million) in revenue to the Group.

OTHER INTERESTS

Construction and Trading

Chinney Alliance Group delivered HK\$6,498 million in revenue (compared to HK\$7,692 million in FY2024) and HK\$31 million in net profit (compared to HK\$83 million in FY2024), respectively, in the year ended 31 December 2025. As such, there was a HK\$3 million loss attributable to owners of the Company, mainly due to revaluation write-downs for property, alongside weaker performances in Building Services and Plastic Trading.

BUSINESS REVIEW *(Continued)*

- (1) *Chinney Kin Wing*, delivered another strong year in the sector of foundation piling and ground investigations. Its revenue for the year was HK\$2,271 million, compared to HK\$2,486 million in 2024, and operating profit was HK\$163 million, up from HK\$150 million. This performance came in a market where private contracts were nearly non-existent and pricing pressure was intense. Yet, Chinney Kin Wing was able to improve margins through disciplined cost control, expanded depot facilities and investment in AI enabled monitoring systems.
- (2) *DrilTech*, which provides drilling engineering services, continued to scale its technical capabilities while expanding its service scope with marine ground investigation that is launching in 2026. DrilTech also included a major NEC4 Framework Contract which reinforces its credibility.
- (3) *Chinney Alliance Engineering*, the aviation systems business which focuses on the low-altitude economy related services, delivered HK\$273 million in revenue in 2025, against HK\$490 million in 2024, and HK\$19 million in operating profit, compared with HK\$24 million in 2024. With Hong Kong's airport operating at record levels and Macau's expansion underway, demand for aviation systems, weather monitoring, radar and anti-drone technologies will continue to grow. The company is the leader in this niche and has huge potential in this business segment.
- (4) *General Contracting and Building Construction*, the group's mainstay business returned to profitability with HK\$1,107 million in revenue, up from HK\$718 million in 2024, and HK\$1.2 million in operating profit compared with a loss of HK\$13.2 million in 2024. The real estate downturn kept tender prices unsustainably low, but the team executed with discipline and controlled costs. Projects completing in 2026, including the New Airport District Police Operational Base, should sustain this positive momentum. The Greater Bay Area including Macau remains a standout for long-term opportunities. Airport expansion, infrastructure upgrades, and urban renewal indicate meaningful growth from 2027 onward.
- (5) *Shun Cheong Engineering Group*, a leading building services group in Hong Kong, reported HK\$2,474 million in revenue, compared with HK\$3,485 million in 2024, and an operating loss of HK\$1.4 million, against a profit of HK\$8.8 million in 2024. Delays in project handover, upstream bottlenecks, and financial stress among main contractors created pressure on cash flow and profitability. To meet the challenging conditions, Shun Cheong Engineering Group responded with disciplined project selection, tighter cost control and greater operational flexibility. The outlook for the medium-term pipeline is solid. More importantly, the business is leaning into robotics, EV charging infrastructure, data centres, and solar energy. By including technology into their processes, Shun Cheong Engineering Group is able to enhance its competitive position.
- (6) *Jacobson van den Berg*, the plastics trading division, reported an operating loss of HK\$1.2 million for the year, compared with a profit of HK\$10.3 million in 2024, on sharply lower revenues of HK\$371 million, down from HK\$513 million in 2024. Customers continue to face geopolitical uncertainty and tariff volatility. Its pivot toward disinfectant, hygiene, and wellness products is strategically sound, but consumer brand building takes time.



FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

As reported, the Group's revenue, operating profit before revaluation, and non-cash revaluation deficit on investment properties were again the largest drivers towards the Group's result for the year ended 31 March 2026.

The two further items which led to the loss attributable to shareholders were:

- **Finance costs** – fell to HK\$313 million (2025: HK\$365 million). The reduction reflects lower benchmark interest rates as HIBOR eased through the year and a modest decrease in gross debt, partly offset by lower interest capitalisation as development projects reached completion. For a capital-intensive group such as ours, the lower-rate environment was the single most helpful external development of the year.
- **Share of results of associates** – principally our 29.1% interest in Chinney Alliance Group – was a loss of HK\$870,000 (2025: share of profit of HK\$15 million). The Managing Director's review comments on the underlying performance of those businesses.

After these items, the loss attributable to owners of the Company was HK\$472 million for the year under review (2025: HK\$564 million).

FINANCIAL POSITION AND CAPITAL

Despite another year of valuation pressure, the Group's capital base was preserved – the Managing Director's Report has noted the movement in shareholders' equity and net assets per share. The balance sheet remains substantially property-backed, with income-producing assets across Hong Kong, the Mainland and Japan; we also carry a small number of early-stage technology investments at fair value. Of importance is how the balance sheet is funded, and how we manage debt, liquidity and gearing. The key measures are set out below.

LIQUIDITY, FUNDING AND DEBT MATURITY

Cash and cash equivalents stood at HK\$835 million (2025: HK\$1,106 million), including restricted project deposits applicable only to designated developments. Total interest-bearing bank and other borrowings and lease liabilities was HK\$7,130 million (2025: HK\$7,568 million); the reduction during the year was achieved mainly by applying disposal proceeds to debt repayment.

The majority of our facilities are secured against income-producing assets with substantial value headroom, and we maintain long-standing relationships with a stable group of principal bankers.

Proceeds from the year's asset disposals, and from the further non-core disposals now in progress, are being applied to debt reduction. Selling at sensible prices and redeploying funds into deleveraging – rather than holding non-core assets through the cycle – remains central to how we manage the balance sheet.

Gearing

The gearing ratio remained steady at 60% (2025: 60%). A measured reduction in gearing – achieved through disciplined disposals and restrained capital expenditure rather than through forced sales – is a central financial objective for the period ahead.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT *(Continued)*

TREASURY AND FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group adopts prudent funding and treasury policies. Surplus funds are held with banks of strong credit standing, subject to concentration thresholds and routine counterparty monitoring, and we maintain diversified sources of debt to limit concentration risk.

Foreign exchange risk. A substantial part of our assets and earnings is Renminbi-denominated. Borrowing in a mix of Hong Kong dollars and Renminbi – approximately 26% of debt is Renminbi-denominated – provides a partial natural hedge against our net Mainland investment. We review net currency exposure regularly and use cross-currency interest-rate swaps where appropriate.

Interest-rate risk. Borrowings are predominantly floating-rate, which has worked in our favour as benchmark rates have eased. We monitor rate movements closely and use a combination of fixed- and floating-rate debt, and selective swaps, to manage the exposure.

Refinancing and liquidity risk. We manage this through a staggered maturity profile, diversified lenders, the proactive extension of maturing facilities, and the maintenance of committed undrawn lines and disposal optionality.

Pledge of assets

As at the year-end date, properties (comprising investment properties and development properties) with an aggregate carrying value of approximately HK\$15,320 million (2025: HK\$16,147 million), together with shares in certain subsidiaries, were pledged to secure banking facilities of the Group.

Contingent liabilities and commitments

The Group has provided guarantees in respect of a banking facility granted to a joint venture, and guarantees to banks for mortgage loans extended to purchasers of the Group's properties pending issuance of property ownership certificates. Particulars of contingent liabilities and of capital commitments are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

CAPITAL MANAGEMENT AND GOING CONCERN

The objective of our capital management is to maintain a strong and flexible balance sheet that allows the Group to continue as a going concern, to withstand valuation and market volatility, and to fund the selective investments the Chairman has outlined. We review and adjust the capital structure in response to changes in economic conditions and the Group's requirements.

As at 31 March 2026, the Group's current liabilities exceeded its current assets by approximately HK\$938 million, principally reflecting the classification of certain bank borrowings as current liabilities due to their contractual maturity dates falling within twelve months of the reporting date. The Directors have considered this position carefully in their going concern assessment. In doing so, they have reviewed the Group's cash flow projections, its available and undrawn facilities, the maturity profile of its borrowings, and the refinancing and extension exercises currently in progress. Subsequent to the reporting date, the Group has made further progress in managing its near-term debt maturities: on 22 June 2026, a bank loan of HK\$243 million within the Group was extended for a further three years, and on 24 June 2026, the extension of the loan from Chinney Kin Wing was approved by independent shareholders. The Directors are also continuing to apply proceeds from asset disposals – including those now completed and in progress in Japan – to debt reduction. On that basis, the Directors are satisfied that the Group has, and will continue to have, adequate resources to meet its financial obligations as they fall due for at least twelve months from the reporting date, and the financial statements have accordingly been prepared on a going concern basis.

FINANCIAL PRIORITIES FOR THE YEAR AHEAD

My financial priorities for the coming year, distinct from the operational and strategic priorities set out elsewhere in this report, are:

1. **Manage the maturity profile.** Complete the facility extensions in progress and continue to term out near-term maturities, so that refinancing is routine rather than a source of pressure.
2. **Reduce gearing.** Apply the proceeds of disciplined, non-core disposals to debt reduction, lowering gearing without compromising the quality of the portfolio.
3. **Lower the cost of funds.** Take advantage of the easing rate environment in China to refinance at improved pricing that also increases the amount of natural hedge against our Chinese Mainland assets.
4. **Impose capital discipline on the strategic pivot.** Apply clear investment criteria, staged commitments and measurable return hurdles to the Group's move into new sectors, so that it is funded without weakening the balance sheet.
5. **Strengthen financial systems and controls.** Continue to upgrade reporting, forecasting and internal controls, including the use of applied intelligence in our finance workflows, to support faster and better-informed decisions.

While we are waiting for the property market to recover, the finance team's responsibility is to ensure the Group reaches that point with its balance sheet intact, its banking relationships strong, and its options open. This will allow us to maximise shareholder value and returns over the medium and long term.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Property Revaluation

As at 31 March 2026, the Group's investment properties were valued at a total of HK\$14,798 million. These comprised primarily the Chinese Mainland portfolio of approximately HK\$9,752 million and the Hong Kong portfolio of approximately HK\$4,667 million. These properties were appraised by an independent valuer, Savills Valuation and Professional Services Limited, as of the same date.

A revaluation loss of approximately HK\$700 million was recorded for the year (2025: HK\$704 million). The Chinese Mainland portfolio recorded a revaluation loss of approximately HK\$610 million. The Hong Kong portfolio had a revaluation loss of approximately HK\$101 million.

Operating Profit and Loss for The Year

The Group's overall operating profit represents the profit generated from its business operations excluding finance costs, the changes in fair value of investment properties and income tax credit/(expense), amounted to approximately HK\$320 million for the year, representing a decrease of 27.6% from HK\$442 million last year. The decline in operating profit was primarily due to reduced revenue from property sales.

After taking into account the revaluation loss on investment properties, finance costs and income tax credit/(expense), the Group reported a loss for the year of approximately HK\$621 million.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT *(Continued)*

Employees and remuneration policies

As at 31 March 2026, the Group (not including its joint ventures and associates) had 30.9 employees (2025: 330). Employee costs (including Directors' compensation and before deduct the amount capitalised under properties under development) were approximately HK\$76 million (2025: HK\$98 million) for the year, representing a 22% reduction from previous year.

Employee compensation aligns with market trends and industry standards and is regularly reviewed based on individual performance. Besides basic salaries, our employees receive benefits including social security contributions, participation in an employee provident fund scheme.

Disposal of Subsidiaries

On 28 October 2025, the Group entered into a provisional sale and purchase agreement with an independent third party to dispose of its interests in the hotel property located at Knutsford Place, Nos. 5, 7 and 9 Observatory Court, Kowloon, Hong Kong via sale of share together with assignment of shareholder's loans in Oseling Investments Limited, an indirect non wholly-owned subsidiary of

the Company, and its subsidiaries (altogether the "Target Group") for a consideration of HK\$338 million. Following completion of the transaction on 12 December 2025, the Group ceased to have any interest in the Target Group and no longer operating the hotel. A small loss on disposal of approximately HK\$14 million was recognised for the year.

Details of the transaction were set out in the voluntary announcement of the Company dated 28 October 2025.

James Sing-Wai Wong

Aged 62, Mr. Wong is the Chairman and the Executive Director. He first joined the Board in 2018 and was appointed Chairman in 2023. He graduated from the University of Washington with a bachelor's degree with honors in Economics. He also holds a Juris Doctorate degree from the University of California College of the Law, San Francisco (formerly known as University of California, Hastings College of the Law), and a master's degree in Systems Engineering and Information Systems from the Florida Institute of Technology. He is a member of the California Bar as well as a licensed California Real Estate Broker. He has accumulated over 30 years of experience in economics, law, management, and information systems in Hong Kong, United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, and the Chinese Mainland.

Mr. Wong is a director of Chinney Holdings and Lucky Year, both are substantial shareholders of the Company. Mr. Wong is an executive director of Chinney Kin Wing, the chairman and an executive director of both Hon Kwok Land and Chinney Alliance Group. He is also a director of certain subsidiaries of the Company. He is the son of late Dr. Wong, the Founding Chairman, and Madam Wong.

Yuen-Keung Chan

Aged 71, Mr. Chan has served as the Vice Chairman and the Executive Director since 2018. Mr. Chan is also the vice chairman and managing director and executive director of Chinney Alliance Group and the chairman and an executive director of Chinney Kin Wing. He is also a director of various subsidiaries and associates of the Company. He has over 45 years of experience in the construction industry and is a member of the Chartered Institute of Building.

Raymond Ming-Joe Chow

Aged 59, Mr. Chow was appointed as Managing Director and the Executive Director in August 2025. He is also a director of certain subsidiaries of the Company. Mr. Chow was an executive director of Hongkong Land Limited ("Hongkong Land") from 2000 to 2022, having joined the company in 1994. He was responsible for the extensive commercial property activities for Hongkong Land, including the development and asset management activities of the group's premier office, retail and hotel property portfolio. Before he joined the Company, Mr. Chow was an independent non-executive director of Hon Kwok Land from December 2023 to August 2025.

Mr. Chow was educated in Vancouver and holds a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree from Simon Fraser University. He is also a graduate of the Advanced Management Programme of Harvard Business School. Mr. Chow has various philanthropic appointments, currently serving on the board of Ocean Park Corporation, as an executive committee member of Helping Hand, as a council member of UNICEF HK and as a member of Special Committee on Sustainability and Innovation of Hong Kong Housing Society. He is a global trustee and one of the founding members for Asia for the Urban Land Institute; a fellow of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors and has served on various professional bodies advising real estate investors, government, corporates and asset managers.

Winfred Wai-Lap Fan

Aged 55, Mr. Fan was appointed as Finance Director and the Executive Director in February 2026, having previously served as the Independent Non-Executive Director since 2019. Mr. Fan is a Chartered Accountant with a Bachelor of Commerce from Monash University, Melbourne. He is a member of the Chartered Accountants Australia. He is also a director of certain subsidiaries of the Company.

Mr. Fan has over a decade of experience as chief executive officer, chief financial officer and advisor of businesses in technology, manufacturing, real estate and retail in Australia, New Zealand and the Asia-Pacific region. He then held senior positions at several retail, manufacturing and IT companies, most recently as chief executive officer of a global wireless and networking technology company headquartered in Hong Kong.

Emily Yen Wong

Aged 60, Dr. Emily Wong has been the Non-Executive Director since 2017. Dr. Emily Wong holds a Doctor of Medicine degree and an Executive Masters of Health Administration degree from University of Washington and is a Diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine. She serves on the executive committee of Qiu Shi Science & Technologies Foundation. She is currently an Honorary Associate Professor of Department of Family Medicine and Primary Care in The University of Hong Kong Li Ka Shing Faculty of Medicine and is the Past Chief of Medical Staff at the University of Washington Medical Center.

Dr. Emily Wong is a director of Lucky Year and Chinney Holdings, both of which are substantial shareholders of the Company. She is also a non-executive director of Hon Kwok Land and Chinney Alliance Group. She is the daughter of Dr. Wong, the Founding Chairman, and Madam Wong, and is the sister of James Sing-Wai Wong, the Chairman and the Executive Director.

Richard Chi-Ho Lo

Aged 58, Mr. Lo has been the Independent Non-Executive Director since 2017. He is the Chairman of the Nomination Committee and a member of the Audit Committee and the Remuneration Committee of the Company. Mr. Lo has over 30 years of experience in the investment and real estate industry. He is currently the President of Fulldiamond Group, an investment and consulting company specializing in real estate, finance, securities, project and fund raising. He is a SFC licensed person (types 1, 4 and 9), and a representative of Fullbright Securities Limited and Fullbright Asset Management Limited.

He brings broad exposure and knowledge of the financial industry, having spent over 35 years in banking, trade finance, and investment management. He is currently Executive Director of Arrow Capital Limited, an asset management business he co-founded in 2004.

Mr. Turney started his career with NationsBank (now Bank of America) in commercial banking advising on corporate finance, financing global trade and foreign investment. Aged 65, Mr. Chu has been the Independent Non-Executive Director since 2023. He is the Chairman of both the Audit Committee and the Remuneration Committee, and is a member of the Nomination Committee of the Company. He holds a Master of Business Administration degree and a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) degree. Mr. Chu possesses broad exposure and knowledge of the real estate investment and asset management industries, with over 30 years of international real estate experience. He is currently a Hong Kong Securities and Futures Commission licensed person (type 9, asset management), and a responsible officer of Head & Shoulders Asset Management Limited.

Mr. Chu was the chief executive officer and executive director of Hui Xian Asset Management Limited from 2011 to 2012 where he was in charge of performance and direction of Hong Kong listed Hui Xian REIT. From 2009 to 2011, he was the chief executive officer and executive director of ARA Asset Management (Prosperity) Limited, overseeing Hong Kong listed Prosperity REIT. Previously, he held the positions of director and chief executive officer of ARA Asset Management (Singapore) Limited, where as chief executive he oversaw Singapore listed Fortune REIT.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

The Directors herein present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2026.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The Company is an investment holding company. The Group is principally engaged in the businesses of (i) property development, (ii) property investment and (iii) property and carpark management. The Group targets to generate stable and recurrent rental income from investment properties to help cover its operating overheads and expenses whereas property sales will enhance additional cash inflows to the Group. There were no significant changes in the nature of the Group's principal activities during the year. Further details of the Company's principal subsidiaries are set out in note 1 to the financial statements.

Further discussion and analysis of these activities as required by Schedule 5 to the Companies Ordinance, including an analysis using financial key performance indicators and an indication of likely future development in the Group's business are set out in "Key Group Facts" on page 2, "Chairman's Statement", Managing Director's Report and Business Review (from page 4 to page 16) of this annual report respectively. The Group's financial risk management objectives and policies are set out in note 42 to the financial statements. These discussions form part of this report.

FINANCIAL RESULTS AND DIVIDEND

The results of the Group for the year ended 31 March 2026 and the Group's financial position at that date are set out in the financial statements on pages 47 to 157 of this annual report.

The Board does not recommend the payment of a final dividend for the year ended 31 March 2026 (2025: Nil).

CLOSURE OF REGISTER OF MEMBERS FOR ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The annual general meeting of the Company is scheduled to be held on 27 August 2026. For determining the entitlement to attend and vote at the annual general meeting, the register of members of the Company will be closed from 24 August 2026 to 27 August 2026 (both days inclusive), during which period no share transfers will be registered. In order to be eligible to attend and vote at the annual general meeting, all transfer forms accompanied by relevant share certificates must be lodged with Tricor Investor Services Limited at 17th Floor, Far East Finance Centre, No. 16 Harcourt Road, Hong Kong not later than 4:30 p.m. on 21 August 2026. Shareholders whose names appear on the register of members of the Company on 27 August 2026 (i.e. the record date) will be entitled to attend and vote at the annual general meeting.

KEY RISK FACTORS

The following content lists out the key risks and uncertainties facing the Group. It is a non-exhaustive list and there may be other risks and uncertainties which are not identified for the time being or turn out to be material in future.

Risks Pertaining to the Property Market in Chinese Mainland

A substantial part of the Group's property portfolio is located in Chinese Mainland, and a major part of the Group's revenue is derived in Chinese Mainland. Therefore, the Group is exposed to the risks associated with China's property market including risks of policy changes, currency fluctuation and interest rate changes. The Group continues to implement strategies and strengthen its financial position to withstand any adverse impact when the business environment deteriorates.

Risks Pertaining to the Property Market in Hong Kong

A portion of the Group's investment property portfolio is located in Hong Kong, earning rental and management income. Therefore, the Group is susceptible to changes in economic conditions, consumer consumption and the tourist market in Hong Kong. Besides, the local government may introduce further regulatory measures on the property market, thus adversely affecting the local business environment.

Interest Rate Risks

The Group's bank borrowings mainly bear floating rates. The Group's finance and treasury operation is affected by the change in interest rates and market condition. To reduce our exposure due to volatility in interest rates, the Group has closely monitored the interest rate movements and refinanced existing banking facilities when favourable pricing opportunities arise.

Counterparty Risks

The Group relies on contractors in carrying out its property developing activities. While the Group has been careful in selecting its contractors, there can be no assurance that the contractors will perform satisfactorily. Any unsatisfactory performance of the contractors may potentially lead to construction cost overrun, project delay and contract disputes, which can adversely affect the return of the project. The Group has procedures in place in selecting and managing the performance of the contractors to reduce the negative impact that may arise.

SUMMARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

A summary of the published results and assets, liabilities and non-controlling interests of the Group for the last five financial years, as extracted from the published audited financial statements, is set out on page 158 of this annual report. This summary does not form part of the audited financial statements.

SHARE CAPITAL

There were no movements in the share capital of the Company during the year.

PURCHASE, SALE OR REDEMPTION OF LISTED SECURITIES OF THE COMPANY

There were no purchases, sales or redemptions of the Company's listed securities by the Company or any of its subsidiaries during the year ended 31 March 2026.

DISTRIBUTABLE RESERVES

At 31 March 2026, the Company's reserves available for distribution, calculated in accordance with the provisions of Sections 291, 297 and 299 of the CO, amounted to HK\$492,053,000. The Directors do not recommend the payment of a final dividend for the year.

MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

During the year, purchases from the Group's five largest suppliers accounted for 73% of the total purchases for the year. Purchases from the Group's largest supplier included therein totalled 28%. Sales to the Group's five largest customers accounted for less than 30% of the total sales for the year.

None of the Directors or any of their close associates or any shareholders (which, to the best knowledge of the Directors, own more than 5% of the number of issued shares of the Company) had any beneficial interest in the Group's five largest customers and suppliers.

CONNECTED TRANSACTIONS

On 26 September 2022, Honour Well entered into a framework agreement with each of Chinney Construction and SC Building Services, pursuant to which, Chinney Construction was appointed by Honour Well as the contractor for the builder's works at the contract sum of not exceeding HK\$96 million and SC Building Services was appointed by Honour Well as the contractor for the mechanical and electrical engineering works and façade works at the contract sum of not exceeding HK\$141 million relating to the revamp project of the building located at 119-121 Connaught Road Central, Sheung Wan, Hong Kong. The related transactions constituted connected transactions for each of the Company, Hon Kwok Land and Chinney Alliance Group under the Listing Rules. The transactions were approved by the independent shareholders of the Company, Hon Kwok Land and Chinney Alliance Group at the respective general meetings held by each of the companies on 28 November 2022.

Details of the transactions were set out in the joint announcement of the Company, Hon Kwok Land and Chinney Alliance Group dated 26 September 2022 and the Company's circular dated 8 November 2022. During the year ended 31 March 2026, aggregate payments of approximately HK\$128 million and HK\$81 million were made to SC Building Services and Chinney Construction, respectively in respect of the transactions.

EVENTS AFTER THE REPORTING PERIOD

On 4 March 2026, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement with an independent third party for the disposal of a hotel property in Osaka, Japan, in which Hon Kwok Group holds a 60% interest, at the consideration of JPY1,542 million (equivalent to approximately HK\$77 million). The property was acquired by the Group in September 2023 at a cost of approximately JPY900 million (equivalent to approximately HK\$45 million). The consideration represented a premium of 2.1% of the valuation of the property as of 31 December 2025. Completion of the transaction took place on 22 May 2026.

On 6 April 2026, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement with an independent third party for the disposal of a hotel property in Asakusa Tokyo, Japan, in which Hon Kwok Group holds a 60% interest, for a consideration of JPY2,723 million (equivalent to approximately HK\$133 million). The property was acquired by the Group in August 2023 at a cost of approximately JPY1,573 million (equivalent to approximately HK\$77 million). The consideration represented a premium of 8.9% over the market valuation as at 1 March 2026. Completion of the transaction is expected to take place in the second half of 2026.

On 24 June 2026, the independent shareholders of Chinney Alliance Group and Chinney Kin Wing each passed an ordinary resolution to approve the extension of the Group's loan from Chinney Kin Wing for 12 months from 7 October 2026, with an option to further extend the loan for an additional 12 months subject to the approval of Chinney Kin Wing.

Furthermore, the Group has ongoing transactions in relation to the sale of the remaining portions of its prior development projects, all of which are non-core in nature and are classified as inventory, including the sale of the residual portion of the Dongguan Zhuang project and the remaining retail shops in Botanica Guangzhou, for considerations of RMB100 million and RMB33 million respectively. These disposals enable the Group to unlock the underlying value of its assets and provide it with an opportunity to reallocate capital into other investments.

- (a) In February 2023, Hon Kwok Treasury Limited, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Hon Kwok Land, as borrower, entered into a facility agreement relating to term and revolving loan facilities of HK\$737 million, which may be increased to HK\$1,500 million subject to the terms and conditions as stipulated therein with a syndicate of financial institutions, as lenders. If an event of default under the facility agreement occurs, the agent acting for the lenders may, and shall if so requested by a majority of the lenders, terminate the loan facilities and/or declare all outstanding amounts together with all interest accrued under the loan facilities to be immediately due and payable.

- (b) In September 2023, Gold Famous, as borrower, entered into a facility agreement relating to term loan facilities of HK\$1,525 million with a syndicate of financial institutions, as lenders. The loan facilities will be used for (i) refinancing the existing facilities of Gold Famous; and (ii) financing the general corporate requirements of Hon Kwok Group. The loan facilities have a term of 48 months after the date of its first utilisation.

Pursuant to the facility agreement, it shall be an event of default if (i) the Company (1) ceases to be the single largest beneficial shareholder of Hon Kwok Land; or (2) does not or ceases to hold not less than 30% effective shareholding interests of Hon Kwok Land; or (3) does not or ceases to maintain management control of Hon Kwok Land; or (ii) Dr. Wong, the then controlling shareholder of both Hon Kwok Land and the Company, or his family members collectively, do not or cease to hold the major beneficial ultimate shareholding interests in the Company.

If an event of default under the facility agreement occurs, the agent acting for the lenders may, and shall if so directed by a majority of the lenders, terminate the loan facilities and/or declare all outstanding amounts together with all interest accrued under the loan facilities to be immediately due and payable.

BOARD INDEPENDENCE

- (a) As at the date of this report, three out of the eight Directors are Independent Non-Executive Directors, which meets the requirement of the Listing Rules that at least one-third of the Board are independent non-executive directors.
- (b) Most of the Independent Non-Executive Directors are appointed to board committees and continue to contribute actively in board and board committees' meetings to bring independent judgement on the development, performance and risk management of the Group.
- (c) The Nomination Committee strictly adheres to the independence assessment criteria as set out in the Listing Rules with regard to the nomination and appointment of Independent Non-Executive Directors, and is mandated to assess annually the independence of Independent Non-Executive Directors to ensure that they can continually exercise independent judgement.

CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

James Sing-Wai Wong is the Chairman whereas Raymond Ming-Joe Chow is the Managing Director. There is a clear division of responsibilities between the Chairman and the Managing Director, in that the Chairman bears primary responsibility for the functioning of the Board, by ensuring its effective operation, while the Managing Director bears executive responsibility for the business and the management of the day-to-day operations of the Company.

Pursuant to the nomination policy of the Company, the Nomination Committee identifies individual(s) suitably qualified to become Board members when there is a vacancy or an additional Director is considered necessary and considers criteria including, among other things, character and integrity, qualifications (professional qualifications, skills, knowledge and experience and diversity aspects under the board diversity policy that are relevant to the business and corporate strategies of the Company), willingness to devote adequate time to discharge duties as a Board member and other directorships and significant commitments, independence of proposed Independent Non-Executive Directors. The Nomination Committee then recommend to the Board to appoint the appropriate candidate for directorship.

NOMINATION, APPOINTMENT AND RE-ELECTION OF DIRECTORS *(Continued)*

In the context of re-appointment of any existing member(s) of the Board, the Nomination Committee will also review the overall contribution and service to the Company of each retiring Director including his/her attendance of Board meetings and, where applicable, general meetings, and the level of participation and performance of the Board and shall then make recommendations to the Board for its consideration and recommendation for the proposed candidate(s) to stand for re-election at the annual general meeting of the Company.

Every Non-Executive Directors has entered service agreement with the Company, their terms of office are subject to retirement by rotation and re-election at the Company's annual general meeting in accordance with the Articles of Association, which, in any circumstances, will not exceed three years.

The Articles of Association do not require the Directors to retire by rotation at least once every three years. However, in accordance with article 109(A) of the Articles of Association, at each annual general meeting of the Company, one-third of the Directors for the time being, or, if their number is not three or a multiple of three, then the number nearest to but not less than one-third, shall retire from office by rotation, provided that no director holding office as an Executive Chairman and/or Managing Director shall be subject to retirement by rotation. The Board will ensure the retirement of each Director, other than the one who holds the office as Executive Chairman and/or Managing Director, by rotation at least once every three years in order to comply with the CG Code provisions.

The Chairman and the Managing Director will not be subject to retirement by rotation; which deviates from CG Code provision B.2.2, which stipulate that every director, including those appointed for a specific term, should be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years, as the Board considers that the continuity of office of the Chairman and the Managing Director provide the Group with a strong and consistent leadership and is of great importance to the smooth operations of the Group.

In accordance with article 100 of the Articles of Association, Raymond Ming-Joe Chow was appointed by the Board as Managing Director and the Executive Director effective 29 August 2025 and will hold office until the forthcoming annual general meeting and, being eligible, will offer himself for re-election.

In accordance with article 109(A) of the Articles of Association, Richard Chi-Ho Lo and Randall Todd Turney shall retire by rotation at the forthcoming annual general meeting. Richard Chi-Ho Lo and Randall Todd Turney, being eligible, will offer themselves for re-election.

INDUCTION AND CONTINUOUS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Company Secretary updates Directors on the latest developments and changes to the Listing Rules and the applicable legal and regulatory requirements as well as the business environment regarding subjects necessary in the discharge of their duties. All Directors are encouraged to participate in continuous professional development to develop and refresh their knowledge and skills.

Directors are required to submit to the Company annually details of training sessions undertaken by them in each financial year for the Company to maintain a training record for its Directors. According to the training records maintained by the Company, the training received by each of the existing Directors during the year ended 31 March 2026 is summarised as follows:

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FUNCTION

The Board is collectively responsible for performing the corporate governance duties including:

- (a) to develop, review and update the Company's policy and practices on corporate governance;
- (b) to review and monitor the training and continuous professional development of directors and senior management;
- (c) to review and monitor the Company's policies and practices in compliance with legal and regulatory requirements;
- (d) to review the Company's compliance with the CG Code and disclosure in the "Corporate Governance Report"; and
- (e) to perform such other corporate governance duties and functions set out in the CG Code (as amended from time to time) for which the Board is responsible.

REMUNERATION COMMITTEE

The Remuneration Committee was established in 2005. The Remuneration Committee currently comprises three Independent Non-Executive Directors, namely Stephen Henry Chu, Richard Chi-Ho Lo and Randall Todd Turney and two Executive Directors, namely James Sing-Wai Wong and Yuen-Keung Chan. Stephen Henry Chu is the Chairman of the Remuneration Committee.

During the year under review, the Remuneration Committee held one meeting, during which the existing remuneration of all Directors was reviewed individually. The Remuneration Committee has also reviewed the Group's remuneration policy and made recommendations to the Board on the remuneration packages of all Directors and senior management (senior management is considered equivalent to Executive Director from the Company's viewpoint). It has considered factors such as the performance of the Directors, the profitability of the Group, salaries paid by comparable companies, time commitment and responsibilities. It aims to ensure that the Group is able to attract, retain and motivate a high-calibre team which is essential to the success of the Group.

The remuneration of the Company's management is currently attended by the Executive Directors. The management report to the executive directors who therefore have a clear understanding of the management's performance, enabling a more objective review of the management remuneration. In the Board's opinion, it is more appropriate for the Executive Directors, instead of the Remuneration Committee, to perform these responsibilities. This, however, deviates from CG Code provision E.1.2 which stipulate that the remuneration committee should review and approve the management's remuneration proposals with reference to the board's corporate goals and objectives.

Draft minutes of the Remuneration Committee meeting are circulated to members of Remuneration Committee for comments and the signed minutes are kept by the Company Secretary.

DIRECTORS' REMUNERATION POLICY

The Company has adopted a remuneration policy for its Directors, which aims to provide a fair market level of remuneration to retain and motivate high quality directors, and attract experienced people of high calibre to oversee the business and development of the Group. Pursuant to the remuneration policy, the following key principles have been established for the remuneration for both Executive Directors' and Non-Executive Directors' remuneration/fees (including Independent Non-Executive Directors):

- Executive Directors' remuneration packages shall comprise fixed and variable components linking to individual and the Group's performance and comparable to peer companies, and shall be reviewed annually by the Remuneration Committee and approved by the Board.
- Non-Executive Directors (including Independent Non-Executive Directors) shall receive fixed remuneration/fee to be set at an appropriate level by reference to the relevant time commitment and the size and complexity of the Group, and shall be reviewed annually by the Remuneration Committee and approved by the Board.

- authorisation is to be granted from the Company's shareholders at its annual general meeting to determine Directors' remuneration/fee for each financial year.
- no individual is involved in determining his or her own remuneration/fee.

AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Audit Committee was established in 2001. The Audit Committee currently comprises three members, namely Stephen Henry Chu, Richard Chi-Ho Lo and Randall Todd Turney and they are all Independent Non-Executive Directors. Stephen Henry Chu is the Chairman of the Audit Committee. The Board considers that each Audit Committee member has broad commercial experience and there is a suitable mix of expertise in business, accounting and financial management in the Audit Committee.

The Audit Committee's functions include:

- to review and monitor financial reporting and the reporting judgement contained in them; and
- to review financial and internal controls, accounting policies and practices with management and external auditor.

The Audit Committee held two meetings during the year under review, which were attended by the external auditor, Ernst & Young and the work performed by the Audit Committee included the review of the following:

- the half-yearly and annual results and the related financial reporting matters;
- the financial and accounting policies and practices of the Group;
- the relationships with external auditor, including remuneration, independence, objectivity and effectiveness of the audit process; and
- the effectiveness of the Group's financial and internal controls and risk management system.

Draft minutes of the Audit Committee meetings are circulated to members of Audit Committee for comments and the signed minutes are kept by the Company Secretary.

NOMINATION COMMITTEE

The Nomination Committee was established in 2021. The Nomination Committee currently comprises three Independent Non-Executive Directors, namely Richard Chi-Ho Lo, Randall Todd Turney and Stephen Henry Chu, one Executive Director, namely James Sing-Wai Wong and one Non-Executive Director, namely Emily Yen Wong. Richard Chi-Ho Lo is the Chairman of the Nomination Committee.

The roles and functions of the Nomination Committee include reviewing the structure, size and composition of the Board, identifying individuals suitably qualified to become Directors, selecting or making recommendations to the Board on nominations, appointment or re-appointment of Directors and Board succession, and assessing the independence of the Independent Non-Executive Directors.

During the year under review, the Nomination Committee held one meeting. The major works performed by the Nomination Committee during the year included assessing the independence of Independent Non-Executive Directors, making recommendations to the Board on nomination and appointment of Directors and on the retiring Directors' eligibility for re-election at the annual general meeting. In selecting and recommending candidate(s) for directorship, the Nomination Committee has followed the procedures, process and criteria as set out in the nomination policy of the Company, the summary of which is disclosed in the paragraph headed "Nomination, Appointment and Re-election of Directors" in this report. The committee also reviewed the structure, size and composition of the Board, the board diversity policy and the nomination policy and considered that the said policies were appropriate and effective.

Draft minutes of the Nomination Committee meetings are circulated to members of Nomination Committee for comments and the signed minutes are kept by the Company Secretary.

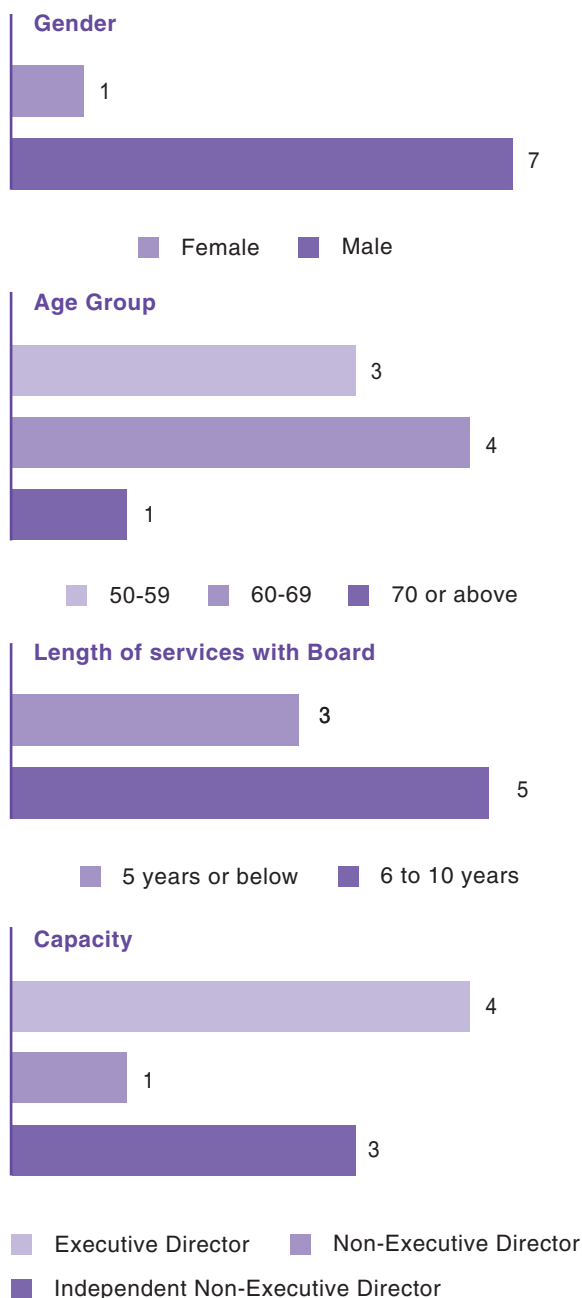

DIVERSITY OF THE BOARD OF THE WORKFORCE

The Board has adopted a board diversity policy, which set out the approach to achieve diversity on the Board. When deciding on appointments of board members and continuation of those appointments, the Board considers a number of board diversity criteria according to the policy, including but not limited to gender, age, cultural and educational background, ethnicity, professional experience, skills, knowledge and length of service. The ultimate decision will be based on merit and contribution that the selected candidates will bring to the Board. These measurable objectives have been set to ensure that the Board has a balance of skills, experience and diversity of perspectives appropriate to the Company and will be reviewed by the Nomination Committee annually to ensure the continued effectiveness of the Board. The Nomination Committee will discuss any revisions that may be required, and recommend any such revisions to the Board for consideration and approval.

The Board, with the help of Nomination Committee, reviewed the structure, size and composition of the Board and was satisfied, in general, with diversity of the Board in accordance with the board diversity policy. The Board considers that the current Board's composition reflects an appropriate balance of gender, skills, experience and diverse perspectives among its members that complement the Group's strategy and business developments. The Board also recognised that the board diversity could be further enhanced in the area of gender and would continue to take initiatives to identify suitable candidates to strengthen the Board diversity and targeted to at least maintain the current level of female representation of the Board.

To identify potential successors to the Board to maintain the board diversity, the Company would search via internal resources (e.g. by Directors' referrals) and may engage professional search firm as and when required.



The Company has also taken, and continues to take steps to promote diversity at all levels of its workforce. The Group provides equal opportunity to all employees and does not discriminate on the grounds of gender, race, age, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, disability and any other aspects of diversity. As at 31 March 2026, the workforce (including senior management) are approximately in the 1:0.66 ratio of men to women.

DIRECTORS' AND AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE ACCOUNTS

The Directors acknowledge their responsibilities for the accounts and they are not aware of any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Directors' responsibilities for the accounts and the responsibilities of the external auditor to the shareholders are set out in the Independent Auditor's Report on pages 41 to 46 of this annual report.

INTERNAL CONTROL AND RISK MANAGEMENT

The Board has overall responsibilities for maintaining the Group's systems of internal control and reviewing their effectiveness. The internal control systems of the Group are designed to provide reasonable assurance to minimize risk of failure in operational systems, and to assist in the achievement of the Group's goals. The systems are also structured to safeguard the Group's assets, to ensure the maintenance of proper accounting records and compliance with applicable laws, rules and regulations. The systems are designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss, and to manage rather than eliminate risks of failure in the Group's operational systems and in the achievement of the Group's business objectives. The Group has dedicated internal audit function which reviews the effectiveness of the risk management and internal control systems from time to time in order to ensure that they meet with the dynamic and ever changing business environment.

During the year, the Audit Committee has reviewed the Group's internal control system and considered the internal audit report with the Group's Executive Directors and finance executive. The review covers all material controls, including financial, operational and compliance controls and risk management of the Group and such systems have been considered reasonably effective and adequate.

The Group regularly reminds the Directors and relevant employees for the compliance of policies regarding the inside information, and provide them with updates on the appropriate guidelines or policies to ensure the compliance with regulatory requirements.

COMPANY SECRETARY

The Company Secretary is responsible for advising the Board on corporate governance and other related matters as well as ensuring good information flow within the Board. During the year, the Company Secretary undertook no less than 15 hours of relevant professional training.

CONSTITUTIONAL DOCUMENTS

On 29 August 2025, the Company adopted a new set of articles of association to incorporate amendments to the then existing articles of association, for the purposes of aligning with (i) the amended Companies Ordinance in relation to, including but not limited to, implementation of the treasury share regime for Hong Kong incorporated listed companies and the promotion of paperless corporate communications and (ii) the Listing Rules amendments (including the core shareholder protection standards set out in Appendix A1 to the Listing Rules); and incorporating certain minor consequential and housekeeping amendments.

Saved as disclosed above, there was no other change in the constitutional documents of the Company during the year ended 31 March 2026.

DIVIDEND POLICY

The Company has adopted the Dividend Policy. Pursuant to which, in considering the declaration and payment of dividends, the Board shall maintain adequate cash reserves for meeting its working capital requirements and future business growth and take into account the following factors of the Group:

- a. financial results;
- b. cash flow situation;
- c. business conditions and strategies;
- d. future operations and earnings;
- e. capital requirements and expenditure plans;
- f. interests of shareholders;
- g. any restrictions on payment of dividends; and
- h. any other factors that the Board may consider relevant.

The Board has discretion to declare and distribute dividends to the shareholders of the Company, subject to the Articles of Association and all applicable laws and regulations. The Board will review the Dividend Policy from time to time and may exercise its sole and absolute discretion to update, amend and/or modify the Dividend Policy at any time as it deems fit and necessary. There is no assurance that dividends will be paid in any particular amount for any given period.

SHAREHOLDERS' RIGHTS

1. Convening of general meeting on requisition by shareholders

Pursuant to Section 566 of the Companies Ordinance, shareholders representing at least 5% of the total voting rights of all the shareholders are entitled to send a request to the Company to convene a general meeting. Such request must state the general nature of the business to be dealt with at the meeting and may include the text of a resolution that may properly be moved and is intended to be moved at the meeting. A request may be sent to the Company in hard copy form or in electronic form and must also be authenticated by the person or persons making it.

2. Procedures for sending enquiries to the Board

Shareholders may send their enquiries and concerns in writing to the Board by addressing them to the Company Secretary at the registered office of the Company and the Company Secretary shall then forward the same to the appropriate executives of the Company or members of the Board for further handling.

3. Procedures for putting forward proposals at an annual general meeting by shareholders

Pursuant to Section 615 of the Companies Ordinance, shareholders representing at least 2.5% of the total voting rights of all the shareholders or at least 50 shareholders can request the Company to give notice of a resolution that may properly be moved and is intended to be moved at an annual general meeting. A request may be sent to the Company in hard copy form or in electronic form and must identify the resolution of which notice is to be given. It must be authenticated by the person or persons making it and be received by the Company not later than 6 weeks before the annual general meeting to which the requests relate; or if later, the time at which notice is given of that meeting.

COMMUNICATIONS WITH SHAREHOLDERS

The Company has established a shareholders communication policy and reviews it on a regular basis to ensure its effectiveness. The Board recognises the importance of good communications with all shareholders and is committed to maintaining a policy of open and timely disclosure of relevant information on its attributes to shareholders and other stakeholders through the publication of interim and annual reports, public announcements and other public circulars, all of which are available on the Company's website.

The annual general meeting provides a useful forum for shareholders to exchange views with the Board. Shareholders are encouraged to attend the annual general meeting for which at least 21 days' prior notice is given. The Chairman of the Board as well as the chairman of each of the board committees (or in their absence, other members of the committees) together with Ernst & Young, the Company's external auditor are available to answer shareholders' questions at the meeting. At the general meeting, each substantially separate issue will be considered by a separate resolution, including the re-election of individual Director, and the poll procedures will be clearly explained.

The Board has reviewed the implementation and effectiveness of the shareholders communication policy. Having considered the multiple channels of communication and engagement in place, it is satisfied that the shareholders communication policy has been properly implemented during the year under review and is effective.

We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

2.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

The consolidated financial statements of the Group have been prepared in accordance with HKFRS Accounting Standards (which include all Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards, Hong Kong Accounting Standards (“HKASs”) and Interpretations) as issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants (“HKICPA”) and the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. They have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investment properties, assets held for sale, financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income, financial assets at fair value through profit or loss and derivative financial instruments which have been measured at fair value as further explained in note 2.4. The consolidated financial statements of the Group are presented in Hong Kong dollars (“HK\$”) and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand except when otherwise indicated.

As at 31 March 2026, the Group had a net current liabilities of HK\$938 million, including contract liabilities of HK\$90 million that will be realised as revenue rather than resulting in cash outflows, out of which HK\$852 million represented properties held for sale under development and completed properties held for sale and HK\$835 million represented its cash and bank balances. The Group has interest-bearing bank and other borrowings due within one year amounting to HK\$2,977 million as at 31 March 2026.

In view of the continued slow-down in the property market and the current economic environment, the directors of the Company have given due consideration to the future liquidity and operating performance of the Group in assessing whether the Group will have sufficient fund to fulfill its financial obligations and to continue as a going concern for at least 12 months from 31 March 2026. Taking into account the cash flows projection of the Group including the Group’s ability to obtain new financing, to renew or refinance the existing credit facilities before maturity, and the fact that:

- (i) the Group has successfully renewed an existing bank loan of approximately HK\$243 million, a loan from a related company, Chinney Kin Wing Holdings Limited, of HK\$250 million and a loan from another related company of HK\$60 million after the end of the reporting period and up to the date of this report;
- (ii) the Group has entered into agreements in March 2026 and April 2026 to dispose of certain investment properties with carrying value of HK\$74 million and HK\$122 million as at 31 March 2026, respectively;
- (iii) the fair value of investment properties exceeded the total amount of bank loans by approximately HK\$8,012 million as of 31 March 2026;

- (iv) the Group can repay the outstanding borrowings through realisation of assets; and
- (v) the Group has obtained an additional loan facility of HK\$250 million from another related company to finance its operation subsequent to the year end and of which none was utilised up to the date of this report,

The directors of the Company are of the view that the Group has sufficient working capital to finance its operations in the next twelve months from the end of the reporting period.

After taking into consideration of the (i) the ability to re-finance of existing borrowings as well as new debt financing to the Group to finance the existing financial and future operating and capital expenditures; (ii) the acceleration of sales of properties and to speed up the collection of sales proceeds; and (iii) the realisation of certain of its assets to generate more cashflow when needed, the directors of the Company are of the view that the Group maintains adequate working capital. Accordingly, these financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis which assumes, inter alia, the realisation of assets and satisfaction of liabilities in the normal course of business.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiaries (collectively referred to as the “Group”) for the year ended 31 March 2026. A subsidiary is an entity (including a structured entity), directly or indirectly, controlled by the Company. Control is achieved when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee (i.e., existing rights that give the Group the current ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee).

Generally, there is a presumption that a majority of voting right results in control. When the Company has, directly or indirectly, less than a majority of the voting or similar rights of an investee, the Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether it has power over an investee, including:

- (a) the contractual arrangement with the other vote holders of the investee;
- (b) rights arising from other contractual arrangements; and
- (c) the Group’s voting rights and potential voting rights.

Basis of consolidation *(Continued)*

The financial statements of the subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting period as the Company, using consistent accounting policies. The results of subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which the Group obtains control, and continue to be consolidated until the date that such control ceases.

Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the parent of the Group and to the non-controlling interests, even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance. All intra-group assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transactions between members of the Group are eliminated in full on consolidation.

The Group reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control described above. A change in the ownership interest of a subsidiary, without a loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction.

If the Group loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises the related assets (including goodwill) any non-controlling interest and exchange fluctuation reserve; and recognises the fair value of any investment retained and any resulting surplus or deficit in profit or loss. The Group's share of components previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified to profit or loss or retained profits, as appropriate, on the same basis as would be required if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities.

2.2 CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND DISCLOSURES

The Group has adopted amendments to HKAS 21 *Lack of Exchangeability* for the first time for the current year's financial statements. The Group has not early adopted any other standard or amendment that has been issued but not yet effective.

Amendments to HKAS 21 specify how an entity shall assess whether a currency is exchangeable into another currency and how it shall estimate a spot exchange rate at a measurement date when exchangeability is lacking. The amendments require disclosures of information that enable users of financial statements to understand the impact of a currency not being exchangeable. As the currencies that the Group had transacted in and the functional currencies of overseas subsidiaries, joint ventures and associates for translation into the Group's presentation currency were exchangeable, the amendments did not have any impact on the Group's financial statements.

HKFRS 18 replaces HKAS 1 *Presentation of Financial Statements*. While a number of sections have been brought forward from HKAS 1 with limited changes, HKFRS 18 introduces new requirements for presentation within the statement of profit or loss, including specified totals and subtotals. Entities are required to classify all income and expenses within the statement of profit or loss into one of the five categories: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations and to present two new defined subtotals. It also requires disclosures about management-defined performance measures in a single note and introduces enhanced requirements on the grouping (aggregation and disaggregation) and the location of information in both the primary financial statements and the notes. Some requirements previously included in HKAS 1 are moved to HKAS 8 *Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors*, which is renamed as HKAS 8 *Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements*. As a consequence of the issuance of HKFRS 18, limited, but widely applicable, amendments are made to HKAS 7 *Statement of Cash Flows*, HKAS 33 *Earnings per Share* and HKAS 34 *Interim Financial Reporting*. In addition, there are minor consequential amendments to other HKFRS Accounting Standards. HKFRS 18 and the consequential amendments to other HKFRS Accounting Standards are effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 with earlier application permitted. Retrospective application is required. The Group is currently analysing the new requirements and assessing the impact of HKFRS 18 on the presentation and disclosure of the Group's financial statements.

HKFRS 19 allows eligible entities to elect to apply reduced disclosure requirements while still applying the recognition, measurement and presentation requirements in other HKFRS Accounting Standards. To be eligible, at the end of the reporting period, an entity must be a subsidiary as defined in HKFRS 10 *Consolidated Financial Statements*, cannot have public accountability and must have a parent (ultimate or intermediate) that prepares consolidated financial statements available for public use which comply with HKFRS Accounting Standards or IFRS Accounting Standards. HKFRS 19 was amended in April 2025 to include IFRS Accounting Standards in the eligibility criteria for applying the standard. The standard was further amended in October 2025 to (i) remove disclosure objectives from HKFRS 19; (ii) reduce the disclosure requirements relating to supplier finance arrangements and a specific class of financial liabilities; and (iii) replace disclosure requirements relating to management-defined performance measures with a cross-reference to HKFRS 18 for entities that use these measures. Earlier application is permitted. As the Company is a listed company, it is not eligible to elect to apply HKFRS 19 and its amendments. Amendments to HKFRS 9 and HKFRS 7 *Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments* clarify the date on which a financial asset or financial liability is derecognised and introduce an accounting policy option to derecognise a financial liability that is settled through an electronic payment system before the settlement date if specified criteria are met. The amendments clarify how to assess the contractual cash flow characteristics of financial assets with environmental, social and governance and other similar contingent features. Moreover, the amendments clarify the requirements for classifying financial assets with non-recourse features and contractually linked instruments. The amendments also include additional disclosures for investments in equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income and financial instruments with contingent features. The amendments shall be applied retrospectively with an adjustment to opening retained profits (or other component of equity) at the initial application date. Prior periods are not required to be restated and can only be restated without the use of hindsight. Earlier application of either all the amendments at the same time or only the amendments related to the classification of financial assets is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.

Amendments to HKFRS 9 and HKFRS 7 *Contracts Referencing Nature-dependent Electricity* clarify the application of the "own-use" requirements for in-scope contracts and amend the designation requirements for a hedged item in a cash flow hedging relationship for in-scope contracts. The amendments also include additional disclosures that enable users of financial statements to understand the effects these contracts have on an entity's financial performance and future cash flows. The amendments relating to the own-use exception shall be applied retrospectively. Prior periods are not required to be restated and can only be restated without the use of hindsight. The amendments relating to the hedge accounting shall be applied prospectively to new hedging relationships designated on or after the date of the initial application. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments to HKFRS 9 and HKFRS 7 shall be applied at the same time. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.

Amendments to HKFRS 10 and HKAS 28 address an inconsistency between the requirements in HKFRS 10 and in HKAS 28 in dealing with the sale or contribution of assets between an investor and its associate or joint venture. The amendments require a full recognition of a gain or loss resulting from a downstream transaction when the sale or contribution of assets constitutes a business. For a transaction involving assets that do not constitute a business, a gain or loss resulting from the transaction is recognised in the investor's profit or loss only to the extent of the unrelated investor's interest in that associate or joint venture. The amendments are to be applied prospectively. The previous mandatory effective date of amendments to HKFRS 10 and HKAS 28 was removed by the HKICPA. However, the amendments are available for adoption now.

The amendments also require an entity whose functional currency and presentation currency are the currency of a hyperinflationary economy to restate the comparative amounts of a foreign operation whose functional currency is that of a non-hyperinflationary economy, by applying the general price index, in accordance with paragraph 34 of HKAS 29 *Financial Reporting in Hyperinflationary Economies*, to the foreign operation's comparative figures. The amendments introduce certain additional disclosures. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.

Annual Improvements to HKFRS Accounting Standards – Volume 11 set out amendments to HKFRS 1, HKFRS 7 (and the accompanying Guidance on implementing HKFRS 7), HKFRS 9, HKFRS 10 and HKAS 7. Details of the amendments that are expected to be applicable to the Group are as follows:

- **HKFRS 7 *Financial Instruments: Disclosures*:** The amendments have updated certain wording in paragraph B38 of HKFRS 7 and paragraphs IG1, IG14 and IG20B of the *Guidance on implementing HKFRS 7* for the purpose of simplification or achieving consistency with other paragraphs in the standard and/or with the concepts and terminology used in other standards. In addition, the amendments clarify that the *Guidance on implementing HKFRS 7* does not necessarily illustrate all the requirements in the referenced paragraphs of HKFRS 7 nor does it create additional requirements. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.
- **HKFRS 9 *Financial Instruments*:** The amendments clarify that when a lessee has determined that a lease liability has been extinguished in accordance with HKFRS 9, the lessee is required to apply paragraph 3.3.3 of HKFRS 9 and recognise any resulting gain or loss in profit or loss. However, the amendments do not address how a lessee distinguishes between a lease modification as defined in HKFRS 16 and an extinguishment of a lease liability in accordance with HKFRS 9. In addition, the amendments have updated certain wording in paragraph 5.1.3 of HKFRS 9 and Appendix A of HKFRS 9 to remove potential confusion. Earlier application is permitted. The amendments are not expected to have any significant impact on the Group's financial statements.

Investments in associates and joint ventures

An associate is an entity in which the Group has a long-term interest of generally not less than 20% of the equity voting rights and over which it has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee, but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a type of joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint venture. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require the unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

The Group's investments in associates and a joint venture are stated in the consolidated statement of financial position at the Group's share of net assets under the equity method of accounting, less any impairment losses.

The Group's share of the post-acquisition results and other comprehensive income of the associate and joint venture is included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and consolidated other comprehensive income, respectively. In addition, when there has been a change recognised directly in the equity of the associate or joint venture, the Group recognises its share of any changes, when applicable, in the consolidated statement of changes in equity. Unrealised gains and losses resulting from transactions between the Group and its associate or joint venture are eliminated to the extent of the Group's investments in an associate or a joint venture, except where unrealised losses provide evidence of an impairment of the assets transferred. Goodwill arising from the acquisition of an associate or a joint venture is included as part of the Group's investments in an associate or a joint venture.

If an investment in an associate becomes an investment in a joint venture or vice versa, the retained interest is not remeasured. Instead, the investment continues to be accounted for under the equity method. In all other cases, upon loss of significant influence over the associate or joint control over the joint venture, the Group measures and recognises any retained investment at its fair value. Any difference between the carrying amount of the associate or joint venture upon loss of significant influence or joint control and the fair value of the retained investment and proceeds from disposal is recognised in profit or loss.

Business combinations and goodwill

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method. The consideration transferred is measured at the acquisition date fair value which is the sum of the acquisition date fair values of assets transferred by the Group, liabilities assumed by the Group to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the Group in exchange for control of the acquiree. For each business combination, the Group elects whether to measure the non-controlling interests in the acquiree that are present ownership interests and entitle their holders to a proportionate share of net assets in the event of liquidation at fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. All other components of non-controlling interests are measured at fair value. Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred.

The Group determines that it has acquired a business when the acquired set of activities and assets includes an input and a substantive process that together significantly contribute to the ability to create outputs.

When the Group acquires a business, it assesses the financial assets and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic circumstances and pertinent conditions as at the acquisition date. This includes the separation of embedded derivatives in host contracts of the acquiree.

Any contingent consideration to be transferred by the acquirer is recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. Contingent consideration classified as an asset or liability is measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration that is classified as equity is not remeasured and subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

Goodwill is initially measured at cost, being the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred, the amount recognised for non-controlling interests and any fair value of the Group's previously held equity interests in the acquiree over the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If the sum of this consideration and other items is lower than the fair value of the net assets acquired, the difference is, after reassessment, recognised in profit or loss as a gain on bargain purchase.

After initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Goodwill is tested for impairment annually or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired. The Group performs its annual impairment test of goodwill as at 31 December. For the purpose of impairment testing, goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the Group's cash-generating units, or groups of cash-generating units, that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the Group are assigned to those units or groups of units.

Impairment is determined by assessing the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit (group of cash-generating units) to which the goodwill relates. Where the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit (group of cash-generating units) is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised. An impairment loss recognised for goodwill is not reversed in a subsequent period.

Where goodwill has been allocated to a cash-generating unit (or group of cash-generating units) and part of the operation within that unit is disposed of, the goodwill associated with the operation disposed of is included in the carrying amount of the operation when determining the gain or loss on the disposal. Goodwill disposed of in these circumstances is measured based on the relative value of the operation disposed of and the portion of the cash-generating unit retained.

Fair value measurement

The Group measures its investment properties and certain of its financial assets at fair value at the end of each reporting period. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability, or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Group. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1	–	based on quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
Level 2	–	based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is observable, either directly or indirectly
Level 3	–	based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Where an indication of impairment exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required (other than financial assets, investment properties, investment properties under construction, properties held for sale under development, completed properties held for sale and assets held for sale), the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of the asset's or cash-generating unit's value in use and its fair value less costs of disposal, and is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or groups of assets, in which case the recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. In testing a cash-generating unit for impairment, a portion of the carrying amount of a corporate asset (e.g., a headquarters building) is allocated to an individual cash-generating unit if it can be allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis or, otherwise, to the smallest group of cash-generating units.

An impairment loss is recognised only if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. An impairment loss is charged to profit or loss in the period in which it arises in those expense categories consistent with the function of the impaired asset.

An assessment is made at the end of each reporting period as to whether there is an indication that previously recognised impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount is estimated. A previously recognised impairment loss of an asset other than goodwill is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount of that asset, but not to an amount higher than the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of any depreciation/amortisation) had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of such an impairment loss is credited to profit or loss in the period in which it arises.

Related parties

A party is considered to be related to the Group if:

- (a) the party is a person or a close member of that person's family and that person
 - (i) has control or joint control over the Group;
 - (ii) has significant influence over the Group; or
 - (iii) is a member of the key management personnel of the Group or of a parent of the Group;

or

- (b) the party is an entity where any of the following conditions applies:
 - (i) the entity and the Group are members of the same group;
 - (ii) one entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or of a parent, subsidiary or fellow subsidiary of the other entity);
 - (iii) the entity and the Group are joint ventures of the same third party;
 - (iv) one entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity;
 - (v) the entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the Group or an entity related to the Group;
 - (vi) the entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (a);
 - (vii) a person identified in (a)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity); and
 - (viii) the entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the Group or to the parent of the Group.

Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. When an item of property, plant and equipment is classified as held for sale or when it is part of a disposal group classified as held for sale, it is not depreciated and is accounted for in accordance with HKFRS 5. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use.

Expenditure incurred after items of property, plant and equipment have been put into operation, such as repairs and maintenance, is normally charged to profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred. In situations where the recognition criteria are satisfied, the expenditure for a major inspection is capitalised in the carrying amount of the asset as a replacement. Where significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Group recognises such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line basis to write off the cost of each item of property, plant and equipment to its residual value over its estimated useful life. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are as follows:

Buildings	5% or over the unexpired terms of the leases
Leasehold improvements	20%
Motor vehicles	20%
Furniture and equipment	20% to 30%

Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, the cost of that item is allocated on a reasonable basis among the parts and each part is depreciated separately. Residual values, useful lives and the depreciation method are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at least at each financial year end.

An item of property, plant and equipment including any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss on disposal or retirement recognised in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised is the difference between the net sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the relevant asset.

Investment properties

Investment properties are interests in land and buildings held to earn rental income and/or for capital appreciation. Such properties are measured initially at cost, including transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are stated at fair value, which reflects market conditions at the end of the reporting period.

Properties under construction or development for future use as investment properties are classified as investment properties under construction. If the fair value cannot be reliably determined, the investment properties under construction will be measured at cost until such time as fair value can be determined or construction is completed.

Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair values of investment properties are included in profit or loss in the year in which they arise.

Any gains or losses on the retirement or disposal of an investment property are recognised in profit or loss in the year of the retirement or disposal.

Properties held for sale under development and completed properties held for sale

Completed properties held for sale

Completed properties held for sale are stated at the lower of costs and net realisable values. Cost is determined by an apportionment of the total land and buildings costs attributable to unsold properties. Net realisable value is estimated by the directors based on the prevailing market prices, on an individual property basis.

Properties held for sale under development

Properties held for sale under development are intended to be held for sale after completion.

Properties held for sale under development are stated at the lower of costs and net realisable values and comprise land costs, construction costs, borrowing costs, professional fees and other costs directly attributable to such properties incurred during the development period.

On completion of construction, the properties are transferred to completed properties held for sale. Properties held for sale under development are classified as current assets.

Assets held for sale

Non-current assets are classified as held for sale if their carrying amounts will be recovered principally through a sales transaction rather than through continuing use. For this to be the case, the asset must be available for immediate sale in its present condition subject only to terms that are usual and customary for the sale of such assets and its sale must be highly probable.

Investment properties classified as held for sale are measured at its fair value in accordance with the policy set out for “Investment properties” above.

Leases

The Group assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Group as a lessee

The Group applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases. The Group recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.

(a) Right-of-use assets

Right-of-use assets are recognised at the commencement date of the lease (that is the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease terms and the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

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When the right-of-use assets relate to interests in leasehold land held as properties held for sale, they are subsequently measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value in accordance with the Group’s policies for “properties held for sale under development and completed properties held for sale”.

(b) Lease liabilities

Lease liabilities are recognised at the commencement date of the lease at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in lease payments (e.g., a change to future lease payments resulting from a change in an index or rate) or a change in assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

The Group's lease liabilities are separately presented in the consolidated statement of financial position.

(c) Short-term leases

The Group applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of properties (that is those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option).

Lease payments on short-term leases are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Group as a lessor

When the Group acts as a lessor, it classifies at lease inception (or when there is a lease modification) each of its leases as either an operating lease or a finance lease.

Leases in which the Group does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of an asset are classified as operating leases. When a contract contains lease and non-lease components, the Group allocates the consideration in the contract to each component on a relative stand-alone selling price basis. Rental income is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the lease term and is included in revenue in the statement of profit or loss due to its operating nature. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised over the lease term on the same basis as rental income.

When the Group is an intermediate lessor, a sublease is classified as a finance lease or operating lease with reference to the right-of-use asset arising from the head lease. If the head lease is a short-term lease to which the Group applies the on-balance sheet recognition exemption, the Group classifies the sublease as an operating lease.

Investments and other financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income, and fair value through profit or loss.

The classification of financial assets at initial recognition depends on the financial asset's contractual cash flow characteristics and the Group's business model for managing them. With the exception of trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a significant financing component, the Group initially measures a financial asset at its fair value, plus in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs. Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient are measured at the transaction price determined under HKFRS 15 in accordance with the policies set out for "Revenue recognition" below.

In order for a financial asset to be classified and measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income, it needs to give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI") on the principal amount outstanding. Financial assets with cash flows that are not SPPI are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, irrespective of the business model.

Initial recognition and measurement (Continued)

The Group's business model for managing financial assets refers to how it manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows. The business model determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling the financial assets, or both. Financial assets classified and measured at amortised cost are held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows, while financial assets classified and measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are held within a business model with the objective of both holding to collect contractual cash flows and selling. Financial assets which are not held within the aforementioned business models are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the period generally established by regulation or convention in the marketplace are recognised on the trade date, that is, the date that the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Subsequent measurement

The subsequent measurement of financial assets depends on their classification as follows:

Financial assets at amortised cost (debt instruments)

Financial assets at amortised cost are subsequently measured using the effective interest method and are subject to impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired.

Financial asset designated at fair value through other comprehensive income (equity investment)

Upon initial recognition, the Group can elect to classify irrevocably its equity investment as equity investment designated at fair value through other comprehensive income when they meet the definition of equity under HKAS 32 *Financial Instruments: Presentation* and are not held for trading. The classification is determined on an instrument-by-instrument basis.

Gains and losses on these financial assets are never recycled to the statement of profit or loss. Dividends are recognised as other income in the statement of profit or loss when the right of payment has been established, except when the Group benefits from such proceeds as a recovery of part of the cost of the financial asset, in which case, such gains are recorded in other comprehensive income. Equity investments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income are not subject to impairment assessment.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are carried in the statement of financial position at fair value with net changes in fair value recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

This category includes equity investments which the Group had not irrevocably elected to classify at fair value through other comprehensive income. Dividends on the equity investments are also recognised as other income in the statement of profit or loss when the right of payment has been established.

Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e., removed from the Group's consolidated statement of financial position) when:

- the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired; or
- the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a "pass-through" arrangement; and either (a) the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Group has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if, and to what extent, it has retained the risk and rewards of ownership of the asset. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset nor transferred control of the asset, the Group continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Group's continuing involvement. In that case, the Group also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Group has retained.

Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the Group could be required to repay.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises an allowance for expected credit losses (“ECLs”) for all debt instruments not held at fair value through profit or loss. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

General approach

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12 months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of the timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

At each reporting date, the Group assesses whether the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition. When making the assessment, the Group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition and considers reasonable and supportable information that is available without undue cost or effort, including historical and forward-looking information.

The Group considers a financial asset in default when contractual payments are 90 days past due. However, in certain cases, the Group may also consider a financial asset to be in default when internal or external information indicates that the Group is unlikely to receive the outstanding contractual amounts in full before taking into account any credit enhancements held by the Group. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

Simplified approach

For trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or when the Group applies the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a significant financing component, the Group applies the simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Under the simplified approach, the Group does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Group has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment.

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Group's financial liabilities include trade payables, other payables and accrued liabilities, interest-bearing bank and other borrowings, loan from a related company, derivative financial instruments and customer deposits.

Subsequent measurement

The subsequent measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification as follows:

Financial liabilities at amortised cost (trade payables, other payables, accrued liabilities and borrowings)

After initial recognition, trade payables, other payables, accrued liabilities and interest-bearing borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the effective interest rate amortisation process.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. The effective interest rate amortisation is included in finance costs profit or loss.

Financial guarantee contracts

Financial guarantee contracts issued by the Group are those contracts that require a payment to be made to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because the specified debtor fails to make a payment when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument. A financial guarantee contract is recognised initially as a liability at its fair value, adjusted for transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issuance of the guarantee. Subsequent to initial recognition, the Group measures the financial guarantee contracts at the higher of: (i) the ECL allowance determined in accordance with the policy as set out in "Impairment of financial assets" and (ii) the amount initially recognised less, when appropriate, the cumulative amount of income recognised.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled, or expires.

When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and a recognition of a new liability, and the difference between the respective carrying amounts is recognised in profit or loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the statement of financial position if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

Derivative financial instruments

Initial recognition and subsequent measurement

The Group uses derivative financial instruments, such as cross-currency interest rate swap contracts to hedge its foreign currency risk and interest rate risk. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognised at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured at fair value. Derivatives are carried as assets when the fair value is positive and as liabilities when the fair value is negative.

Any gains or losses arising from changes in fair value of derivatives are taken directly to profit or loss.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position comprise cash on hand and at bank, and short-term highly liquid deposits with a maturity of generally within three months that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash, subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value and held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments.

For the purpose of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and at banks, and short-term deposits as defined above, less bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Group's cash management.

Income tax

Income tax comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period, taking into consideration interpretations and practices prevailing in the countries in which the Group operates.

Deferred tax is provided, using the liability method, on all temporary differences at the end of the reporting period between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except:

- when the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss; and
- in respect of taxable temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and a joint venture, when the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, and the carryforward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carryforward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised, except:

- when the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary differences arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences; and
- in respect of deductible temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates and a joint venture, deferred tax assets are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that the temporary differences will reverse in the foreseeable future and taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at the end of each reporting period and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Income tax *(Continued)*

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if and only if the Group has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets and current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entities which intend either to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously, in each future period in which significant amounts of deferred tax liabilities or assets are expected to be settled or recovered.

Revenue recognition

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of goods or services is transferred to the customers at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Group expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services.

When the consideration in a contract includes a variable amount, the amount of consideration is estimated to which the Group will be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods or services to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and constrained until it is highly probable that a significant revenue reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur when the associated uncertainty with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved.

When the contract contains a financing component which provides the customer with a significant benefit of financing the transfer of goods or services to the customer for more than one year, revenue is measured at the present value of the amount receivable, discounted using the discount rate that would be reflected in a separate financing transaction between the Group and the customer at contract inception. When the contract contains a financing component which provides the Group with a significant financial benefit for more than one year, revenue recognised under the contract includes the interest expense accreted on the contract liability under the effective interest method. For a contract where the period between the payment by the customer and the transfer of the promised goods or services is one year or less, the transaction price is not adjusted for the effects of a significant financing component, using the practical expedient in HKFRS 15.

Revenue from contracts with customers (Continued)

Revenue is recognised when or as the control of the asset is transferred to the customer. Depending on the terms of the contract and the laws that apply to the contract, control of the asset may be transferred over time or at a point in time. Control of the asset is transferred over time if the Group's performance:

- provides all of the benefits received and consumed simultaneously by the customer;
- creates and enhances an asset that the customer controls as the Group performs; or
- does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Group and the Group has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date.

If control of the asset transfers over time, revenue is recognised over the period of the contract by reference to the progress towards complete satisfaction of that performance obligation. Otherwise, revenue is recognised at a point in time when the customer obtains control of the asset.

The progress towards complete satisfaction of the performance obligation is measured based on the Group's efforts or inputs to the satisfaction of the performance obligation, by reference to the contract costs incurred up to the end of reporting period as a percentage of total estimated costs for each contract.

(a) Sales of properties

Revenue from the sale of properties is recognised at the point in time when the purchasers obtained the physical possession of the completed property and the Group has the present right to payment and the collection of the consideration is probable.

(b) Property management fee income and utility income are recognised when the services are rendered.

Revenue from other sources

- (a) rental income is recognised on a time proportion basis over the lease terms.
- (b) interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method by applying the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts over the expected life of the financial instruments or a shorter period, when appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is recognised when a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the Group transfers the related goods and services. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Group performs under the contract (i.e., transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer).

Contract costs

Other than the costs which are capitalised as investment properties, property, plant and equipment, and properties held for sale under development and completed properties held for sale, costs incurred to fulfil a contract with a customer are capitalised as an asset if all of the following criteria are met:

- (a) The costs relate directly to a contract or to an anticipated contract that the entity can specifically identify.
- (b) The costs generate or enhance resources of the entity that will be used in satisfying (or in continuing to satisfy) performance obligations in the future.
- (c) The costs are expected to be recovered.

The capitalised contract costs are amortised and charged to profit or loss on a systematic basis that is consistent with the transfer to the customer of the goods or services to which the asset relates. Other contract costs are expensed as incurred.

Employee benefits

Paid leave carried forward

The Group provides paid annual leave to its employees under their employment contracts on a calendar year basis. Under certain circumstances, such leave which remains untaken as at the end of the reporting period is permitted to be carried forward and utilised by the respective employees in the following year. An accrual is made at the end of the reporting period for the expected future cost of such paid leave earned during the year by the employees and carried forward.

The Group operates a defined contribution Mandatory Provident Fund retirement benefit scheme (the “MPF Scheme”) under the Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Ordinance for those employees who are eligible to participate in the MPF Scheme. Contributions are made based on a percentage of the employees’ basic salaries and are charged to profit or loss as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the MPF Scheme. The assets of the MPF Scheme are held separately from those of the Group in independently administered funds. The Group’s employer contributions vest fully with the employees when contributed into the MPF Scheme, except for the Group’s employer voluntary contributions, which are refunded to the Group when the employee leaves employment prior to the contributions vesting fully, in accordance with the rules of the MPF Scheme.

The Group also operates a defined contribution retirement benefit scheme for those employees who are eligible and have elected to participate in the scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the Group in an independently administered fund. Contributions are made based on a percentage of the participating employees’ basic salaries and are charged to profit or loss as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme. When an employee leaves the scheme prior to his/her interest in the Group’s employer contributions vesting fully, the ongoing contributions payable by the Group may be reduced by the relevant amount of forfeited contributions.

The employees of the Group’s subsidiaries which operate in the Chinese mainland are required to participate in a central pension scheme operated by the local municipal government. These subsidiaries are required to contribute a certain percentage of their payroll costs to the central pension scheme. The contributions are charged to profit or loss as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the central pension scheme.

Termination benefits

Termination benefits are recognised at the earlier of when the Group can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits and when the Group recognises restructuring costs involving the payment of termination benefits.

Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, i.e., assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are capitalised as part of the cost of those assets. The capitalisation of such borrowing costs ceases when the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs capitalised. All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred. Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds.

Dividends

Final dividends are recognised as a liability when they are approved by the shareholders in a general meeting. Proposed final dividends are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Interim dividends are simultaneously proposed and declared, because the Company's memorandum and articles of association grant the directors the authority to declare interim dividends. Consequently, interim dividends are recognised immediately as a liability when they are proposed and declared.

Foreign currencies

These financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars, which is the Company's functional currency. Each entity in the Group determines its own functional currency and items included in the financial statements of each entity are measured using that functional currency. Foreign currency transactions recorded by the entities in the Group are initially recorded using their respective functional currency rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency rates of exchange ruling at the end of the reporting period. Differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in profit or loss.

Differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in the statement of profit or loss with the exception of monetary items that are designated as part of the hedge of the Group's net investment of a foreign operation. These are recognised in other comprehensive income until the net investment is disposed of, at which time the cumulative amount is reclassified to the statement of profit or loss. Tax charges and credits attributable to exchange differences on those monetary items are also recorded in other comprehensive income.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was measured. The gain or loss arising on translation of a non-monetary item measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation difference on the item whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in other comprehensive income or profit or loss is also recognised in other comprehensive income or profit or loss, respectively).

In determining the exchange rate on initial recognition of the related asset, expense or income on the derecognition of a non-monetary asset or non-monetary liability relating to an advance consideration, the date of initial transaction is the date on which the Group initially recognises the non-monetary asset or non-monetary liability arising from the advance consideration. If there are multiple payments or receipts in advance, the Group determines the transaction date for each payment or receipt of the advance consideration.

The functional currencies of certain overseas subsidiaries, a joint venture and associates are currencies other than the Hong Kong dollar. As at the end of the reporting period, the assets and liabilities of these entities are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the exchange rates prevailing at the end of the reporting period and their statements of profit or loss are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the exchange rates that approximate to those prevailing at the dates of the transactions.

The resulting exchange differences are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in the exchange fluctuation reserve. On disposal of a foreign operation, the component of other comprehensive income relating to that particular foreign operation is recognised in profit or loss.

Any goodwill arising on the acquisition of a foreign operation and any fair value adjustments to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities arising on acquisition are treated as assets and liabilities of the foreign operation and translated at the closing rate.

For the purpose of the consolidated statement of cash flows, the cash flows of overseas subsidiaries are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the exchange rates ruling at the dates of the cash flows. Frequently recurring cash flows of overseas subsidiaries which arise throughout the year are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the weighted average exchange rates for the year.

The preparation of the Group's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and their accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities.

Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of the assets or liabilities affected in the future.

Judgements

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, management has made the following judgements, apart from those involving estimations, which have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements:

Property lease classification – Group as lessor

The Group has entered into commercial property leases on its investment property portfolio. The Group has determined, based on an evaluation of the terms and conditions of the arrangements, such as the lease term not constituting a major part of the economy life of the commercial property and the present value of the minimum lease payments not amounting to substantially all the fair value of the commercial property, that it retains substantially all the significant risks and rewards incidental to ownership of these properties which are leased out and accounts for the contracts as operating leases.

Significant judgement in determining the lease term of contracts with renewal options

The Group has several lease contracts that include extension and termination options. The Group applies judgement in evaluating whether or not to exercise the option to renew or terminate the lease. That is, it considers all relevant factors that create an economic incentive for it to exercise either the renewal or termination. After the commencement date, the Group reassesses the lease term if there is a significant event or change in circumstances that is within its control and affects its ability to exercise or not to exercise the option to renew or to terminate the lease (e.g., construction of significant leasehold improvements or significant customisation to the leased asset).

Determining the timing of satisfaction of contracts related to the sale of properties

The Group determined that the sales contract with customers requires the Group to complete the development of property before transferring the legal title of the relevant property to customers. The Group also determined that the Group does not have an enforceable right to payment from customers for performance completed to date before the transfer of legal title of the relevant property to customers. Consequently, the Group concluded that the timing of transfer of properties is at the point in time when the purchasers obtained the physical possession or the legal title of the completed property.

Classification between investment properties and properties held for sale

The Group determines whether a property qualifies as an investment property or a property held for sale, and has developed criteria in making that judgement. Investment property is a property held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation or both.

Properties held for sale are properties held by the Group with intention for sale in the Group's ordinary course of business.

Judgement is made on an individual property basis to determine whether leased out properties are classified as properties held for sale or investment properties.

Classification between investment properties and owner-occupied properties

The Group determines whether a property qualifies as an investment property, and has developed criteria in making that judgement. Investment property is a property held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation or both. Therefore, the Group considers whether a property generates cash flows largely independently of the other assets held by the Group.

Some properties comprise a portion that is held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation and another portion that is held for use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes. If these portions could be sold separately or leased out separately under a finance lease, the Group accounts for the portions separately. If the portions could not be sold separately, the property is an investment property only if an insignificant portion is held for use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes.

Judgement is made on an individual property basis to determine whether ancillary services are so significant that a property does not qualify as an investment property.

Deferred taxation on investment properties

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax arising from investment properties that are measured using the fair value model, the directors of the Company have reviewed the Group's investment property portfolio and concluded that the Group's investment properties located in Hong Kong were held under a business model whose objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the investment properties through sale. Therefore, in measuring the Group's deferred taxation on investment properties located in Hong Kong, the directors of the Company have determined that the presumption that the carrying values of investment properties measured using the fair value model are recovered entirely through sale is not rebutted.

Deferred taxation on investment properties (Continued)

For the Group's investment properties located in the PRC, the directors of the Company concluded that the Group's investment properties located in the PRC were held under a business model whose objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the investment properties over time, rather than through sale. Therefore, in measuring the Group's deferred taxation on investment properties located in the PRC, the directors of the Company have determined that the presumption that the carrying values of investment properties measured using the fair value model are recovered entirely through sale is rebutted.

Estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below.

Impairment of goodwill

The Group determines whether goodwill is impaired at least on an annual basis. This requires an estimation of the fair value less cost of disposal of the cash-generating units to which the goodwill is allocated. Estimating the fair value less cost of disposal requires the Group to make an estimate of the term yield rate and the relevant market rent in the calculation. The carrying amount of goodwill at 31 March 2026 was HK\$36,369,000 (2025: HK\$36,369,000). Further details are set out in note 16 to the financial statements.

Estimation of net realisable values of properties held for sale under development and completed properties held for sale

The Group considers information from a variety of sources, including recent prices of similar properties in the same location and condition, with adjustments to reflect any changes in economic conditions since the dates of transactions that occurred at those prices. Particulars of the properties held for sale under development and completed properties held for sale of the Group are set out in note 20 to the financial statements.

Estimation of fair value of investment properties

In the absence of current prices in an active market for similar properties, the Group considers information from a variety of sources, including:

- (a) current prices in an active market for properties of a different nature, condition or location (or subject to different leases or other contracts), adjusted to reflect those differences;
- (b) recent prices of similar properties on less active markets, with adjustments to reflect any changes in economic conditions since the dates of the transactions that occurred at those prices; and
- (c) discounted cash flow projections based on reliable estimates of future cash flows, supported by the terms of any existing lease and other contracts and (when possible) by external evidence such as current market rents for similar properties in the same location and condition, and using discount rates that reflect current market assessments of the uncertainty in the amount and timing of the cash flows.

Further details, including the key assumptions used for fair value measurement, are given in note 15 to the financial statements.

Current income taxes and deferred income taxes

The Group is subject to income taxes in a number of jurisdictions. Significant judgement is required in determining the amount of the provision for tax and the timing of payment of the related taxes. There are transactions and calculations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recorded, such differences will impact on the income tax and deferred tax provisions in the periods in which such determination is made.

Deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for unused tax losses to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses can be utilised. Significant management judgement is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and level of future taxable profits together with future tax planning strategies. Further details are contained in note 30 to the financial statements.

Land appreciation tax

Under the Provisional Regulations on land appreciation tax (“LAT”) implemented upon the issuance of the Provisional Regulations of the PRC on 27 January 1995, all gains arising from the transfer of real estate properties in the Chinese mainland with effect from 1 January 1994 are subject to LAT at progressive rates ranging from 30% to 60% on the appreciation of land value, being the proceeds from sales of properties less deductible expenditures including amortisation of land use rights, borrowing costs and all property development expenditures.

The subsidiaries of the Group engaging in the property development business in the Chinese mainland are subject to LAT, which has been included in income tax. However, the implementation of Provisional Regulations on LAT varies amongst various the Chinese mainland cities and the Group has not finalised certain of its LAT returns with various tax authorities. Accordingly, significant judgement is required in determining the amount of land appreciation and its related taxes. The ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. The Group recognises these liabilities based on management’s best estimates. When the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recorded, such differences will impact on the income tax and provisions for LAT in the period in which such determination is made. Further details are contained in note 10 to the financial statements.

For management purposes, the Group is organised into business units based on their products and services and has three reportable operating segments as follows:

- (a) the property development segment develops properties for sale;
- (b) the property investment segment holds investment properties for development and the generation of rental income; and
- (c) the property, carpark management and others segment comprises, principally, the sub-leasing of carparking business and the property management service business which provides management services to residential and commercial properties.

Management monitors the results of the Group's operating segments separately for the purpose of making decisions about resource allocation and performance assessment. Segment performance is evaluated based on reportable segment profit/(loss), which is a measure of adjusted profit/(loss) before tax. The adjusted profit/(loss) before tax is measured consistently with the Group's profit/(loss) before tax except that interest income, non-lease-related finance costs, share of profits/(losses) of associates, share of loss of a joint venture, loss on disposal of subsidiaries, loss on disposal of an associate, fair value losses on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss as well as head office and corporate expenses are excluded from such measurement.

Segment assets exclude investments in joint ventures, investments in associates, financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income, other unallocated head office and corporate assets, including tax recoverable and cash and cash equivalents as these assets are managed on a group basis.

Segment liabilities exclude other unallocated head office and corporate liabilities, including derivative financial instruments, interest-bearing bank and other borrowings, loans from related companies, tax payable and deferred tax liabilities as these liabilities are managed on a group basis.

During the current and prior years, there were no intersegment transactions.

Foreign currency risk

The Group has transactional currency exposures. These exposures arise from revenue or expenses by operating units in currencies other than the units' functional currencies. The Group's monetary assets, financing and transactions are principally denominated in RMB and HK\$. The Group is exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from changes in the exchange rate of HK\$ against RMB. At present, the Group does not intend to seek to hedge its exposure to foreign exchange fluctuations. However, the Group will constantly review the economic situation and its foreign exchange risk profile, and will consider appropriate hedging measures in future as may be necessary.

Interest rate risk

The Group's exposure to the risk of changes in market interest rates relates primarily to the Group's long-term debt obligations with floating interest rates. The interest rates and terms of repayment of the Group's borrowings are disclosed in note 29 to the financial statements. The Group's policy is to obtain the most favourable interest rates available for its borrowings. Management monitors interest rate exposure and will consider hedging significant interest rate exposures should the need arise.

Liquidity risk

The Group monitors its risk to a shortage of funds using a recurring liquidity planning tool. This tool considers the maturity of both its financial instruments and financial assets (e.g., trade receivables) and projected cash flows from operations.

The Group's objective is to maintain a balance between continuity of funding and flexibility through the use of interest-bearing bank and other borrowings, lease liabilities and other fund raising exercises. The Group will consistently maintain a prudent financing policy and ensure that it maintains sufficient cash and credit lines to meet its liquidity requirements. 42% (2025: 13%) of the Group's debts, which comprise interest-bearing bank borrowings, would mature in less than one year as at 31 March 2026 based on the carrying values of the borrowings reflected in the financial statements. Based on the maturity dates as set out in the loan agreements, 42% (2025: 10%) of the Group's debts would mature in less than one year.

In prior year, in respect of interest-bearing bank and other borrowings of HK\$43,002,000, the loan agreements contain a repayment on demand clause giving the bank and other lender the unconditional right to call in the loans at any time and therefore, for the purpose of the above maturity profile, the total amount is classified as “on demand”.

Notwithstanding the above clause, the directors do not believe that the loans will be called in their entirety within 12 months, and they consider that the loans will be repaid in accordance with the maturity dates as set out in the loan agreements. This evaluation was made considering: the financial position of the Group at the date of approval of the financial statements; the Group's compliance with the loan covenants; the lack of events of default, and the fact that the Group has made all previously scheduled repayments on time.

In accordance with the terms of the loans, the contractual undiscounted payments at 31 March 2026 for the interest-bearing bank and other borrowings in respect of the Group were HK\$2,943,456,000 (2025: HK\$1,047,729,000) payable within one year, HK\$3,222,058,000 (2025: HK\$2,860,351,000) payable in the second year and HK\$1,173,636,000 (2025: HK\$4,304,712,000) payable beyond two years.

Capital management

The primary objectives of the Group's capital management are to safeguard the Group's ability to continue as a going concern and to maintain healthy capital ratios in order to support its business and maximise shareholders' value.

The Group manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it in light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. To maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Group may adjust the dividend payment to shareholders, return capital to shareholders or issue new shares. No changes were made in the objectives, policies or processes for managing capital during the years ended 31 March 2026 and 2025.

The Group monitors capital using a gearing ratio, which is net interest-bearing debt divided by the equity attributable to owners of the Company plus non-controlling interests. Net interest-bearing debt includes interest-bearing bank and other borrowings, loans from related companies and lease liabilities less cash and bank equivalents. 44. EVENTS AFTER THE REPORTING PERIOD

Subsequent to the end of the reporting period, there were updates on the disposal transactions of the Group's hotel properties located in Japan and on a loan with a related company:

(a) Completion of disposal of Osaka Property

On 22 May 2026, the Group completed the disposal of the Osaka Property to an independent third party at a total consideration of approximately JPY1,542,000,000 (equivalent to HK\$77,100,000). Upon the completion, the Group ceased to hold any interest in the Osaka Property. The transaction resulted in a gain on disposal of approximately HK\$1,664,000 (before any related tax and transaction costs), which will be recognised in the Group's consolidated statement of profit or loss for the year ending 31 March 2027.

(b) Disposal of Tokyo Property

On 6 April, 2026, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement with an independent third party to dispose of the Tokyo Property (which was included in assets held for sale as at 31 March 2026) for a total consideration of approximately JPY2,722,500,000 (equivalent to HK\$133,402,500). As at the date of approval of these consolidated financial statements, the disposal of the Tokyo Property has not yet been completed.

(c) Extension of loan from Chinney Kin Wing

On 24 June 2026, the independent shareholders of Chinney Alliance Group and Chinney Kin Wing each passed an ordinary resolution to approve the extension of the Group's loan from Chinney Kin Wing for 12 months from 7 October 2026, with an option to further extend the loan for an additional 12 months subject to the approval of Chinney Kin Wing. Details of the transactions were set out in the voluntary announcement of the Company dated 4 May 2026.

45. APPROVAL OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements were approved and authorised for issue by the board of directors of the Company on 29 June 2026.
